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

Cloggers of different generations and experience levels brushed and stomped together Friday evening and Saturday in the third annual "Southwest Florida Summertime Stomp" at the Charlotte County Civic Center and Memorial Auditorium, Punta Gorda, Florida.

Sponsored by the four-county Banjos, Fiddles and Feet clogging group, the event had a dual purpose: bringing together clogging fans for lessons and intertainment and raising money for local drug-abuse programs. Banjos, Fiddles and Feet is a clogging exhibition group made up of participants from Charlotte, DeSoto, Sarasota and Lee counties in Florida.

Proceeds from the Stomp were divided between the Outreach Program in Fort Myers and the drugfighting division of the Charlotte County Junior Deputy League.

The Bohley's 19-year-old son, Richard, died in 1978 as a result of a drug-alcohol mixture. Jan and Phil vowed that if they were ever in a position to financially assist in a rehabilitative or preventative drug program they would do so. The 3rd Annual

Summertime Stomp netted nearly \$2,000, which was divided between the two organizations.

A two-day event this year, the Stomp drew over 500 cloggers and spectators. 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
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
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# VICTORY of the FEET "BIT by BIT"

Jacky Egli, Mary Duckworth and Robert Caldarazzo with Pacesetter Cloggers competed and became Encore Productions National Talent Competition Champions in the Clogging Category and placed Second Overall High Score out of 193 entries, including all types dance, ballet, tap, jazz, production and batton etc.

Through Showtime Dance Studio, we found out about Encore's Regional Competition to be held at Tupperware Auditorium in Orlando, Florida. Pacesetter Cloggers entered four groups, 2 group competitions, one duet and one trio, with all placing first in their categories and age groups. The Adult Trio also placed 2nd overall in the Regional Competition. Pacesetter Kids Team members were unable to at-

tend Encore's National Talent Competition in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina due to summer vacation schedules, but the adult trio decided to continue to the Nationals.

Encore Productions, in it's second year of competitions has not had many clogging entries, but oddly enough, the adult clogging categories had a few entries. We were amused to find that in the group entries, several tap studios entered their tap dancers, "clogging" to country music. The field is wide open to the traditional clogger.

In preparing for this competition, the three of us enjoyed many hours of rehearsing, keeping in mind that our major joal was to have a good time, win, lose or draw. We took off for South Carolina Monday, arriving late afternoon which gave us a full day for rest and preparation for Tuesday night's competition.

The competition running about an hour late, and the audience packed with all First Place Competitors waiting for the Grand Awards, caused us some butterflies. A full house of parents, professional dancers and directors all tired and anxious for the final awards and we weren't sure how they would respond to our routine. We were stunned - from the moment the music began, the audience came alive! It was the most fantastic feeling the three of us could have. The audience love it! We received a standing ovation, and after getting off stage and pausing to give each other a hug or two, we walked out from behind the stage to another round of applause. One cannot imagine the enormous pride that traditional clogging was accepted so well in a circle of professional talents from all areas of dance and production.

We hope that Encore Productions will begin to encourage more clogging groups to compete. They are a <u>fine</u> organization with a great deal of support and caring for <u>all</u> types of dance.

Tired, and happy, we returned to Florida, toting six beautiful trophies, a \$250.00 cash prize and some terrific memories. We are already planning for next years group and trio performances.

quite interesting. I have a tidbit to share. We direct a senior citizen clogging group in Montgomery, Alabama. The group has formed into a team who call themselves the "Classic Cloggers." About every two weeks the team visits a nursing home to entertain the residents, who are often their own friends. When I announce, to the audience, that the group will be clogging, I've had more than one ask, "what's that?" After a dance or two, while the dancers are catching their second wind, I've heard - particularly from the 90 year old crowd - "why, that is "buckdancing" you are doing!" I had an old man who was 93 years old get on the floor and show me how he "buckdanced" when he was a kid. We have played in some back-hill towns in rural Alabama. They call what we do as "Clogging" by the name of "buckdancing". I'm not into entering a debate with either Frank Bonner or Steve Smith.

