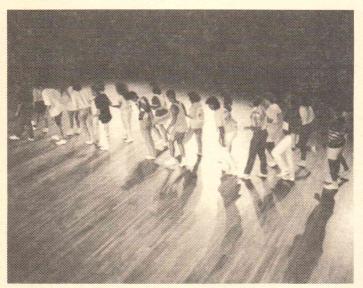

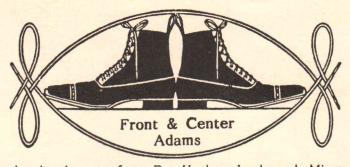

A Proposal: Getting Cue Sheets in on Time

Imagine that you are in charge of obtaining cue sheets from the instructor(s) hired to teach at your workshop. It is one week prior to the workshop and the cue sheets were due one week ago. You have called the instructor(s) and they have apologized and they all have several good reasons for the delay in their mailing. Where that leaves you, of course, is disappointed, angry, rushed up till the last minute, and possibly in hot water with other committee members who are pressuring YOU for syllabus material. Where that leaves the instructor is with the possible loss of an invitation for next year's workshop and the possible reputation of being undependable.

As you may have guessed, I have found myself past the DUE DATE for cue sheet mailings on a number of occasions. While I ALWAYS have a number of reasonable explanations for my behavior, I can't help but believe that there must exist a lack of motivation on my part. It is quite easy to avoid/procrastinate when the person asking for cue sheets is 500 miles away. In reflecting on how it is that I tend to procrastinate, I have come up with the following reasons:

- 1. "If I wait long enough then that 'perfect' song will come out and I can write a great routine to it." There is a lot of pressure to provide good and NEW routines, and believe me, they take time to write.
- 2. "They don't REALLY need the cue sheets as early as they're asking for them; they're just asking for them early so that they won't get them late."
- 3. "I'll do it tomorrow, really!" There are so many more immediate tasks that require my attention that cue sheets continually take a back set in my list of priorities.

In light of the above discussion, I have a proposal that I think would help to insure that the mailing of cue sheets finds a higher position on my list of priorities. It is this: If you are in charge of obtaining the cue sheets from your hired instructor, set a date AND CHARGE THEM 5% OF THEIR WORKSHOP FEE FOR EACH DAY THAT CUE SHEETS ARE LATE. The great motivator (money) will serve to insure ontime cue sheet delivery from even the most hardened procrastinators.

Am I cutting my own throat? Maybe, but I am also encouraging a structure that will reinforce my compliance with the requests of those who hire me and other instructors. Will it work? What do YOU think?

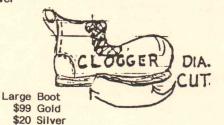

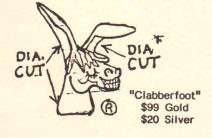

Clogging History - Possible Origins of Appalachian Clog Dancing

Appalachian clog dance, a foot shuffling version of early American Square Dance, apparently originated from a combination of folk dance movements performed by the settlers of the Appalachian mountains. During the past twenty years, the clog dance has become increasingly more popular within the region. During the last ten years its popularity has spread to folk and square dance clubs throughout the country.

There are several identifiable styles of clog dance from various parts of the Appalachian region which appear to be related in different ways and in various degrees to dances of Africa, England, Ireland, the Netherlands, France, and Moravia (now a part of Czechoslovakia and Germany).

The most significant differences in the clog dance appear to be found on opposite sides of the mountain range. In the easternmost parts (the Virginias, Carolinas, and Southern Georgia and Alabama) the dance is executed flatfooted with an earthward thrust of the body. In the western parts (Southern Ohio, Eastern Kentucky and Tennessee, and Northern Alabama and Georgia) the same basic dance of the foot. The earthward thrust of the body is often nonexistent. The dancer strives for an erect posture and does not change level.

This investigator has observed a great mixture of style since 1968 among the clog dancers throughout the entire region. It is now sometimes difficult to identify the clog dancers according to regional style obvious at that time. These mixtures of style are natural changes that go with the surge in popularity of the dance and the high mobility of the dancers. If this trend continues regional styles will disappear.

