Fontana's Mountain Resort

Fontana Village, North Carolina, has long been a gathering place for square dancers. Tex Brownlee, until his retirement, was the resident caller/co-ordinator of the many square dance activities there. The large hall used for the square dances has a wonderful tongue and groove floor. The directors of Fontana Village have chosen to encourage clogging at the mountain resort, and happily the wood floor does not appear to have suffered because of it.

Having been an "antiquer" and history buff for many years, I was curious about the beginnings of this remote resort and the somewhat out-dated cabins. The book section at the camp store provided a pamphlet called The Village of Five Lives by Kelly V. Young, copyrighted 1983.

Though unrecorded, it is believed that the name Fontana was an incorrect pronunciation of Italian geologist Felice Fontaine's name. He came to that area to explore the mineral resources when the entire region was still the homeland of the Cherokee Indians, in the late 1700's. Fontana in the Italian language means "fountain".

The area was first developed by lumber industries in the late 1800's, to be followed by copper mining. The first Fontanas would soon be at the bottom of Fontana Lake, as a result of the TVA construction of a giant hydro-electric power dam on the Little Tennessee River in the Great Smoky Mountains.

During the first years of the 1940's, the peaceful forested hills of far western North Carolina reverberated with the unlikely rumble of construction. The land looked nothing like it does now at the foot of emerald-colored Fontana Lake. In 1942, workers were hustling 'round the clock to complete a project vital to World War II: They were damming the Little Tennessee.

Throughout those 24 months, both men and women worked three shifts a day to finish Fontana Dam, which is even today the highest dam east of the Rockies. The dam's power was destined to run factories that were turning out wartime goods, so huge floodlights beamed through the night, dispelling the dark and allowing engineers and workmen to stay on the job. Patriotic signs spurred them on. When workers went off shift, they would return to the rustic village that had been hastily created to house this construction army of 5,000 or more. Completely self-contained, this "instant town" had a hospital, bank, library, schools, post office, dormitories, and houses.

When finished in November 1944, the workers had poured almost 3 million cubic yards of concrete, moved



Real buckdancing is so individually unique it is almost unteachable -- the dancer simply moves to the music as he/she sees fit. Additionally: If anyone thinks Clogging is limited to only 8 basic movements -- think again -- 8 basic movements but an infinite variety of timings and combinations."

Taking Care of Those Valuable Feet

We clog with our feet! That we need healthy and 'unhurting' feet goes without saying. I decided to write this article because of some painful personal experiences with injured feet. This is a two-part article with the first article emphasizing the need for clogger knowledge about foot care, with some illustrated foot-strengthening exercises. The second article will delineate some of the foot care aids that you might decide to use to avoid foot injuries. Foot-stretching exercises will be illustrated in the second article.

As a clogging instructor, I have had numerous students drop out of class due to foot, leg and knee injuries. They are often disappointed and hopeless, not knowing that there are some strategies that may help them rehabilitate.

In April of 1982 at the National Clogging and Hoedown Douncil's Spring Meeting in Ohio, I severely injured a nerve in the top of my foot. I continued to dance with MUCH pain. I had classes to teach, exhibitions to perform, competitions to go to, and worst of all, I just wanted to CLOG!

To make a long story short, I refused to stop dancing which aggravated the injury and made it impossible to heal. Finally, after many doctors (each giving different advice ranging from surgery to dietary changes) and much wishful thinking on my part, I did what I had to do. I STAYED OFF OF MY FEET!

I was given crutches and told not to walk on my injured foot for 4 - 6 weeks. The emotional pain was excruciating -- I thought I would die. However. life went on. I caught up on schoolwork that needed to be done and Janet ran classes. I found out that competitions ran on without me and exhibitions could be cancelled. Those were gloomy days but I learned patience and learned to truly respect my feet. I had treated them miserably for 3 years and they were telling me the only way that they could with pain. I had danced in street shoes without support or padding, on concrete many times. I had stomped, jumped, and beat my feet unmercifully. It was time to stop. It was six more months before I could BEGIN to clog. It has taken four years to return my feet to their rightful state of health. I have learned much on how to care for MY feet. I hope that the information I share with you will be helpful so you can care for YOUR feet!

