

SPRINGTIME TALLAHASSEE

Your Editor has been accused of playing the "numbers" game. The "numbers" are quoted not to impress, but because WE are impressed!! Consider the Jamborees and Conventions carefully. They are not designed to teach vast numbers of brand new Beginner cloggers, and for the most part have little to offer all but the most enthusiastic new Intermediate clogger. Therefore a Convention depends on all those dedicated Instructors diligently teaching away week after week in garages, basements, recreation rooms, Civic Halls, schools and churches. As Clubs and Classes increase in size (and overhead) so do the Conventions and Jamborees. Perhaps because we correspond with cloggers all over the United States, we can see a wider view.

The "grass roots" Instructor teaches and promotes clogging in a relatively small geographic area. Shirley Walters said that 20 years ago Big John had the only clogging classes in the Atlanta, Georgia area, and now there are dozens of clubs there. As little as 12 years ago there was only one small teen clogging group in the Central Florida area, and now eight of those cloggers (that we know of) teach clogging. Carole Hollis stated that she has been watching this clogging explosion for a dozen years.

We truly don't believe that years ago this dance was a closely guarded secret, done only in Asheville, North Carolina! But we do believe that Les Gotcher touched upon one avenue of wider acceptance when he said, "the line method of teaching opened clogging to more dancers."

Another growth factor is the change in attitudes about Country music. "I Was Country When Country Wasn't Cool" about says it all. As late as the 50's in so-called couth circles, one did NOT state they liked Country music. You could swoon for Frankie, or scream for Elvis, but you could not admit you liked Red Foley or the Carter Family. Joan Baez and Peter, Paul and Mary were acceptable but were labelled Folk Music. When Neimann-Marcus began selling faded designer jeans, my old Levis were finally IN, and strangely enough so was Country music.

Clogging is not a dance phenomenon like the Twist or Jitterbug or Charleston. Were there widespread Twist Clubs? The obvious differences, we feel, is the Family concept which permeates into our Clogging Clubs. Everyone who frequents the clogging hall, dancer and non-dancer, is included in the Fun. It actually becomes a wider family unit and ultimately a way of life.

When those little geographic circles begin to overlap, when two or more groups get together to dance, when a clogging program is added to a State Square and Round Dance Convention; when one or two Clubs decide to invite lots of Clubs to a Jamboree; when a group of Instructors and/or dancers decide to form a State Association; when a group of State Associations decide to form or join a National Association; we'll quote numbers loud and clear!!!!

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Freestyle Clogging

Butch Antone, Instructor for the Panhandle Cloggers, Pensacola, Florida, has put together a pamphlet on Free Style Clogging, intended to assist the Clogger who is accustomed to memorized routines. He states that it is a very basic introduction using some steps which can be done in 8 or 16 beats of music, and he suggests ways to either retain weight on the same foot, or change weight through 2 or 4 beats of music. His introduction is designed to make a Clogger feel more confident about Free Styling, and ultimately to want to learn more through experimentation and practice.

Let's say you have decided to do the "Sam Step" (described in the step section). The music is going and you're doing a couple of basics to warm up. Now you're ready! Listen to the music and have an idea of when you want to start. You need your weight on the correct foot in order to start.

Here are samples of things you can do. You have 4 beats of music to go and realize your weight is already on the correct foot,

DON'T PANIC!

lust do one of these:

2 Basics

1 Basic and 1 Double Step Brush Slide

1 Fancy Double DS-DS-RS-RS

or simply

4 Double Steps

All of these will keep the weight on the same foot through 4 beats of music.

Let's take the same set-up with 4 beats of music to go but you are on the wrong foot,

DON'T PANIC!

Just do one of these:

1 Basic and 2 Double Steps 1 Triple DS-DS-DS-RS

1 Push Off DS-RS-RS-RS

All of the above will change weight in 4 beats of music.

You have completed your step and are relaxed with a basic, when suddenly a brain storm hits you. You remember a step you just can't wait to try again. You have 2 beats of music to go and weight is on the correct foot.

DON'T PANIC!

Do one of these:

2 Double Toes

2 Double Steps

The above will keep weight on the same foot through 2 beats of music.

You're feeling pretty good. You are ready now and have decided to "strut your stuff". You have 2 beats of music to go and you're on the wrong foot.