The Appalachian Square Dance, the figures of which are usually called by one of the dancers, begins with a circle of couples (traditionally eight, but now with any number) which, after executing a few figures, breaks into sets of two couples each. One couple in each set moves to the next set between small set figures at the whim of the caller. The dance eventually goes back to the one big circle and soon ends.

On both sides of the mountains, the Appalachian Square is done without the fancy footwork known as "clogging", but on the eastern side it is called "Smooth Dancing" without the clog step and "Big Circle Mountain Dancing" or "Clogging" when the footwork is included. On the western side, clogging has not been popular until recently. Many leaders and dancers have never even seen it.

Further south in Tennessee and Northern Alabama, where Play Party games and the Appalachian Square (without the clog steps) are popular, a type of solo dance is found that is similar to the Irish "Slip Jig", or "Sevens and Threes." The participant (usually a man) stands tall, uses the arms very little and

dances on the balls of the feet. (A type of clog with this look has been reported in upstate New York in the early 1900's and recently in Ohio. A flatfooted dance with the same upright body position is done in parts of Virginia called "Sure Footing.") This author calls the Tennessee variety "Cumberland Jig."

Across the Mississippi River in Arkansas, a jig dance (so called by the residents) is done which is executed high on the balls of the feet, but without the ridgidity of the upper body that is seen in the Cumberland Jig style and the "Sure Footing" style of Virginia. The keynote factor in the Arkansas style is that - - just like a precision clog dance step in northern Georgia. - - it is a three-count step done to either 2/4 or, occasionally, 4/4 time music.

For instance, the basic step is left, right, ball of left, right, counted 1, 2, &, 3 (slow, slow, quick, slow) musical counts of either 1, 2, 1, 2; or 1, 2, 3, 4. The step counted across the music would be: 1, 2, & 1; 2, 1, & 2; to 2/4 time music, or; 1, 2, &, 3: 4, 1, & 2; etc. to 4/4 time music. Apparently these are the two predominate geographical areas for this particular rhythm.

In Arkansas the dance is done either as a solo or in old-time square dance figures where one couple visits all the other couples in the set to execute figures one at a time. In the precision clog, figures range from the older grand march type to variations of modern square dance figures.

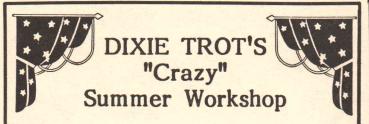
The area including Mississippi, Alabama and Southern Georgia is the home of the "Buck Dance", a traditional Negro solo dance. History reveals that the early slaves in the Virginias called it the "Buck" for buccaneers who were the Irish, etc. immigrants. They called them the "poor bucks." - - The dance is executed flatfooted, similar to the North Carolina clog, the main emphasis in the "Buck Dance" is a backward chug. The step sequence includes a heavy step followed by a chug backward on the same foot. The body is usually bent forward, and, in one version known as the "Buzzard's Lope", the arms appear to flap like wings.

It differs from the North Carolina clog in that the buck dance does not emphasize toe shuffles as does the clog, and the body is held more upright in North Carolina. The term "Buck Dance" has changed in recent years to mean any kind of solo dance.

There are many references to the "Buck Dance" contests on the plantations. The Blacks learned the square dances that were done in the main plantation house and apparently added the chug, shuffle, and body movements that were done in dances of African origin. The descriptions of plantation Black "square dances" sound much like a description of what we now know as "Big Circle Clog Dance" as seen in Western North Carolina.

The Blacks and the Whites both added embellishment steps to dances such as the "Virginia Reel"

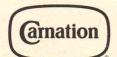

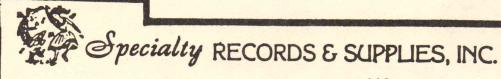

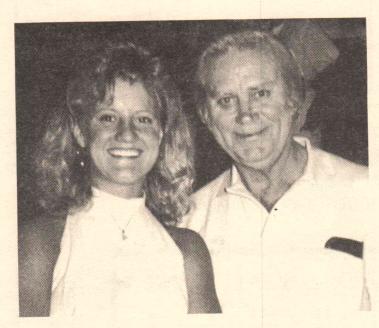

This week-long cruise had the Caribbean islands of St. Maarten, St. Thomas, and St. John plus a day on Great Stirrup Cay as ports of call.

