The Second Annual Possum Holler Workshop held over Easter weekend at Fontana Village, North Carolina was as big a success as the first. (I was there, too.) If you are interested in numbers here they are. 1983 - 600 + Cloggers from 21 states; 1984 - 1,460 Cloggers from over 30 states and Canada. It can't

over 30 states and Canada. It can't get much bigger, the hall won't hold many more, and they will be hard pressed to make it any better.

The Possum Trot Cloggers seem to be able to attract the finest teaching personnel from all over the country to help with their workshops. Participating at Possum Holler were Bill Nichols, Burton Edwards, Shelia Popwell, Garland Steele, Chris Rawls, and a dozen other instructors who taught and talked clogging for two and a half days. There were seminars on competition, mountain dance calling, writing line routines, and even a brief session on break dancing. Blue Highways

Several months ago I happened upon an old dog-eared copy of Steinbecks' "Travels with Charley". It became my "kitchen table" book for a time. (I usually have 3 or 4 books in process at a time, strategically scattered in various rooms where I might have a moment to snatch a chapter or two.) It bores me to explain the premise of a book, however if you are to understand this article, I'm forced to say that Steinbeck with his Poodle-"Charley" set out in a truck/cum/van to see America! He eloquently describes the yearning of those he meets to do the same! Me too! We've always called it my "bear that went over the Mountain to see what he could see" phobia!

Currently on the newsstands is a paper-back titled "Blue Highways" by William Least Heat Moon. A front-piece medallion

announces "34 weeks on The New York Times best-seller list", which leads me to believe I'm not the only bear. . .!!!

The title comes from old highway maps where the main routes were red and back roads blue. You assume rightly that he takes the blue route and explores backwater boondocks, and the provincials. I'm two-thirds through the book (in Poplar, Montana) and know with certainty that the instant I finish the last paragraph I will flip to the first page and read the book again in a more thorough and leisurely fashion. It is Mr. Moon's first book. He must write more!

This book has crystallized something I feel that has been missing from our accounts of Cloggers and Conventions. Background, climate, topography, foods and "the blue roads".

Crinoline Care

Sooner or later the time comes when you must wash your crinolines, but what is the best way?
We spoke with Barb Holt, owner of King's Kid Corral in Orlando, Florida, and she was able to give us several good tips on washing and caring

of your crinolines.


Be extremely careful of the detergent you use. Do not use anything that has a fabric softener - it causes the crinoline to go from fluffy to flat! The best product to use is dish-washer detergent, which can also be used in the washing machine.

If you are only washing one crinoline, Barb suggested adding a few blouses or other fine washable items as a buffer. Depending on your different washing cycles and settings, it is recommended that you use a fine setting or gentle

setting for a very short wash cycle.

When machine drying your crinoline, it is best to use a permanent press cycle and only dry it for approximately 10 to 15 minutes. If the waistband or upper part is still a bit damp, put it on a hanger until it is dry. But, NEVER store your crinoline on a hanger - this may cause stretching.

When your crinoline is ready to be stored, roll it up tightly and place on its side. Never store it in a plastic container, since plastic retains moisture. (Plastic crinoline bags are great for carrying, but not for storage.) Cloth, paper or cardboard containers are much better suited to keep your crinoline fresh and dry. (An old pillow case or large paper bag are perfect!)

The <u>sun</u> will shine at the <u>National</u> Convention, we will be there! So will "Oomie Goomie" and Aunt Fanny!!!!



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
EASTER WEEKEND (Continued from Page 1)

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Timely Tips for Clogging Instructors



Last month we wrote about "The Many Hats of a Clogging Instructor" and how we as dancers and supporters could help preserve the sanity of our multi-talented Leaders.

This month we are going to stick our necks way out and suggest ways that our Instructors can help us. We have been quietly interviewing dancers, support personnel, parents and relatives, and casual first-time spectators. Additionally, we have talked to those in charge of obtaining Cloggers for performances, both before the event and afterwards.

- 1. TREAT ALL YOU MEET WITH COURTESY AND RESPECT. NEVER say anything derogatory about a dancer, Instructor, Club or any Clogging effort in public. Smile and keep your thoughts to yourself. If you can, say something complimentary, and if you can't find anything pleasant to say, be silent. You, as an Instructor are always "on stage". Your actions and attitudes will be copied by your dancers. If you are generous, gregarious, and diplomatic, your whole Club will be known for those qualities.
- 2. (This from Shelia Popwell) LET YOUR DANCERS KNOW IN THE VERY BEGINNING, THE TYPE OF CLUB YOU HOPE TO HAVE. From Precision Exhibition, with try-outs, travel and lots of practice, to a purely Fun Level Club, with anything in between, DO state YOUR objectives. Also clearly state your Club policies with regard to visiting other Clubs, multi-Club Membership, performing with other Clubs; or with other Clubs visiting, belonging or performing with YOUR group. If someone leaves your Club to join another, wish them well and Smile!! You don't own your Dancers. Perhaps, if this happens often, some self examination is necessary. If they leave with a comfortable feeling, they may be back. Additionally, your Club policies may need some revision.
- 3. TEACH TO THE MEDIAN LEVEL OF YOUR GROUP. Pull up the slower dancers, hold back the faster ones. When you teach to the really "quicker-picker-uppers" the rest of the group will become discouraged.

