


# FONTANA UNIVERSAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Scores are available quickly and winners receive their trophies in a short time.


#### **UPDATE:**

So people who know me are not too shocked and surprised



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
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# A DOG FOR ALL SEASONS



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### ANGELING IS GOOD FOR THE SPIRIT!

One of the greatest experiences a dancer can have is to help angel a beginners class and watch these people develop into accomplished dancers. We must constantly repopulate our activity and only through the act of parenting can this be accomplished.

Through the process of being an angel we also review many of the basics that may not be used frequently. This strengthens our own dancing abliity which is extremely important.

Angeling also develops a great amount of patience within us. It's always humbling to retrospect our own beginner days and remember the difficulty we felt. To develop this patience there are a few thoughts to consider. The caller is directing a group with four different capabilities -- 1) the already experienced dancer, 2) the beginner that is exceptional in learning ability, 3) the beginner that requires an average amount of instruction, and 4) the beginner that needs that little bit extra "hands on" treatment. This is a very tough audience to please. Basically, the caller must call and teach to the largest portion which is usually the "average group" but patience comes into play when when the little bit of "hands on" treatment is given. The "average" person requires a repetition of 100 times before a move becomes automatic. Through this repetition and TLC a very large group of beginners can become very good dancers. Be patient and give each one a chance. This "helping hand" can make a difference in your club and they'll love you for it.

While being a good angle follow these 10 COMMANDMENTS and you can't go wrong:

- 1. Thou shalt smile with love because all those dancers love the activity as much as you do.
- 2. Thou shalt say only nice things or say nothing at all.
- 3. Thou shalt help the caller by always being in your position when you are suppose to be and often acting dumb and blind to the student's mistakes so that the caller will see the students for what they cany really do on their own.
- 4. Thou shalt encourage and support the students especially in times of frustration.
- 5. Thou shalt not talk in the square while the caller is instruction.
- 6. Thous shalt approach the caller with any known problems -- not the other dancers.
- 7. Thou shalt not push, pull, spindle, or mutilate another dancer.
- 8. Thou shalt not point a finger at anyone because no one came into this activity to be criticized. We must all consider ourselves to be living in a glass house.
- 9. Thou shalt be patient with all dancers and appreciate them for who they are and what they are contributing.
- 10. AND MOST IMPORTANT -- THOU SHALT LIVE DAILY BY THE FOLLOWING PHILOSOPHY:

"The most important thing in life is ATTITUDE! Anything done with the wrong attitude is sure to fail. Power can corrupt attitude and only you can change it. You hold the ability to determine failure or success for the entire group -- so use your power wisely and descreetly -- but most of all,

#### BE POSITIVE !!
