

In every Club there will be a few who WILL be excited about solos, duos, or duets and ultimately a four or eight couple team will emerge, with or without the Instructor! Wouldn't it be more fun to join them? This workshop is for ANYONE who is interested in learning.

A word about The River Ranch Resort. "The Largest Western Resort in the Southeastern United States" is their claim. 

RATING INDIVIDUAL COMPETITORS



A student came up to me the other day and asked about individual competition. She wanted to know what the judges look for when an individual "rises and shines". I began by telling her about my experience as a competitor. As I continued to talk I realized that the systems used to judge individuals are often not explicit, not very easy to articulate, and are additionally subjective. So I am going to take the plunge and attempt to identify characteristics of individual freestyling which I consider important for judges to rate and for festival directors to include on a judging sheet.

Grace: The effortlessness and smoothness with

which steps and movements are per-

formed

Enthusiasm: The amount of excitement generated

by the dancer.

Posture: How does the individual carry him or

herself.

Versatility: The variety of steps, styling, and

movement shown by the dancer.

Contact: Audience contact made while dancing.

Rhythm/Sound: The crispness, clarity, and complexity of the tap sounds.

Judges will sometimes say that is is impossible to rate each individual using rating sheets because it would be too time consuming. RUBBISH!!! What is time consuming is having repetitive "call backs" because judges cannot make up their minds who they think is the winner. So what decides for them - - - FATIGUE!! I don't think it should be that way. We don't need fainting children at competitions. Such situations happen all too often.

Each child could be rated from 1-10 on each of the six characteristics stated in about 30 seconds. The sheets could quickly be tallied at another table and the top 6-8 brought back for a final attempt. It is unlikely that a tie would result when all the judges scores were added together.

Another nice result from this process is the feed-back that individual dancers would get at the end of the competition. I have never participated in a competition where individual dancers were given feed-back regarding the ratings they received. This would allow that and give notice to the dancer on his/her weakest and strongest categories. It would also provide a more objective rating device and leave the judges less vulnerable to criticisms of subjective decision-making.

As always I would like to hear your opinions regarding these matters. Keep the cards and letters coming!!!

As the weeks and months rolled by, it was one tired pair of taps who rested by day in their soft cloth bag. Righty does his work well, only occasionally stepping on me, and now accepts me as the Boss!

We've been to Parakeet, West California, Montana, Disaster City, Cone Hill, Copper Penny Town and here we are at the S.P.C.T.C.E. finals competing for the Grand Overall Championship (with a twice life size bust of Darcy Abernathy on top. You remember Darcy, he's the one who won in 1939, and he's here today in his full length racoon coat, shaking hands and giving autographs — I even got my program X'd!)

And here we are — the big moment — we did our stuff brilliantly the first time and we are waiting for Call Backs — electricity from our owner NOW — here we go again — love those fiddles — AAAAND. . . The Winner Is. . . . OUR OWNER!!!!!!!

Moral: Now and then Left is right and Right is left!!

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BUCK VS CLOG PART II

In my first article on this subject, I gave you hints and clues on what exact style that you danced. For example, Buck dancers usually danced on the balls of their feet, and Cloggers use a good shuffle and double toe.

The first Competition using a division of Buck and Clog was recently held in Atlanta, Georgia. It was called The All American Clogging Championship, and the only categories at this competition were Individual and Duet and within these two divisions were Novice, Buck or Clog.

The Novice category was really popular and the only requirement was that you hadn't won at a competition before, excluding Team wins.

In the Buck Dance Division, the dancers were told that the Judges (Scotty Bilz, Jean Stephenson, Jeff Parrott) would be looking for a dancer who danced on the balls of their feet, made a good clean sound while using a smooth floating style. Whether deliberate or accidental, some of the were in all actuality "Clogging".

For example: A double-toe-step-rock-step is a basic in Clogging. A Basic Buck is double ball-heel-ball heel-ball - a difference of five sounds to seven. My advice to all dancers entering a divided solo competition is to go home and examine how you dance again, and be sure before you enter! I'd hate to see a good Clogger lose in the Buck Dance Division.

That's all fer this month!



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
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There's "Snow" Place Like Home Rawls Denies Rumor!

*We did!




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The One And Only. . . CHARLIE BURNS



I am delighted to have the opportunity to share with you some of my thoughts and feelings about a man that many of you have either met or heard of in some capacity — "Charlie Burns". If ever a list is compiled of people who have touched and changed the lives of cloggers everywhere, his will be there.

He lives in Richmond, Kentucky and is well-known throughout Central Kentucky. Teaching 4-6 nights a week, Charlie has single-handedly taught over 3,000 new cloggers in the last 4 years. His classes always over-packed, he is a clogging teacher extraordinaire. Charlie is probably THE BEST beginner clogging instructor in the country. Sit in a class with him

and watch how he handles the crowd. His enthusiasm is catching and his methods of communicating to potential dancers is the result of thousands of hours spent honing his skill. "He makes it seem so easy", they say. Above and beyond teaching people "how to communicate with their feet" as Charlie often says, he also gives people a lifelong gift of self-confidence and self-esteem.

I am a psychologist by profession, but there is a lot of the psychologist in Charlie also. His classes are truly "therapeutic" and offer people an invaluable avenue for stress reduction and personal growth. More than once I have seen frightened and insecure adults and children undergo almost miraculous changes in a matter of several weeks.

Charlie has also made a name for himself as a "caller". Teams will often hire Charlie to call a dance for them as a way to raise money for their team. He always has a "full house" because of his good nature and enthusiasm. It is not uncommon during the winter months for Charlie to be calling a dance every Friday and Saturday night. In addition, he also volunteers his time for charity and benefit dances. Hosting dances for the American Heart Association, Muscular Dystrophy Association, Kidney Foundation, and others, he aids those not fortunate enough to have the capacity to dance.

Where does he get the time? I've known Charlie for six years now and I still don't know! He's a full-time manager at IBM and has a lovely spouse named Shirley. In this case it's definitely true that behind every great man is a great woman. It takes a lot of patience and love to graciously accept her role as the supporting cast.

Charlie first started clogging in 1979 and has been a "clog-a-holic" ever since. He has co-directed two teams, The Bluegrass Country Cloggers and Orange Blossom Specials, to national titles in the USA competition in Nashville, Indiana. He is a "seasoned" competition judge but prefers teaching workshops to judging clogging competitions. He is a frequently requested workshop teacher all over the country.

The next opportunity you have to either speak to Charlie Burns or to learn the latest "hot" step from him — do it!! You'll never meet a more personable man. Thanks Charlie for being you!!!

Scotty told me that we may have to fly to some workshops and competitions next year. No way, Scotty, unless you can find me a parachute. You fly, I'll drive. It's not so much the flying that bothers me, actually. It's the idea of coming to a sudden and complete stop on a runway somewhere. Landing is the scary part. I'm used to the take off, but I'm not used to the landing.

It's October 1969. The plane had taken off from Fort Benning, Georgia only minutes before. Strapped to my back is a bag full of twenty-five pounds of nylon. Attached to the bag is a long yellow cord, the other end of which is attached to a cable near the ceiling of the aircraft. Standing behind and beside me are twenty-nine other guys similarly dressed. We are standing in an airplane, somewhere over Alabama, and the back door is OPEN. Only an idiot would fly in an airplane with the door open. All thirty idiots look around at each other and smile weakly at the thought of what we are about to do. In two minutes a little red light by the open door is going to turn green and I am going to step out of a perfectly good airplane into 1,250 feet of nothing but blue skies.
