

In the past twelve years clogging and its music have changed. Many years ago, most clogging routines were danced to square dance instrumentals. The dancers clogged to "called" square dance routines, or performed a few couples precision

numbers. The two dance variations I learned first, to music other than country or bluegrass, were choreographed to Amos Moses and Little Black Book. Being involved with an active teenagers square dance-clogging team gave me the opportunity to experience the changes in types of music first hand. Soon choreography was written for Boogie Fever, California Strut, and Disco Duck, to name a few. Couples routines and square dancing became secondary to the newer line routines. This appealed to teenagers, but adults had many reservations about dancing to modern music.

Have you looked at today's clogging halls? Dancers of all ages invade the floor to dance to pop country songs like "Dixieland Delight" or the popular "Flash Dance, What A Feeling", which the teenagers truly enjoy. Couples routines and circle mixers are fun for variety, however the line-solo routines allow anyone to dance. No partner is needed for most of the popular dances and this allows more singles and families to participate. With added variety in songs and dance styles come additional problems for instructors. Many dancers who prefer country or bluegrass music are outspoken against pop or rock music. The younger generation of cloggers will dance to any kind of music, but prefer their popular songs when given a choice. How do instructors keep everyone happy?

Let's remember a few basic thoughts. Clogging is done for fun, friendship, and a love of dancing. If a routine is being danced to a song you don't care for, watch the routine steps. What makes that routine different? Are the steps challenging and smooth flowing? Clogging is a skill to be learned, and only by participating can you improve your skills. Dancing to all kinds of music may not be pleasing for everyone, but the acquired skills and experience from learning many routines is invaluable. A clogger can become a better dancer only by practicing and learning.

Preferences in music are still important. Here is a suggestion for those who really dislike a particular song, but really like the choreography: Put the routine to a song you like! Rearrange the steps a little if you have to! For as long as I can remember, steps and routines have been written to share. Give credit where credit is due, if you change a routine to new music. Honor the original choreographer by acknowledging their work. Sharing has been the foundation of Florida's friendliness in clogging! All of the double toes and drag slides you dance were shared with you by someone! Music makes the routine popular, preferences determine who learns it. I encourage you to learn whatever you can, wherever you can, to whatever kind of music — then share what you know! This is one way to keep everyone happy in dancing!!!!

Many thanks to all of the Sunshine Cloggers, families, and friends, who made 1983 a beautiful year. A great deal of hard work, love, and dedication have been given by all of you. This makes our club a warm, great place to be! You are a special ''family'' to me. As we look ahead together to 1984, with so many special events to be part of, remember to give of yourselves as you have this year past. You're the Best!!

May the New Year bring fun, love and plenty of good times to you and your families!!

"Sound Advice"

Our Law Enforcement agencies work hard to protect the public, but the legal system is such that thieves and burglars are soon back "out on the street". In order to protect your valuable sound equipment, please allow me to make some suggestions.

If you must leave equipment in your car, a closed trunk is the <u>best</u> place. If you leave it on a seat or in an exposed Station Wagon, carry a large dark cloth with which to cover the equipment.

"Mark" your equipment with your drivers license number or name and address. An electric "pencil" for etching on metal surfaces can be purchased from almost any hardware store or from Radio Shack. In Orange County, an electric pencil may be borrowed from the Sheriff's Department, Community Relations - 859-8016. Mark each piece in several places. Make a written record of all the serial numbers, brand names and other identifying features of your equipment. A thief may pass up pieces well marked. If your equipment is stolen and possibly recovered by the police, if you can identify it, you may get it back.

Remember: An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure!!!



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
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A New Year's Resolution

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
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
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
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Over the Mountains

Fontana Academy of Teaching

How much should I expect to learn from a course called the "Academy of Teaching", (especially when I probably know it all anyway), I asked myself on the twelve hour drive to Fontana from Central Florida. "A course for experienced as well as the new instructor, designed to cover all phases of Clogging", the flyer said. The list of instructors was impressive. If I were to pick up only one thing from each, I would be satisfied. Besides, I thought (there is a lot of time for thinking on a 12-hour trip), Fontana is always fun no matter what is going on. Convinced I had made a proper decision in going, I settled down in my car seat for a little nap, only to be rudely awakened seconds later as I jerked the front wheel of the car back onto the road. There is nothing like a winding mountain road to keep a driver awake.

