

# C.L.O.G. National Convention Chattanooga, Tennessee - Thanksgiving 1986

Chattanooga! The view from our 12th floor window was incredible - Lookout Mountain. The city lies in a flat basin, and on Thanksgiving evening the streets were nearly empty of traffic. As dusk approached on this overcast day, the city lights became brighter and by dark lights here and there began to appear on the side of the mountain. 

# Tell it to the JUDGES!

Q, What happened to the Stone Mountain Clogging Competition last May?

A. Unfortunately, it didn't happen. The park has realized its mistake in not having the competition and is now attempting to get sponsors to help spread the cost of putting on a competition. The main thing that came out of not having this traditional competition is that people really missed it.

Diane Schell has been holding the Stone Mountain competition for 8 years. It is the oldest running competition in Georgia and the biggest clogging competition in the world. If the reader hasn't been there before, we might give you an idea by example.

Don judged the duo/duet category one year all day Saturday - from 9 a.m. until 3 a.m. Sunday morning and began at 10a.m. Sunday and judged until 1 p.m. Sunday afternoon. This category was held on one of three stages at the competition. Meanwhile, Heather judged close to 2000 dancers in the "individuals category" on another split stage (girls on one side and boys on the other with 3 judges on either side working at the same time) during that same period of time. Usually there have been anywhere from twelve to fourteen different judges going fulltime throughout the competition. Is that big? You bet!

In its early days, it was wild. Think about dancing a couple of thousand dancers and hundreds of teams during a three-day period of time on several stages with people trying to register late, others having complaints, hundreds wanting directions - especially if vou hadn't expected half that many to show up.

With time it was honed to a really class act. In 1985, dancers knew the minute they would be dancing and where on a printed program. Conflicts had just about been completely resolved, and things ran like clockwork. Then the park had a change of directions and management. and the Stone Mountain Competition was its biggest casualty.

Diane pulled things together and revitalized the competition on September 26-27, 1986. Though it was a respectable competition with some great dancing, it was tiny compared to previous years. NCHC sponsored, it had all of the necessary categories, five judges, and NCHC official present. Things went well.

Best of all, Diane says that the competition will be reinstated next spring, and the park director of special activities confirmed it to the writers while chatting at the September competition. So, be looking for information on it in late winter, and be prepared to come and help to make it the biggest and best Stone Mountain Clogging Competition ever for spring of 1987. It should happen in early May. Don't miss it. It is a big part of clogging past and present.

# More on "Tradition"

Dear Bobbie: I enjoyed meeting you at the C.L.O.G. Convention and am sorry I missed your Newsletter Editors Meeting there. I received my syllabus far too late to learn that I could have attended. As a former Journalism student, I try to attend such meetings if I have access to them.

We were so involved in talking about Papa "Buck Lawson" that I completely forgot to say how very much I enjoy The Double Toe Times and I wish you the warmest success in spreading it around the country.

In the November issue of The Double Toe Times, I especially enjoyed Nancy Biehler's article, "'Traditional' clogging style?".


I grew up in Florida and attended many square dances there and in and around Atlanta where I moved as a teen-ager. At all of these dances, there was a period when the floors were cleared for "the buck dancers". The band would split and only a banjo and a fiddle were allowed to sound the beat — and, the young men, called "bucks", came onto the floor, one at a time, to stomp out their buck dances. No women were allowed to participate — it was for men only — and every dance was different. The men donned their boots, brogans and western and hob-nailed, for buck dances were done only in boots then; and, like the Spanish Fandango music, the dances were "made up on the spot", each one an original never to be repeated.

Because my Mother is a Seminole Indian, I suppose I like to believe that buck dance, the dance of the young men, is thusly named due to the fact early American settlers adopted the Indian tradition of calling young men "bucks". These young Indian "bucks" danced around their campfires in a stomping manner; and, the women were excluded. On the original wagon trains west, where women were scarce, the young explorers entertained themselves around the campfire by stomping out their individual dances - with or without music.

However, I also recall from school history that slave-owners also owned "bucks" -- young black men who also danced alone in an African version of stomping around the campfires. And, later, American folklore tells us these young black men did indeed dance on street corners "for a buck".