I have never done any historical research on my own.

I'm just relating what the old folks and their
younger rural compatriots said when they saw us clog.

I wrote Frank suggesting that perhaps we could simply add new and old to distinguish between the two. His reply, and the sections from his book Clogging and the Southern Appalachin Square Dance which clarify his answer, will be printed in next month's issue.



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Plaques will be presented to (1) the group traveling the longest distance to attend the Jamboree, (2) the group with the most members participating in an exhibition (excluding the J-Ville Cloggers), (3) the youngest clogger and (4) the oldest clogger. Any group or individual receiving a plaque three times in a row will be retired after the third year.

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
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
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
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


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


Dateline Saturday July 19: Finnegan begin again.


JoAnn and I asked each other throughout the weekend - Well, how do YOU think its going?

"Wish that I was on old Rocky Top, down in the Tennessee Hills..." Welcome to the Tennessee hills! Chattanooga, also known as the Scenic City, Choo Choo City, and at one time, the powerful Dynamo of Dixie, lies nestled among the ridges and mountains which form the Great Smokies. Chattanooga is conveniently located within a day's drive of half the population in the U.S. Or to put it in more familiar terms, we are 150 miles southwest of Fontana Village. Convenient location plus a brand new Convention Center - what more could anyone ask for! We are a city proud of our rich heritage, and we would like to share this heritage with you this Thanksgiving.

Your visit with us is even more important this year because we are celebrating Homecoming across the state of Tennessee. Here's the invitation issued by out Governor, "Consider this your invitation to come celebrate with us during Tennessee Homecoming '86. Homecoming '86 is part history lesson, part reunion and part good old-fashioned hoedown." And if anyone knows about a good old-fashioned hoedown, its a Convention Center full of cloggers!

The Third National Clogging Convention promises to be the best yet. We have plenty of cloggers in the Chattanooga area who are willing and eager to help with the planning and with carrying out those plans. I say Chattanooga area because some of you may not realize that Chattanooga is only a few miles from the borders of Georgia, Alabama, and North Carolina. That's why the signs declare, "See Seven States from Lookout Mountain.!" To start the ball rolling, kickoff dances are being held in Cleveland, TN; Trenton, GA; Chattanooga, and Rome,GA.

Let me tell you just a bit about us. Of course I cannot speak for all cloggers in the Chattanooga area, but I have met and seen a good many of them. We tend to like good old fashioned clogging. (But there are also those of us who know the latest buck steps, too.)


Clogging in this area originated with Mars Reynolds. Virtually everyone in this area either learned clogging from Mars, or was taught clogging by someone who learned clogging from Mars. Mars learned Basic One and Two from Bill Nichols in the early seventies. From then on the steps in this area took their own direction, and many of them today bear their own names, such as the No Name, which you know as the Rocking Chair. We also have the Mark, the Ralph, the Military, the Piney and Double Piney, plus a few others that are known only to those of us in this area.

You'll be hearing quite a bit about Mars before this is all over. Had it not been for his perserverance, clogging in this area would be nowhere near what it is today. In addition to starting the clogging movement in Chattanooga, Mars founded the famous Choo Choo Cloggers, one of the country's oldest clogging teams. Even after suffering a stroke which forced his retirement from the Choo Choo Cloggers, Mars continues to hold weekly clogging classes every Tuesday evening at Allemande Hall.