DON'T PANIC!

Do one of these:

1 Basic

Double-Toe Double-Step Double-Step Brush Slide

The above will change weight in 2 beats of music.

I hope I haven't confused you. If you can get the basic idea that free styling is a "do your own thing" dance then you are only limited by the number of steps you are willing to try.

I think you'll have fun with this and I hope you enjoy dancing it as much as I enjoy teaching it.

BE CREATIVE - AND THEN - SHARE IT!

You will notice that the steps I have included are graded: (B) (I) (A) This is my own system and in no way reflects the step. This is how my grading is set up.

BASIC (B) - These are steps done only with the 8 basic steps of clogging in their original form.

INTERMEDIATE (I) - These are steps done with the 8 basic steps of clogging but with turns of 90° (¼ turns) or less, hops with no turns, or hesitations in the count.

ADVANCED (A) - These are steps done with the 8 basic steps of clogging but with hops or jump turns of 180° (½ turns) or more, or a step that has unusual execution or timing.

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BUCK DANCIN'

FOCUSING ON SOLO COMPETITION

Editors Note: Those folks who have been involved in clogging competitions for many years will find these articles very basic. We have appealed to Judges and Competition Organizers for some further written information.

We imagine that it's like riding a bike. WE know how, but we can't explain how to do it to a new bike rider.

We asked Scotty about specifically WHAT one does out there on the dance floor. Basically it is spontaneous Free Style clogging. He indicated that a Judge will almost always pick up a memorized routine and take off points. The key to preparation for Free Style is learning many, many steps and the practice of smooth flowing sequences. [See Butch Antone's article on How to begin Freestyle.] The music used at most competitions is traditional country or bluegrass, mostly records, but may be a live band; the dancers do not provide their own music. Scotty indicates he listens to the music, and mentally cues himself to rapidly change step sequences. Too much speed can be as bad as too little. The key words here would probably be smooth flowing. Additionally, some areas like high kicks and some do not. We suggest observing a few competitions and the winners before actually entering.

Solo Competition is one of many categories offered at most competitions for any age group. Ranging from toddlers to youthful seniors. The purpose of this event is to award those who excel beyond the average dancer. It is usually conducted as follows:

Before the solos start, all the dancers in a particular age category line up and are divided into groups of 7 or 8 dancers. Each group moves to the dance floor, Free Styles in a circle one time around. The line reforms and all stop dancing as each individual steps out for a short rise and shine. When that entire age category is completed, the judges may have call backs and the procedure is repeated until a winner is named. Later, after all age categories have a clear winner, those winners will compete for the winning female and winning male, and ultimately Best Overall Individual.

In this article I am going to try to explain all the points involved in solo competition. I am not, however, saying that I know everything, and that by following these suggestions you will win. I am merely trying to point out some helpful hints that judges have passed on to me.

At any competition, practice a good sportsmanship attitude. A judge not only judges a person on their dancing ability but also on their attitude toward other dancers.

Never be intimidated by any other dancer, because Page 8

he/she is <u>not</u> unbeatable. If you have the urge to win and are determined to do so, you will make a better appearance.

When the call is made for all solo competitors to line up to be numbered, be there and be ready. The smoother the operation, the happier the judges will probably be.

Before you are lined up and sent out on the floor to dance, try to get into the third or fourth position, because that way you can catch some rest before your rise and shine, plus look over previous dancers and try not to repeat steps that they have already done.

When dancing in the circle with other dancers before and after the rise and shine segment NEVER turn your back to the judge. A judge likes to see a contestants face. Ignoring this rule can make the difference between winning and losing.

Practice dancing for long periods of time and stay in shape, because if you make call backs, you might end up dancing for 8 minutes or longer.

Wear a comfortable outfit. If your clothes are uncomfortable it will affect your dancing enthusiasm, which becomes critical in close situations.

When finished dancing, congratulate the other dancers and wish them well in the final results.

I hope that these tips will aid anyone who is thinking about entering into competition. If there are still any unanswered questions, write to me in care of The Double Toe Times and I will answer them in my next article.