- 4. NEVER CHASTIZE, CORRECT OR EMBARRASS AN INDIVIDUAL DANCER ON THE MICROPHONE. Take them aside quietly for any problem that might occur.
- 5. DO NOT ALLOW YOUR EXHIBITION TEAM OR CLOSEST FRIENDS TO BECOME A "CLIQUE" OR MONOPOLIZE YOUR TIME. You are the Instructor for the whole Club. Insist that they become Club Ambassadors and that they "mix and mingle".
- 6. KEEP YOUR TEACHING SESSIONS BRISK AND LIVELY. Poor jokes or long-winded lectures will soon have your audience embarrassed or restless, and guests who are visiting will probably not come back. Some Instructors become enamoured of their own voices on the microphone. ASK FOR and ACCEPT GRACIOUSLY critiqueing of your microphone technique EVEN IF YOU'VE BEEN TEACHING FOR YEARS!!!
- 7. TAKE BREAKS REGULARLY. If you keep your dancers on the floor for long periods of time with no breaks, you'll lose 'em. An Exhibition Team might be able to handle a long practice, but they will probably absorb more if you give them a "breather".
- 8. BE PERSONALLY NEAT AND WELL GROOMED. You will feel better, and most likely your dancers will follow your lead. If you plan to visit another Club, or attend a Convention, find out their dress code and follow it!
- 9. DO YOUR HOMEWORK. Review before class, make lesson plans, keep up with current material.
- 10. SPORTSMANSHIP If you are a winner be gracious and humble. If you "lose" don't whine or complain. There are all kinds of competitions some involve score sheets and trophies, some involve a fancied title. If you and your dancers Clog for the love of Clogging, it will show. There will always be better or worse than you, in any area in which you choose to compete, but if you are friendly and applaud everyone as you wish to be applauded, you will always be a WINNER!
- 11. BE PROFESSIONAL AND THOROUGH IN YOUR DEALINGS WITH THOSE WHO WANT TO "BOOK" YOU FOR A PERFORMANCE (We will have an entire article on this subject by a Guest Columnist in our July issue!)

CLOGGING IS A JOYOUS EXPERIENCE! GOOD MANNERS NEVER GO OUT OF STYLE! TREAT OTHERS AS YOU WISH TO BE TREATED!!!!!!!



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

other on good performances.




The headline above heralded an article in The Des Moines Register, Wednesday, March 21, 1984, written by Elizabeth Flansberg, Register Staff Writer. (Proving the adage "Clogging is caught not taught" true, as a result of her assignment, Ms. Flansberg is in the process of

enrolling in a Clogging class!)

Iowa, named after the North American Indian tribe, is a land of gently undulating terrain or level prairie. The extreme northeastern section is characterized by steep river gorges, and the western region is quite hilly. Agriculture and food processing are among Iowas primary industries. Summer temperatures range from 65° to 85° in July, in Winter, January's average temperatures range from 11° to 27°. Snowfall varies from 20" in the southeast to 35-45" in the north. Summer thunderstorms occasionally bring hail and high winds. Tornado season has its peak in May and June.

Iowa is a neatly square state, bordered entirely on the east by the Mississippi River and on the west by the Missouri and Big Sioux Rivers. Its population in the 1970 census was roughly 2,800,000 residents - 98% of whom are native born Iowans. Des Moines is about an inch shy, (on the map), of being squarely in the center of a square state. It is the largest city in the state and

is the State Capitol.




THE SUGAR CREEK CLOGGERS

Joey Van Horn, the 18 year old Director of Sugar Creek Cloggers, Des Moines, reports that there are now three clogging groups in the Des Moines area, with about 10 groups totally, statewide. The Iowa Clogging Association, with Sugar Creek as the Sugar's hosts, will hold its 6th Annual Clogging Convention, October 20, 1984, at the Y.W.C.A. in Des Moines. This will be the first year I.C.A. has invited out of state clog-They have expanded the hours from 4 hours to 12 hours, and added two competition categories; Duet and Freestyle. Competition is relatively new in the Iowa area. Joey said that approximately 100 cloggers (of the 150 statewide) have attended the Convention in the past. They advertise Clogging Squares as a regular feature of their

Convention, from which we conclude that many of their cloggers Square Dance. (Alas, Joey, such is not the case here in Florida, though we are beginning to learn some Mountain Style calls!!)

Cloggers travelling through Iowa will find that mid-Westerners are friendly people, and Joey Van Horn in Des Moines would be a good contact for Clogging! His enthusiasm and four page letters are marvelous!!

THAT IS CLOGGING!

FUN BARS

Many of our readers have asked about Banner Stealing! How to set it up, how to go about doing it, when it should be done, etc. Since it is a custom practiced by Square Dancers, we checked several publications and were able to find an article on Banner Stealing in the May 1984 issue of Bow & Swing.

According to the article in Bow & Swing "there have been no official rules set forth by any state association, and certain areas have their own local customs concerning banners.

It is our recommendation that at least 8 paying club members or more attend a club's regular dance to steal or retrieve a banner. There should be no stealing or retrieving at special Ticket dances. It takes one visit to steal and another to retrieve.

In the event your banner is not available, a club token will be given to the bandit club, (such as the Instructor's or Director's pants or

petti pants).

A phone call to the club being visited for stealing or retrieving is always appreciated by the host club, so that they may be sure to have their banner (or a club token) on hand.

A club that steals a banner must hold it until the owner club retrives it. However, if a long period of time has passed and a club is still holding a banner, all reasonable effort should be made to return the banner to its proper club.

We also recommend that no club shall be entitled to another club's banner when said club regularly dances on the same night as the host club, unless special arrangements have been made between the host club and bandit club.

A raiding member should have on the raiding club's badge and pay guest admission to the host club. A free ticket or pass for admission from the host club will be honored for stealing or retrieving.

As a courtesy, try not to travel more than 50 miles to steal a banner. It may be difficult

for the raided club to retrieve.

BANNER STEALING SHOULD BE FUN! New friends are made, horizons are widened, and both the raider club and the raided club benefit.

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

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