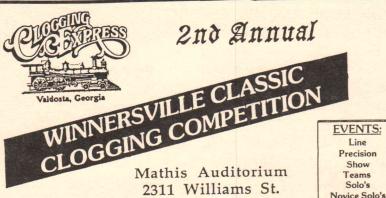
As with all cruises, there are so many things to do and see that almost before the passengers are aware of it, the ship is back in home port. We were told that the 1989 cruise will be for two weeks!

and other contra dances. The Whites added English and Irish type steps that emphasize an up and down motion as in hopping and skipping. The Black style is a downward thrust of the body on each step.

The Black square dance, with many variations, was performed in minstrel shows, and later the steps were done in vaudeville. Along with influence from the Irish Jig and the English clog, this style developed into the tap dance, the Charleston and other forms of popular dance. At first look it does not seem that the Charleston and the Clog had a common origin, but the relationship is clear when considering the forerunner of both - - the Ring Shout (a Black religious dance) and Buck Dance. A dance similar to the Charleston is currently popular among Whites in the hills of West Virginia, called Flatfooting.

One dance in particular collected recently from Yoruba, Africa, and exhibited to a class at UCLA by a professor from Yale, resembles the Charleston and more closely resembles Flat-footing as done in West Virginia. Add the arm embellishments of the old Buck and Wing, and it resembles a dance said to be from Africa done by Negroes in the South called the "Buzzard's Lope." Fancy footwork added to this dance in America, but it is still done without chugs or shuffles in the Georgia Sea Islands.

In Southern North Carolina and Northern Georgia, clogging takes on the flavor of a performance more than a recreation. This is the style already mentioned as precision clogging. The figures used are the same as in Appalachian Square Dancing with the addition of figures from other sources.

Precision dance teams appear more trained and execute the step sequences in unison. Big Circle Clog dance teams and groups seem more relaxed and use individual variations of the step sequences. The latter also change to a walking step if the clogging interferes with the figures.

The step sequence in both of these styles begins with a double-toe tap. It looks more like a double-toe bounce than a brush because the foot usually moves neither forward nor backward. Immediately

following the double-toe is a step on the same foot in the same spot. This double-toe is predominant only in those two styles of group clog dance and one style of solo dance - - the "Blue Ridge Clog" step from Virginia which has a double heel tap on the opposite foot.

In the eastern part of Virginia there are two distinct styles of clogging. One, sometimes called "Sure-footing", is practically the same as the North Carolina style except for the lack of the double-toe tap. Instead the stepping appears a bit faster and with more up and down motion of the body. The other Virginia style (both styles are simply called "clogging" by most participants) utilizes a brush through with the whole foot that gives the appearance of kicking something across the floor. The upper body is bent forward and the step sequences are always in unison.

Clog is an English word not usually found in books about Black dances. At one time it referred to a "clock" dance in England. However, most people relate the name of the dance to the type of wooden-sole shoe of the same name. The English clog has a foot flap similar to the double-toe or shuffle, but there is no chug (foot slip while supporting the body). The Irish and Scottish jig steps are executed with a skip on the ball of the foot. Bavarial dances utilize heavy stamps and heel taps and African dances utilize upper body movement combined with foot shuffles and chugs.

Publicity for the Asheville, North Carolina, Clog and Smooth Dance Festival held every summer says that the clog was influenced by the Cherokee Indians. Of course this is possible, but Cherokee dancing is characterized by easy bounces through the ankle and knee not at all like any of the clog dance styles.

So, from the research done by this writer, it seems that the popular Appalachian clog dance has been influenced by many styles of dance. Some areas obviously influenced more by one style than another, but most of the Appalachian styles are unique and cannot be traced to a single origin.

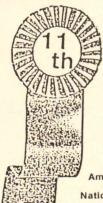

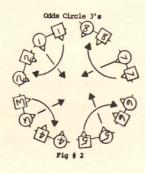

The Circle Three is the first of two Big Circle figures required for competition by the rules of the American Clogging Hall of Fame and the National Clog and Hoedown Council.