FLORIDA CLOGGING COUNCIL

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
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
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

"BURTON'S CROSS-OVER"

(I) 16 Beats Left Foot Lead

DT-DT-DT-(L) TOE (XIB)-(R) HEEL-(L) HEEL (Turning ¼ Left) (R) HEEL (Turning ¼ Left) - BR-SL DSRS (This ends 8 beats) DSRS-DSRS-DS-DS-DS-RS (Turning ½ on the 3 DS's)

Remember that all of the steps you learned in classes will work in free styling. Also the steps that are in your favorite dance routines. The steps I am talking about are steps such as: Push-Offs, Basics, Triples, Doubles, "The Jane Step", Cross Over Vine, and so on. Relax and don't be afraid to try any of these steps.

If you should happen to mess up, start basics again until you're ready to try another step. Practice is the most important word in clogging.



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CLOGGERS SPECIAL

(Continued from last month)

Last month I gave you two figures, "Ring and a Star" and "Tea-Cup Chain". This month we will add a couple of more figures to that and keep this one thing in mind. You cannot hash call to cloggers. The clogging makes so much noise that dancers would miss your calls, so you must use figures that they have memorized. Actually, they are not dancing to your calling — you are calling to their dancing. So much for that. Let's get going on other figures to use.

I am not going to give a lot of instructions to this one because you, as a caller, should be able to figure it out,

One & Three make a Right Hand Star
Make a full turn from where you are —
Star by the left with the outside two
Turn once around — that's all you'll do
Back to the center with a Right Hand Star
Turn once and a quarter from where you are
Now the Sides Divide — and Star Thru

Centers Star Left with the outside two
Turn once around — and when you do
Star Right in the center one more time
Go once and a quarter, you're doing fine
Again, the Sides Divide and — Star Thru
Centers Star Left with that outside two
Turn once around — that's all you do —
Star Right in the center, again you two
Those Sides Divide and Star Thru
Centers Star Left with the outside two —
Go one time around and when you do
Star Right in the center now just once more
Sides Divide like you did before —
We're looking for the Corner, Left Allemande
Here we go Right and Left Grand ——

Here the caller can pick it up and add whatever he wants. Not hash, but something that has been memorized by both the dancer and the caller.

Here is an oldie that really is a show-off number. This one I'll have to give you some instructions on as we go along. However, it's easy. Called "Chase the Rabbit, Chase the Squirrel".

Head two couples Lead to the Right Chase the Rabbit, Chase the Squirrel Chase that pretty girl around the world Now Chase the 'Opossum, Chase the Coon, Chase that pretty boy around the room — Now Circle Four on the side of the floor, Circle Four and don't be late — Head Gents break and Circle up 8 —

You can add, Ladles to the Center, Gents Sashay, or whatever you decide you would like to use.

Now we will break those down. First I'll explain how to set up the first one. I call it "Progressive Star Route". We already know that the heads Star Right in the middle, doing a turn and a quarter each time. . . . NOW, on the call, "Sides Divide and Star Thru", the sides do this just like a Grand Square. The sides will face and back away one, two, three, turn. They now walk toward the opposite, meeting in the head positions and they will do a Star Thru. At this point the gent has the ladies left hand in his right hand. He simply makes a Right-face Turn, replaces his right hand with his left hand, and both now have their left hands up ready for the Left Hand Star with the Centers. So much for that. It does take practice.

CHASE THE RABBIT, CHASE THE SQUIRREL. When the call says, "Head Two Couples lead to the right", they do just that. They go out single file with the lady in the lead. They go through that couple, lady in the lead, and turn left and go around the lady. The two Head Ladies meet in the center, catch right forearms, and turn once around. While the ladies are turning once in the center, the Head Gents keep going, and they take the lead. The lady now comes into the action, except that the gent is in the lead, and now they go through the couple and turn RIGHT, gents in the lead. They move around in front of the couple they worked with and now they circle FOUR with that couple. They go one time around and the head gents break and pick up the other two couples and we now have an eight hand circle and the caller can use whatever he wants.

Time your call so that when they go through the couple with the lady in the lead, this is where you use the call, "Chase the Rabbit, Chase the Squirrel". Then when the gents take the lead, make your call fit in and use, "Chase the 'Opossum, Chase the Coon".

You can add these two figures to the other two I have you in March and work them together, adding others that you think will make good clogging.

Try it and have a lot of fun.