I divide foot care into four categories:

- (1) Stretching Exercises: Warms and stretches the muscles-helps to avoid tears and pulling of the ligaments, tendons, and nerves.
- (2) Strengthening exercises: Builds the ligaments and supporting tissues of the foot.
- (3) Foot Supports: Provide support for the pounding that clogging feet take.
- (4) Shock absorption: Cushion shock of repeated impact between foot and surface.


Illustrated below are four foot-strengthening exercises that require only a 2 - foot piece of surgical tubing (get a medical friend to get you a piece). Make a loop at both ends using white adhesive tape tightly bound to secure the loops. One loop will go around your foot. The other will serve as a way to anchor the other end. Simply wrap the tubing around the leg of a couch or some other heavy object and then thread one loop through the other. Now you are anchored to the furniture. Slip the other loop around your foot as illustrated.

Work up to 50 repetitions on the Dorsiffexers, Inverters and Everters. Thirty repetitions on the Plantar Flexors will do nicely. Plantar Flexor exercises are particularly important to avoid heel pain resulting from tears in the plantar fascia.

I made the mistake early in my rehabilitation, of thinking that if I just stayed off my feet, then they would heal. That was only part of the treatment. I also had to rebuild the muscles that had atrophied. I continue these exercises today and consider them very important to my foot maintenance. Give them a try, and I'll have some new ones for you next month. We'll also talk about stretching exercises, foot supports, and shock absorption.



Fontana Dam (below), built during World War II, is still the highest dam east of the Rocky Mountains.






more than 700,00 cubic yards of earth and rock, and totaled a bill of \$77 million. They left behind a 480-foot-tall dam, which backed up a 10,640-acre lake that aided flood control and generated needed electricity. They also left behind a boomtown, one that thankfully didn't go bust and disappear after its meteoric rise. Instead, the site became the 350-acre Fontana Village Resort, which caters to vacationers and sightseers from spring through fall.

Fontana Dam itself remains a top sightseeing stop in the area. A massive wedge of concrete, the dam has three immense turbine-generators with a total capacity of 238,500 kilowatts, which makes it one of TVA's most powerful dams. In odd contrast to so technical a fact and setting comes this: The Appalachian Trail itself marches right over the top of the dam and through the village.

The lake, too, is a major attraction. Some 29 miles long, Fontana is ringed by the green peaks of the Great Smoky Mountains. Its cold, clear waters

harbor catfish and smallmouth and largemouth bass.

Fontana Village, in the heart of all this mountain beauty, has changed quite a bit from its first years. Vacationing families come to rent its 225 cabins, many of them built for that early construction crew. The former hospital has become the 33-room Fontana Lodge, but many guests nowadays come to stay in the more modern Fontana Inn, which was added in 1975. Regardless of where they stay, though, Fontana's visitors share a common, good experience.

At the resort they find hiking trails, tennis courts, a nine-hole golf course, horseback riding, swimming pools, a movie theater, a mountain crafts shop, and even a well-stocked trout pond for those who prefer their angling a bit less wild. Square dancing three nights a week during the summer, along with special square-dancing events in the spring and fall, have turned the resort into the self-proclaimed "Square Dance Capital of the World."

Those are the pastimes that give the resort its decidedly down-home flavor, a flavor that keeps people returning. "They remember just what a great place it is," concludes one resort employee, "and what a good family vacation it is."

The Fontana area lies 65 miles from Knoxville and 95 miles from Asheville, North Carolina, on S.R. 28. The resort is open from March through November. For information or reservations, write to Fontana Village Resort, Fontana Dam, North Carolina 28733; or call (704) 498-2211. The out-of-state, toll-free number is 1-800-438-8080 (east of the Mississippi).

TELL IT TO THE JUDGES

By Don and Heather Griffith



We assume that you mean the length of the routine was more than it needed to be.

A good amount of time for a line dance competition routine is 3 to 4 minutes. During that time, the judges have plenty of time to see steps, formations, stage use, creativity, costuming, and showmanship. Routines that run too long take more time to be practiced, allow more time to be filled with repetitious steps and figures, and give contestants more time to make timing and spacing errors, and (with a number of teams competing) extend the competition

Most competitions have time limits on line dance routines. Practically all have maximum time limits. Some have minimum time limits. We recommend writing a line dance routine to a standard length record. Three minutes is a good amount of time, but it is important to read competition rules in advance. There are stiff penalties for going over most time limits.






