
1985 MISSISSIPPI CLOGGING CHAMPIONS DECIDED


First Annual Florida Clogging Council Convention

Held Sunday, May 26, 1985
9 AM - 12 Noon

The primary discussion at this meeting focused on the success on the First FLORIDA CLOGGING COUNCIL STATE CONVENTION. Estimates of 1,200 dancers in attendance were stated, and many positive comments concerning the format of the convention were apparent in the comment sheets that were collected.

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Buck Dancin'

Our BUCK DANCE column for this month is by Mr. Fore man Heard, Director of the Buckin' Mule Mtn. Dance Team, and Editor of The Flop Eared Mule.

BUCK DANCE BACKLASH?

BY: Foreman Heard

The other day I talked with someone from Fort Lauderdale about buck dancing. He knew a little about clogging and had heard someone mention buck dancing. When he questioned an instructor about it. she said that it was totally different from clogging, much harder to do, and her club had decided not to learn it, therefore, she could be of no help. Hence his call to me.

There have been suggestions that "Buck Dancers" and "Cloggers" should not dance in the same category at competitions. Several judges at a recent competition I attended stated that they preferred the old style clogging over buck dancing and would look more favorably on those doing clogging steps. Is there a Buck Dance Backlash?????

I do not consider myself a buck dancer in the way that most people use the word. That is, someone continuously dancing on the balls of the feet and making twice as many sounds per beat as a "normal" clogger would make. I do dance with my knees bent, I do dance partially on my toes and (every once in awhile) hit an extra heel sound. I do occasionally dance at 168 beats per minute, I do let my arms hang loosely by my side, and I do dance "freestyle" at times. But, that and the fact that I dance on a competition team, does not make me a "Buck Dancer". Then on the other hand, people tell me that I look like a buck dancer when I dance. That I will accept. As far as I am concerned, LOOK is everything!

I prefer to think of buck dancing more as a style, rather than a step. Because of the bent knee, buck dancers lack the up and down motion, and therefore look different. But, there is nothing secretive about the extra sounds of the feet and the speed. As Scott said in a previous article, it takes PRACTICE. Even your single basics done with bent knees will make your style look different.

There are many people who are turned off to buck dancing, possibly because they couldn't get it on the first try. That's too bad. I didn't get it on the first try either. As a matter-of-fact, I still haven't got The Steps, but I have gotten most of the style. If there is a backlash against buck dancing, it may be for nothing. Buck dancing and clogging are the same dance in my opinion. A different look, a different sound, but they are both the same dance. Buck dancers just practice a little more on their own and are determined to be the best they can be. If judges and instructors find that unworthy of consideration, then they are short changing the dancers and themselves.



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


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


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LEGACY



Frank and Nan Habersberger (above) were the General Chairmen for the 1985 Florida State Square and Round Dance Convention. We are printing their very gracious letter in its entirety. Their interest, concern and genuine love for all folks at the 32nd Square and Round Dance Convention was, and is, apparent. It was a pleasure and a privilege to work with them and we hope that if they need us again they will not hesitate to call.

LEGACY (a non-profit organization) is an "International assembly of 'Trustees' of the Square Dance Activity" and held LEGACY VII in Philadelphia, PA, May 9-12, 1985. 156 Trustees, each paying their own way, attended this Convention to work for the betterment of square dancing. This group is attempting to have the Square Dance Family designated the American Folk Dance of the United States. Much thanks must go to Frank and Nan who were the initiators of adding Clogging to the Square Dance Family. Additionally LEGACY has completed a dancer survey which netted 7,584 completed survey forms, designed to measure dancers needs, learn what makes things tick and feel the pulse of the activity. We have written to Dick and Jan Brown, Bellvue, Nebraska for a copy of the original survey and the National Results, with an eye to adapting the survey to Clogging. The fact that LEGACY has included Clogging under the umbrella of the Square Dance Family in no way obligates any Clogger or Clogging Association. Your Double Toe Times Editors feel that the large

majority vote in the passage of this Motion is evidence that Clogging has strong supporters among the Square and Round dance community. It behooves us to assist in the National Campaign to have the Square Dance Family designated the American Folk Dance by Congress, and we ask Mr. and Mrs. Habersberger to keep us apprised on how we can help.



"Nan and I are Trustees of LEGACY and members of their Committee for having the Square Dance designated the "American Folk Dance" of the United States. While attending the May 11th meeting of this International Service Organization in Philadelphia, we reviewed the value, for good publicity, support and fellowship, of having it clearly understood by all involved, just which Dance groups were included under the umbrella of the "Square Dance." Nan and I felt that it should be a matter of record as to just who these groups are, and that a vote of acceptance, support and recording same by LEGACY, would be a valuable asset to the National Committee when it renews its Campaign this Fall. With the unanimous approval of the sub-Committee, we placed the following Motion before the full Board of Trustees of LEGACY Sunday morning, May 12, 1985."

"'Let it be resolved that paragraph 3 of the 1975 Resolution under "The Dance", be changed to read: "That we recognize that Square Dancing, Round Dancing, Line Dancing, Contra Dancing and Clogging are all members of the Family of Square Dancing known as the American Folk Dance.""

"The motion was passed with a large majority vote."

"It should be borne in mind that this Resolution is based solely on the Cultural beginnings of the above groups and that the development of each style is purely American, though the earlier forms were brought to America by the early immigrants. We are all related to each other culturally by steps and movements that we share in common. There is no Administrative link expressed or implied, and the Constitution and By-Laws of each of the above "Cultural Members" applies only to its own membership and cannot be applied or imposed upon another Dance Group."