Whether or not any of these versions is the truest one of the origination of the name "buck dance", all versions have one thing in common: buck steps were always performed by men. I remember envying the men in my younger days at square dances because they seemed to so enjoy the buck dancing with its jumping, stomping, rollicking, happy beat. I resented the fact that I was not allowed to "buck dance" -- at least, not in public, for it was considered "unlady-like"! I am pleased now to see women who can buck with the best of the men!

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
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# The English Dancing Mafter: or R eard eafie Rules for the Dancing of Country Dances, with the Tune to each I

The English Dancing Master or

Plaine and easie Rules for the Dancing of Country Dances, with the Tune to each Dance.

March 19, 1651 London

Harry Truman said "The only thing new in the world is the history we don't know about."

In my reading about Folk Dancing I find little written about Clogging per se, except as an adjunct to Square Dancing according to many early U.S. Dance historians. References made to John Playfords book "The English Dancing Master" intrigued me. Through the inter-library lending service a 1933 rewritten edition was located, but was considered a reference book, and so I spent several hours in the Library.

An earlier reference to John Playford: "The quality, as well as the quantity of his publications, and especially his integrity as an editor, established for him a reputation equaled by very few in England."

In the 1933 edition, Leslie Bridgewater, Middlesex England writes: "The collection is representative of one type of Folk Dance -- the community Country Dance -- as danced by the people of England in Playford's time. . . . the Country Dance is such a fluid and constantly changing form that, had the work been delayed but a few years, many of these charming dances, and particularly the 'set' dances, would have been lost to us, for by the end of the century (1699) everybody was dancing 'longways' only, probably caused by the gradual transference of dancing from outdoors to indoors."

Playford was a printer by trade, and in his own preface indicated that an inferior manuscript about English Country Dances had been submitted to him, prompting his authorship of this book. His first Edition contained 105 dances and tunes, and with subsequent enlarged editions, his books included over 700 dances. While this book has nothing to do with taps and fancy footwork, it is one of the earliest written accounts of the background of many of our patterns and figures.

A TABLE Explaining the Characters which are set downe in the Dances.

A Double is foure steps forward or back, closing both feete.

A Single is two steps, closing both feete. Set and turne single, is a single to one hand, and a single to the other, and turne single.


D.Is for a Double. S. Is for a Single. Wo. Stands for woman. This stands for the Men We. Stands for women. This for the women. Cu. Stands for Couple. Co. Stands for Contrary. Stands for second. Stands for third. Stands for fourth. Stands for a straine playd once. Stands for a straine playd twice. Stands for a straine playd thrice, &c.

The Dances all had a notation at the top indicating For Foure; For as many as will; Longways for foure, six, eight, for as many as will; Round for foure, six, eight, for as many as will; A long Dance for 3, 5, 7 or 9 couple; A Square Dance.

Some of the titles of the Tunes and Dances include Parsons Farewell, Petticoat Wag, Shepheard's Holyday, Health to Belly, Merry Milke Mayds, Nonesuch, New Boepeepe Whish, Dull Sir John, Bobbing Joe, Faine I would it I could, Gathering Peascods, and Uptailes All!

There is no information about the geographic area covered (in England) or how Londoner Playford came to observe and write down 700 Country dances. Far more courtly and formal dances were executed by Royalty and the gentry of that time.

It was fascinating to read a book of Country Dances written over 300 years ago. If Truman was right, Elvira, Cotton Eye Joe, Stay a Little Longer, Jump, Amos Moses may well go down in history

# The Two Step Scene by Dr. Two Step

Last September at the Denver National Convention I saw something in the 6-count swing competition that I could not take my eyes off of. It was called West Coast Swing and it made everything else on the dance floor pale by comparison. Others who came to Denver with me shared this facination, and our esthetic judgment was vindicated only a month later at the Reno National Convention where couples performing West Coast Swing captured 1st, 2nd and 4th places in the swing category.

West Coast Swing begins at an advanced level. This is simply because the girl must know her part and is expected to bring something of her own to the dance partnership. Her part is to travel, and the manner in which she does this is what characterizes West Coast Swing for the observer. In open position the girl travels a straight line (called the "slot") right through her partner (who deftly maneuvers out of her way) and then turns and "anchors" at the end of this "slot". This anchor is unique to West Coast Swing and serves to build up the resistance between partners necessary for the communication of the next lead. If you can imagine traditional Western Swing as analogous to the symmetrical movement of a spider executing pushups on a mirror, then West Coast Swing might more closely resemble the back-and-forth movements of a weaving loom.