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
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ONE MAN'S TRASH

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
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Bruise Cruise

I want to invite you on a cruise. There are no luxurious meals. There are no comfortable state-rooms. There is little time to rest and relax. But, it is one of the most challenging and exciting trips you will ever experience. I am talking about whitewater rafting on the Chattooga River in North Georgia.

The brochure reads this way: "The ultimate challenge for whitewater rafters. This run covers the steepest section of river in the East. The river gorge is wild and remote, cut deeply by the twisting river and its difficult rapids." If you have seen the movie Deliverence, this is the same river. Now, before you call me and say, "Sign me up, sign me up!", let me relate a few experiences of my trips, then see if you still want to go.

It is a foggy and cool 8:30 A.M. People are yawning as a guide gives a mandatory safety lecture. "No one has died on this river while rafting with a commercial outfitter since 1976," he says. "However, there are risks and dangers." A lady in burgandy shorts and a pink Izod shirt, tells her boyfriend that she has changed her mind. They drive out of the parking lot in a Mercedes, tires screaming in the gravel.

The first mile or so of river is sort of a practice session. The guide in each raft demonstrates the different paddling strokes that we will use, (forward, draw, and back strokes. I'm glad I got that canoeing merit badge), then we practice turning the boat as he calls out what to do. You know you are in for a ride when his normal calm manner giving directions becomes a rapid fire series of commands, screamed at the top of his lungs.

We are approaching our first major "experience", Seven Foot Falls. The guide is yelling, "Brace yourselves, Left Draw, ALL FORWARD, HANG ON." The nose of the raft juts out into space, then dips straight down as we drop into a pit of foaming water. My cousin, who two seconds ago was sitting in front of me, has disappeared. Looking to my left I see his head bob up about five feet away. I extend a paddle to him and pull him to the boat. We float to calmer water and he climbs back in. This is his first time on the river. Initiation passed.

Farther down river we stop at Long Creek which flows in from the left. Twenty yards upstream is Long Creek Falls. Dropping some forty feet in a chilling fountain, you can walk behind it "without getting wet". Scotty and I sit down in the spray and enjoy the ice cold water.

Lunch!! Whole wheat bread covered with mayonnaise and mustard, and stacked high with ham, roast
beef, turkey, salami, American cheese, Swiss cheese,
lettuce, tomato, and onion. This is the best sandwich in the world. For dessert we make ourselves a
couple of P B & J sandwiches, topped off with Fig
Newtons, raisins, and peanuts. To drink, water from
a Spring; a little cloudy, but quenching. Lunch is

great but I can't wait for The Dillard House.

In 1983 my raft was the first one through "Corkscrew" rapids so I didn't know what to expect. In 1984 we are last. Standing on the bank I watch as five other rafts go bouncing and bobbing through a torrent of water some sixty feet long. I am getting nervous. The larger seven-man rafts float right on through with no problems, but the five-man rafts, like mine, are getting swamped. We start our run and the guide's shouted directions become muffled by the roar of the water. As we go over a horse shoe shaped drop and plunge into a five foot turbulance at the bottom, I am tossed into the bottom of the raft, which is now filled with water. I struggle to regain my position and feel a paddle swat me in the head. (Fortunately everyone is required to wear a safety helmet). I begin to take a breath only to discover that I am back in the bottom of the raft and underwater. I get a mouthfull of water and silt. We go over another rock with such force that I receive a gash in my leg through the nylon bottom of the raft. In clamer water, we empty out the water and check the raft for damage. My leg is bleeding (slightly), but the raft is in tact.

Another rest area downstream, Deliverence Rock. We are jumping off a sixteen foot high rock into an unknown depth of water. We really know how to try and kill ourselves. At the end of the trip we load rafts and equipment on the bus for the forty five minute ride back to the parking lot. There is very little conversation as most everyone is asleep. Back at the outpost we buy T-Shirts, posters, and pictures. This is a trip we want to remember.

It is 5:30 and the Buckin' Mule Team is eating a "Mule Meal" at The Dillard House. What's a Mule Meal? All you can eat of everything they've got, and iced tea, and believe me after seven hours on the river, we can put the food away.

Still want to go? Give me a call. The Buckin' Mule Team will be challenging the whitewater again in 1985 and you are invited to go. It's a great way to start a fun weekend.

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
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WORKSHOP DIRECTORY

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
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