"The objective of this Resolution is to give recognition to all five Cultural Groups under the umbrella of the "Square Dance" and to apply all possible support in the upcoming renewal of the National Campaign this Fall. The Bill, when proposed, will again list all five Cultural Groups as shown in the LEGACY Resolution and that will provide credibility and support in the renewed Campaign."

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

SPECIAL REPORT

Proposed Clog Council National Competition

I would like to propose a (true) nation-wide clog competition whereby the following structure would apply:

For example, we in the Colorado State Council could send our winners to a central location for a Tri-State Council competition possibly made up of Colorado, Kansas, and Nebraska, and the winners from that go to a Regional competition possibly made up of the Mountain States area, and the winners of that continuing on to the National (TO BE HELD IN CENTRAL KANSAS!)

NATIONAL CLOG COUNCIL COMPETITION (Representative judges selected by each Regional Judges' Panel)

REGIONAL CLOG COUNCIL COMPETITION (Representative judges selected by each Tri-State Judges' Panel)

TRI-STATE CLOG COUNCIL COMPETITION (Representative judges selected by each state Judges' Panel)

STATE CLOG COUNCIL COMPETITION (Judges panel made up of persons from your own area — preferably those who have competed themselves previously or judged)

This particular system would enable all parts of the nation to participate beginning at their local State Council and progressing up from State Council to Tri-State and on up to a Regional and, finally, the National level.

Each Council could assist in the funding required of their winning groups to travel on up to the next level of competition either funding directly from their treasuries or holding fund raisers as a Council project for this purpose. Something such as this might boost a Council's membership in order for them to compete.

Also using selected judges from the State panel to go on to the Tri-State and using selected judges from the Tri-State panel to go on to the Regional and using Regional selected judges to go on to the National would help alleviate regional styles of clogging having an advantage (such as buck vs. rhythm/cadence).

Of course this is an overly simplified version of the whole procedure, and there'd be a lot of details that would have to be ironed out, but see what you all think — would it be something feasible. As it stands now, the world, universal, national, etc., competitions appear to be very regionalized (the only participation is by those who live nearby or those who have the funding available to them to participate). Even if it were just a single or a duet versus an entire team being sponsored by a State Council, it would be a better representation than what there has been in the past (for a true nationwide competition). Would like to hear from everyone out there.

In other words, it'd be nice to find the true clog talent of the U.S. based on a nationwide representation of judges and a nationwide representation of cloggers.

(Editors Note: This proposal has merit we think and is perhaps something we could work on toward presenting at the National CLOG Convention or NCHC Meeting. This type competition channel would work rather like the "Olympics" for athletes, or the "Miss America" contest. Of course, this proposed national competition plan would not eliminate all the local/regional/area competitions, but it would provide truly national competition winners, as we see it. We would like to hear from our other readers on this subject. What do you think?)

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
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
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

SYLLABUS - Plural SYLLABUSI - 1) a Greyhound bus filled with "silly" cloggers. 2) a printed Convention program filled with local ads for Beauty Salons (closed during Convention weekend), hubcap salesmen (stolen from your very own car), Insurance Agents (who will insure your hubcaps at your next Convention) and other local Clogging supporters. Most syllabusi contain a map of the Convention Center - though it makes little different which map of which Convention Center, since a syllabus is normally carried folded under the left armpit, and the map is "glowed" away. 97.4% of a syllabus contains Cheat Sheets (See Cheat Sheets - June issue). Syllabusi have grown so large that they will soon be sold by the pound, making it difficult to decide between a syllabus or paying your motel bill. 96.7% of the 97.4% Cheat Sheet routines will never be seen or heard after the Convention. Several methods of obtaining the most for your money would be: a) have your entire Club chip in to purchase one syllabus and after the convention, have a Club member copy it on his/her office copy machine. b) ask to borrow someones syllabus to read in the restroom. Tear out popular routines, return balance of syllabus to owner. c) wait until after the convention and order a syllabus at half price from Rockin' Rhythms/Listening Post, or d) watch for a forgotten syllabus (with no name on it) on a chair. Sit on it. Later, clearly write your name, address, phone number and three major credit card numbers in the upper right hand corner.

Note to Chairperson of Syllabusi: It has been suggested by seasoned Convention goers that all Cheat Sheets be printed exactly as they are received i.e. on backs of old envelopes, in pencil or pen, on a dirty closed key (eo) typewriter, with misspellings and grammatical errors intact. Also for the sake of variety, even though that particular Convention is part of a particular Association which uses particular terminology, do include routines written in a totally foreign terminology. That way dancers could immediately eliminate many segments of the Convention and relax over their coffee and Danish by the pool. Additionally all syllabusi could be printed in non-photographic pale blue, preventing reproduction of same. Please be sure to include a LARGE section on Mountain Style. It would be wise to have a large section for EACH Mountain Style caller, because no two do them alike. It might even be a good idea to sell two syllabusi - one WITH Mountain Style, and a much thinner one (at a reduced rate) without Mountain Style. Save the WITH's for next year! and the year after that, and the year after that!

Since the impressiveness of a Convention seems to be partially determined by the size, thickness, and number of pages in the syllabus, insist that large type be used, triple spaced, and each routine should be two or preferably three pages long.

<u>Do</u> include many Copyrighted Routines. This will give your Attorney lots of business during the coming year, (also see Videos) and maybe next year he'll take a full page ad in the syllabus (the one "without").

Ads in the Instructors Business Card Directory will cost \$7.50 per month, payable for 6 months at a time - \$45.00. They will be divided by State.

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


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
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
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
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
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


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