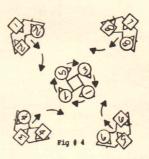
The round, cased numbers indicate ladies; the square, cased numbers indicate men. Determine where you are in the circle and follow the arrows from one figure to the next figure until you have completely danced around the Big Circle, then roll back into the same position you started. At this point, the caller will call "Evens Circle Three", and the evens will follow the same pattern around the Big Circle to home.

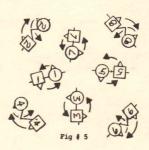

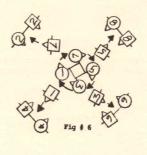


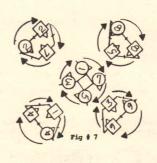


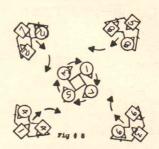


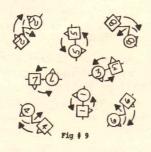


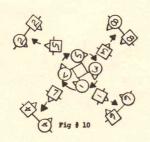




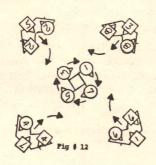


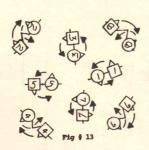


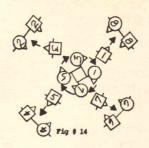


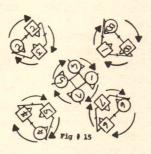


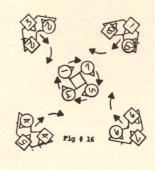


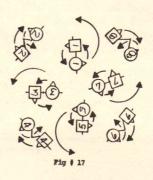


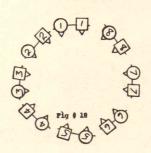












Canadian Instructors' Seminar

Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada has just successfully completed it's first clinic in CLOGGING for people who wished to become instructors. The majority of the credit for this course belongs to Marge Callahan of Florida, Shelia Popwell of Georgia, Lois Elling of California, and to the C.L.O.G. instructors. It was all the knowledge of the clogging activity that they taught me that went into the formation of the manuscript.. Another source of credit belongs to Square Dance Caller Coach Cal Golden. My husband and I attended a forty hour Callerlab Seminar on Square Dance Calling back in 1981. Cal's manuscript was so well done that the format served as an excellent example for my manuscript. With the input of the clogging instructors and the manuscript format from Cal, the balance was a matter of past experience.

The Heritage Dancers supported and encouraged me through this long May weekend. My son, Maurice, stood beside me ALL THE WAY and assisted in teaching this course. (He has become much older than his eighteen physical years.) My husband, George, in my absence, handled all of the household problems and chores so that there would be no distractions from teaching the entire weekend. There are always people who deserve credit but one cannot always remember all of them. It's lovely to find out that you are blessed with friends who care . . . and care deeply.

The course began on Friday evening; information on taps was covered by George who does all the installation for the Heritage Cloggers. Since we had a student who had never clogged before, a few of the beginning basics were covered. This had an additional benefit since the more advanced cloggers got an opportunity to clean-up and clarify their footwork.

On Saturday, we began at 9 AM and concluded at 10:30 PM with lunch and supper breaks. The course content covered: Traditional definitions and abbreviations; balance of basic footwork; rules for 'Angels',

rules for instructors; Traditional/Contemporary/Mixers/Kentucky Circle Dancing; advertising/recruiting/promoting; Contemporary definitions and abbreviations; teaching techniques; routine leveling; class planning; and choreographing a routine.

Sunday also began at 9 AM and ended at 10:30 PM. Subjects covered were: aerobic clogging (what it is); Buck dancing definitions and abbreviations (at the present time) with a mini-workshop; entertainment; equipment/records/microphones/speakers; motivation; C.L.O.G.; The Double Toe Times; and other source material.

Monday was a morning session covering competition; choosing an entertainment team; leadership; organization; and costs.

Routines were taught to give the new instructors a serviceable program for their prospective students. They were taught to read, interpret, and understand cue sheets. Time was given at the microphone to become acquainted with the feeling of being in front of a group. Yes, it was a 'crash' course. It was designed to be just that -- a lot of information in a short span of time. I am happy to say the drop-out rate was NIL!