The course began on Thursday, November 3rd, 9:00 a.m. in a very cold classroom. The first two sessions, "Teaching Beginners" and "Calling Mountain Dances" were a lot of talk and very little participation, all in all an uninteresting morning and not at all what would be expected from experienced teachers. It was revealed a short time later that we all, including the instructors, had been "set up" and were experiencing some of the improper ways to teach a class. The element of fun, (the reason most people attend clogging classes), had purposely been left out of these two presentations, thereby letting us see firsthand how it feels to be uncomfortable, uninspired, and unsure if you wished to continue for the remainder of the course. That first session was the last in which we were bored.

The Academy of Teaching was sponsored by the National Clogging and Hoedown Council in association with C. L. O. G., The National Clogging Leaders Organization. It was held simultaneously with the NCHC Fall Meeting, but treated as a separate function. Some of the other subjects covered were Teaching Intermediate and Advanced Cloggers, Teaching Mountain Figures, Team Organization and Management, and Critiqueing of Instructors; twenty hours of work packed into two days. A Saturday bonus provided by the NCHC was a training session for judges, team directors, and anyone interested in a study of the guidelines used in NCHC sanctioned competitions. In addition to the Academy offerings, a careful study of schedules and a few quick sprints between classrooms, allowed one to attend some of the variety of workshops provided by the NCHC. These included advanced stepwork, the English Clog, the Irish Clog, and the Hambone (described by someone as a brief course in self abuse).

NCHC and CLOG are both national organizations with like purposes, one of which is the promotion and continuation of clog dancing, but they work toward their goals in different ways. NCHC is more conservative and stresses a preservation of the heritage of Appalachian Style dancing with movements and figures being the key to the dance, where as the more progressive CLOG attempts to promote clogging in any way possible, whether it be

with line dances, group dances, or freestyle. (It was interesting to note that with the exceptions of two exhibitions, during ten hours of dance time over three evenings, only one line dance was performed. Dancers from Florida would not be thrilled).

Overall, the Academy of Teaching, together with the NCHC workshops provided an excellent learning experience. (Academy of Learning might be a better title). My original conception of the Academy was that I would be asked to teach something to the class, be critiqued on my teaching ability, and given suggestions for improvement. Considering the number of students in the class, that would have taken up more than two-thirds of the course time, even if everyone taught only twenty minutes, and how well can someone be critiqued outside their own classroom for twenty minutes of teaching anyway. (Still, we in Florida attempt to initiate all new instructors in this manner. Perhaps we should consider an "Academy" of our own).

The biggest benefit that most instructors with whom I talked got from their opportunity was a confidence in their own teaching abilities and the realization that the methods they had been using all along were not to far off the beaten track. No attempt was made to get everyone to teach exactly alike, but rather the vast array of talent and information that was provided allowed each individual to pick and choose that which would work best for them, to "get the job done, and make it fun". The Academy of Teaching is an experience worth repeating. I think, twelve hour dri zzzzzzzzzzzz (there I go thinking again), I'll go back, even if it is a

Since a number of Beginners Clogging Classes are just starting, we would like to offer some advice on Clogging shoes. Low heeled, lace-up or buckle shoes that will not slip off your feet are the best. Hard soles, such as composite, neoprene or other man-made substances are acceptable, but the best sole choice is real leather.

We recommend solid taps for the beginner, fitted in sizes equivalent to your shoe size. This tap gives a simple, clear sound which makes it easier to learn the steps. When a Clogger becomes more advanced he may choose to switch to a jingle tap. This tap gives a metalagainst-metal sound, a "clacking" sound. In future articles we will cover styles of dancing and floor surfaces and their effect on taps, care of

There was no doubt in my mind as to who was going to walk off that stage as The Grand Overall Champion. Three weeks before I had seen the same team receive The National Clogging and Hoedown Council 1983 - National Champion Trophy at Fontana Village in North Carolina. How could the judges pick anyone else. The style, precision, and speed with which they had performed their routines was unbelievable. At 11:45 pm on Saturday night, (an hour and a half behind schedule), the trophy was presented to The Pride and Joy Cloggers from Salsberry, Indiana. They had driven twenty-two hours, (on their own personal bus), to get to St. Petersburg, and they planned to leave sometime in the early morning hours to go home. As you looked at the directors face, you knew, (that to her at least), they had lived up to their name. Pride and Joy was one of forty-three teams competing in the Second SPIFFS (St. Petersburg International Folk Fair Society) Clogging Competition, held over the Thanksgiving weekend. Of the forty-three teams entered, thirteen were from Florida.