Allemande Hall is still another special feature here in Chattanooga. It was built by and for square dancers, round dancers and cloggers. We are extremely fortunate to have our own place to clog. On Wednesday nights, cloggers from all over the area get together for an evening of clogging. At any given time you are likely to find representatives of at least five teams dancing together. Those of us who make the weekly trek to Allemande Hall love Mars Reynolds and love clogging. For us the two are synonymous. 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# Competition Fever: Part 3 Choosing a Team Dancer

Now That you have decided to give competition a -"Try", its time to select the dancers for your team. (That sounds easy, you say, I'll use anyone who wants to dance!) WRONG!!! Competition is NOT the same as exhibition and it requires a different type of dancer. The level of dancer ability has improved 100%, in the last few years. A team must be willing to practice on a regular schedule and put in extra time on their own just to keep up with their competition.

The director should know the dancers personality as well as their ability. Beware of the dancer whose "ego, exceeds their talent". That dancer is never worth investing in and should be avoided. A team spends a lot of hours together in practice and on the road. The dancer who has a "ME FIRST" complex, causes unnecessary friction within the group. Forget that dancer - they will self-destruct sooner or later. Choose instead a person who has team pride and blends well, both in personality and dance style. The best selection would be those whose physical appearance is about the same: (height, weight etc.). One short dancer leaves a hole in the line and makes it more difficult to have clean arm moves in figure dancing. (I know of several teams who have one extra tall dancer, but they work so well with the group that it really doesn't detract.) There is always an exception to every rule!

As the selected contest date gets closer - the team will be under a strain and begin to "nit-pick". As long as it stays under control, that is not a problem. If directors could choose a prototype dancer we would have one who doesn't need sleep or food and doesn't sweat. It is amazing how much sleep you lose a a competition. Everyone is so keyed-up and their energy is limitless. (The exception is Burton Edwards, who once fell asleep on my shoulder while waiting for his individual age group. He calmly woke up - walked on the stage and won!!! No warm up!! We should all be so lucky!)


Team dancers need to realize that they may be performing on Holidays and be willing to do this. A 4 Couple or 8 Couple group cannot dance if everyone is not present. The more they exhibition the more relaxed they will be in front of the Judges. In choosing the right adult dancer, consider their family and job. Are they able to get time off from work? Are they able to afford air-fare if the schedule is tight? Do they have an understanding husband or wife? Are there young children in the family that need the dancers first consideration?

When working with young dancers - there is the problem of school work and school - related activities. Unless you are fortunate enough to have a minimum of these problems then its best to plan on attending only a few competitions a year.

Everyone has to be willing to give a lot and receive little except personal satisfaction. In that area - the rewards are enormous, for the <a href="TRUE TEAM">TRUE TEAM</a>
DANCER!!!

# TELL IT TO THE JUDGES

Q. After watching an entire competition and not agreeing with most of the judging I witnessed, I wonder what the judges did and how they were scoring the dancers! Can you tell me what judges look for in clogging?

A. You are asking a mighty big question for a relatively little amount of coverage. Perhaps we can give you some insights and point you in a direction that will help.

Judges do not determine scoring procedures nor do they determine scoresheets. The director of the competition does this. Judges must abide by the director's wishes once they have agreed to judge a competition. Consequently, the judges need to have received competition rules and scoresheets in advance of the competition so they can determine and interpret the rules and so they can decide if they can agree with the director's philosophy and manner of conducting the competition.

Currently, competition directors often assume too much of judges. They tend to give judges too much latitude in determining point deductions or bonuses, and they give judges too much information to process and to record during competition. Consequently, judges often find themselves unfairly criticized for things beyond their control and for things which could be remedied (or at least greatly improved upon) by clearer scoring procedures and better scoresheets. Both of the above fall to the responsibility of each competition director.

We have provided specific suggestions on judging that might be helpful to you, the competition director, and the competitor. You will find them under the heading "JUDGING ARRANGEMENT/SCORING" in our clogging competition booklet titled, <a href="CLOGGING COMPETITIONS">CLOGGING COMPETITIONS: HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THEM, INDIVIDUALS.</a>

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


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
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# Hee Haw Competition



For the second year we have requested a complete Winners List from the authorities in Nashville for this Competition, and for the second year have had no response.





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
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
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
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