One of the nice things about West Coast Swing is that it does not displace Eastern Swing but rather supplements it in the dancer's repertoire. It feels best when performed to line dance music, and it is versatile enough to accommodate a wide range of tempos and music styles.

As this column goes to press West Coast Swing Workshops are scheduled for the central Florida area in January 1987. Watch for the traveling cowgirl at your favorite honky-tonk. Keep dancing!

Nancy Biehler was appointed to catalog and list all currently available books on Clogging.


Bobbie Adams will update all reciprocating Editors. Introductions were made and the brief meeting was adjourned.

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
# Marge Callahan

Try following this lady through a crowded Clogging Hall! Youngsters run up with arms wide for an expected hug; a couple stops her for a "Thanks, we liked your routine!"; someone from across the room shouts "Hi Marge" ---- what was to have become a quick exit, becomes a wandering receiving line. This trim, tan, mature woman with her flag of curly grey-white hair is almost always dressed in "whites" - white blouse, white slacks, white shoes, with distinctive bright red suspenders, and carries herself with a military air, with good reason.

Marge was born and raised in Florida, the third of four children, While still a teen ager, she was a Ballroom Dance Instructor at a USO during WW II. When she was 25 years old, she joined the Navy, the women's branch then called the "Wave's", and crossed over Florida's borders for the first time in her life. After Basic Training in Illinois, she was stationed in Illinois in Special Services and later stationed in Florida and Colorado as a Recruiter. She took Instructors Training and was the only woman in a class with 60 men. She became interested in precision drill teams, and organized the first Waves Ships Company Drill Team traveling extensively with the team. Marge states that she liked the regimentation and teamwork of her Navy Tour, and learned early that the best leaders are within the ranks.

In the mid 1960's, Marge began obedience training a pet Collie, and later a gift Poodle, taking the Poodle through the Utility Dog trials to a UD degree. She joined a K-9 Drill Team and Circus, and became the Master of Ceremonies. Marge's first exposure to Country Western music came as a result of part of the Drill Team's precision Square Dance called to four handlers with their dogs as partners, with the silent use of hand signals. Marge states that the two most exciting points of her Obedience career were: Emceeing the K-9 Drill Team Show at the National Dog Show in Madison Square Garden, New York City and when Toby, her Golden Retriever, made Dog World Register for consistently high score in Novice Competition, nationally.

Marge Callahan, after 22 years in the Navy, retired in 1980. While visiting her sister and brotherin-law, Jody and Jesse Kersey in Miami, she watched Jody "clogging" and badgered Jesse into treating her to a pair of Clogging shoes. Back home in Jacksonville, she took her first classes from John Ross in Green Cove Springs, Sally Thompson's J'Ville Cloggers, and the Funtime Cloggers led by Doris Krevo. She gave up golf, and became so absorbed in Clogging that she practiced 8 to 10 hours a day. In February 1982 she was asked to teach a Beginners class at Pacetti's Campground in St. Augustine, Florida for about 35 people. The rest is History! Marge has taught at Sugarfoot Family Workshops, FCC Active Member, taught at all major Florida Conventions since 1983, all three

C.L.O.G. National Conventions, Possom Holler and Mountain City 1986, Tuscaloosa 1986 and 1987, Punta Gorda, Palatka, and the Pirate's Ball.

Sugarfoot Family Cloggers was formally organized in July 1982. It is currently under the direction of Marge, Diana Allen and Greg Dionne. In 1984 Marge became the Director of The Fellowship Cloggers, an open "y'all come" type clogging club encouraged by St. Peter's Episcopal Church, which meets in that Church's Fellowship Hall in Jacksonville, Florida. A subsidiary of that group is called "Get back to Country Cloggers", whose name is self-explanatory!

Marge choreographs only Beginner and Intermediate routines stating "In choreographing a dance I put only one or two challenging steps, so that the newer dancer can do them, but advanced dancers seem to enjoy the dances too. The ultimate object is to learn the dance and have FUN!

Her love of Country music, country adages and sayings, and People of All Ages, has endeared her to Cloggers and audiences everywhere. She truly "never met a stranger, only friends she's yet to know!"

Callahanism: A good routine must have four ables - available, likeable, danceable, teachable!

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
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