After opening ceremonies on Friday morning, the activities began with open team and line competition. An open team does the same type routine, (four, eight, or more couple precision), as a traditional team, the exception being that the team may be composed of all girls, all boys, or an uneven mixture of each. This category was established to give teams in areas where not enough boys are available, (who doesn't have that problem), to form a traditional team, the chance to compete. Some variations are allowed in figures and composition, but overall it is a "mountain style" category. The overall point winner in this category was The Gold Coast Cloggers from Ft. Lauderdale, a good showing for this Florida Group.

Line competition is not sanctioned by the NCHC, (no points are given toward the National Trophy), and one can only assume that it is included to get more participation from areas like Florida where line dancing is the most popular type of clogging. In other words, come to the competition, pay your entry fees, and get a small trophy, but don't expect any recognition by the NCHC. That is not to say that some mountain style teams do not dance in this category, they do, and very well. In fact almost every team there, by shifting people around entered as many categories and age groups as they possibly could. The line dance point winners were The Starlite Cloggers from Hepzebah, Georgia. Friday's competition finished an hour ahead of schedule.

Unless you were competing, there was nothing to do all day Saturday but sit and watch. Beginning with solos and duets at 10:00 am, the competition was non-stop until the presentation of awards that night. Four and eight couple precision routines were predominant, although there were categories for Hoedown and Southern Appalachian Traditional dances. Rating the teams on a decimal system prevented any ties and on a range of 110 points maximum, most first place winners were scoring well above 100. Unless you were familiar with the categories in which teams were entered, it was easy to become bored, especially if you did not personally know anyone who was dancing. All the dances look pretty much alike, the variation being the number of dancers and the "set" that is used, and after a while one got tired of hearing the same music used by team after team. But, some teams clearly stood apart. Their overall attitude indicated that they were confident in their abilities to perform, and their electrification of the audience said "winner"

Very seldom in Florida do we see teams dancing at 180 beats per minute. That, however, seemed to be the norm, and even though there was a wooden dance floor to ease the shock, that continuous expending of energy for six minutes of routine took its toll. More than a few dancers had to be carried to their seats due to exhaustion, cramps, and other over exertive reasons. (A Gatorade salesman could have made a fortune). The overall champion, (the team with the highest number of points on a category score sheet), for precision was Pride and Joy; for Southern Appalachian Traditional it was The Flatland Cloggers from Chesapeake, Virginia.

For a Florida team to enter even line competition and hope to place is almost a dream. Even for the nonsanctioned line competition, the judges are still certified by the NCHC and tend to look for a particular style which most of us just do not have. Florida cloggers dance harder and have much more up and down movement than the typical mountain clogger. The "Buck" dancing steps they use give a smooth look in which the dancer seems to be hinged at the waist, legs bent, toes pointed out, the upper part of the body barely moving except when dictated by a particular mountain figure. Until Florida Cloggers develop a smoother style, their ability to win in competition will be limited. Florida Cloggers should attend a "national" competition, if only to watch. They will find a whole new world of style and movement. Line dances are not the only way.

You have to make the good times yourself. Take the little times and make them big times, and save the times that are all right for the ones that aren't so good.

My thoughts go "skittery skattery" this morning. The wind is whistling down the chimney and rain beats a tattoo first on the East side windows, now on the front. A good day to make chili, clean cupboards or write an article. The chili is on the stove, the cupboards can wait!!

Someone recently opined that they thought Clogging had "peaked out"! Kyle Edwards in Maggie Valley, N.C. can document Clogging in their community clear back to the early 1900's. WE can only document back to the early 1970's here in the Orlando area, but it sure doesn't look "peaky" to us!!!

Thea Musgrave, the best known female composer of classical music in the 20th century and an eminently successful operatic composer, was asked to categorize her music. "I hate pigeonholes," she said. "When you classify. . . you put on blinders". Leonard Bernstein is known to enjoy folk music and early instruments such as the auto-hard and dulcimer. 



Dancin' USA Comes to Osceola County

Polish up your two-step, Dancin' U.S.A. is coming to the area.

The Nashville Network show will be shooting 10 shows in Osceola County in late February and will broadcast those shows in mid-March and May.

The show is as if Dick Clark's American Bandstand went country. It features dancers swaying to country and western songs and also features instruction in country dance steps.

The dancers that will appear on the show will be from the area. Two weeks before the shows are taped, scouts will canvass area country and western clubs in search of dancers, said Bill Turner, producer and director of the show.

In addition to those proficient in country and western styles of dance, the show also looks for those who may have never danced a country step.

Those appearing on the nationally televised show will receive dancing instructions to allow them to become more familiar with the show's format.

Included in the 40-person entourage visiting the area is a nine-piece country and western band, two lead singers and four back-up singers.

The Osceola Country shows will represent the third time the producers have taken the show out on the road from the home base in Nashville.

Producers have taped shows in Memphis and in Gatlinburg and are planning to tape more shows on the road. "We get the same dancers in Nashville and the show becomes routine, making it hard to keep the energy up," Turner said.

Taking the show on the road not only benefits the show, but it allows the area where the shows are being taped to increase its exposure.

The show is coming to the area in February to coincide with the Silver Spurs Rodeo. One of the shows will be taped near the rodeo area.

The shows that will be taped in the area will first run at 7 p.m. and be rerun the next day at 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. Five of the shows will be broadcast in March and the remaining five will be broadcast in May.

I have a list, actually a lot of lists, of topics with key words to jog my memory. Some of those lists are 20 years old and when I read them and begin remembering and laughing, I get no writing done at all. If, as my daughter says, my writing helps her to know me better, I wonder what my lists would mean to hear. She'd commit me. All those funny drawings in caves discovered by archeologists are actually early cavewoman's lists. meant two deer and a dinosaur for dinner, meant make new clay pot and a blanket for Uncle George's birthday. If I had homesteaded in Kentucky in the late 1700's the Indians would have run for their lives after seeing my charcoal lists on the birchbark trees!! Listmaking, folks, comes with the package. Like blue eyes or big feet. Doing the items on the lists is irrelevant. The whole point is the high hope, great expectation aspect of making the list. And a list is not just a list; it's an art form. I use most anything - backs of envelopes, the top strip on page three of the classified section, inside my telephone book under Emergency Numbers. My prize is my hymnal from Linden Hall School for Girls - every morning during 8:00 am Chapel I dated and did my list for the day slanted crossways across a hymn in green ink. Things like, "Nov. 7, 1951, see Bumpy and Buttons after class in Gym". Or, "Mar. 1, 1952, Campused for one month. I didn't tell who helped me run the Art Teacher's red nightgown up the

flagpole. Dr. Horne tried not to laugh!" When I am in a precise, today-I'm-gonna-get-a-lotdone mood I use a standard yellow legal pad, and I write very clearly with very small handwriting. The lower right corner starts from the bottom line, two items per line (I meant small) as a grocery and sundries list, and grows from the bottom up to conserve space at the top for very important items. The upper right corner is my do list. It has some permanent items that are put on daily so that I can check something off in the evening — i. e. do laundry, feed dog. I always do those things every day but it's so gratifying to check them off. The entire left side of the paper is for those REALLY, REALLY important things, some of which keep getting transferred to my newest list, like an accountant who "carries the balance forward". For instance - "UPS X'mas package to Carol" shows up on lists dated 11/1, 12/3, 1/22, 2/10 (with four exclamation points) and 3/19. Carol got the package on April Fool's Day. Or the item Pick up Watch — the jeweler has called four times. Nine out of ten, I forget my list when I go to the grocery and have to wing it — which is why we have 11 bottles of catsup on the shelf, and no mustard. But it's fun to check off what I did remember and there are always a few goodies to start a fresh list with. Listmaking builds to a cres-

cendo as I approach Christmas. I always ask the family to make a list of what they each want. This year I promptly misplaced their lists and was embarassed to ask again. It is now January and their lists turned








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