Clogging is growing rapidly in popularity in Manitoba. There are not enough instructors to go around. There were people interested in teaching clogging, but didn't have a strong enough theoretical knowledge on how to start, continue, and be successful.

I have a vision of clogging being alive and well in Manitoba; of it's survival as a fun activity for all ages (I'm not getting any younger). I believe in the story of the Little Red Hen from our childhood fables. If no one else will do it, believe in yourself and do it! If your motives are honest and your belief is strong enough, you can do it and do it well. Do it again? You betcha!

At the exhibition he could feel it,
And his toe tapping couldn't conceal it,
"If you've got rhythm in your soul,
And happiness is your goal,
This clogging will certainly reveal it."

You practice all those routines with pride
On a hundred foot floor 'til you're satisfied,
But when dancing an exhibition,
It seems to be the tradition
To provide a dance floor ten feet wide.

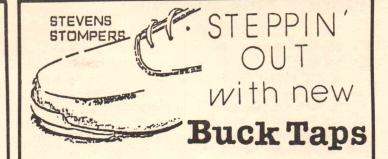

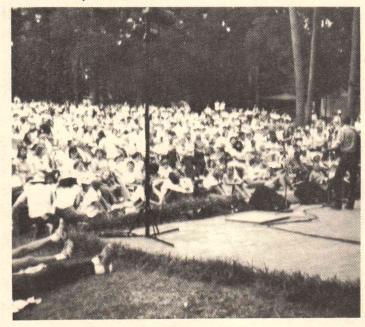
Florida Folk Festival

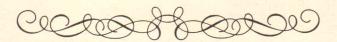

The Peterson Family Little Rock, Arkansas

The Peterson family - David and Donna and their sons Chris (15) and Eric (21) - were nominated for Music Family of the Year by the Pulaski County Music Cotierie.

The Peterson's had been part of Ralph Pierce's clogging entourage of eastern Tennessee in the mid-1970's. When they moved to Arkansas in 1976, there were no clogging groups in central Arkansas, so they started teaching clogging classes and formed The Cadron Creek Cloggers; which in turn became the foundation for a more diverse dance and music group - the Arkansas Country Dance Society which was founded in 1978.

David Peterson received his Ph. D. from Michigan State in 1971 and is currently a math professor at the University of Central Arkansas. He had some formal training in several musical instruments in high school and is self-taught on the hammered dulcimer, violin, guitar, and lap dulcimer. He has taught classes (and judged contests) of mountain and hammered dulcimers.

Donna is a secretary at UCA. She has had formal voice and piano training and plays the lap dulcimer and guitar. She assists David in both dance and dulcimer classes.

Chris Peterson, who just finished ninth grade at Greenbriar High School, is an accomplished Suzuki Violinist and Pianist and plays in the first violin section of the Arkansas Youth Symphony. Chris also learned fiddling the traditional way, from his father and from listening to other fiddlers like Ken Blessing of Little Rock and Bob Atchison of Mountain View. In addition to playing violin, guitar, mandolin, and hammered dulcimer in the family band, Chris plays violin in the Nonesuch Band (a Scotch-Irish band), drums in the Peace Lutheran Church Band, and electric guitar, bass, and keyboard in an informal rock band.

Eric is a senior at Washington University and is studying architecture. He was a member of the Arkansas Boys Choir for five years and studied piano with Francis Monday. He is self-taught on his primary folk instruments: the guitar and the hammered dulcimer.

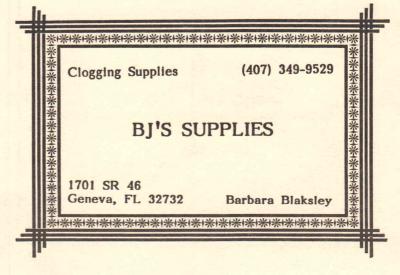
Since moving to Arkansas, David has been making and designing musical instruments. Eric and Chris have also become skilled luthiers in the last seven years. Together they have produced and sold about 250 hammered dulcimers, 25 mountain (lap) dulcimers, 30 bowed psalteries, several plucked psalteries, and this year, a harp.

In 1984, the Arkansas Country Dance Society received a grant from the Arkansas Endowment for the Humanities to produce traditional dance music tapes to accompany the book, Arkansas Country Dances. David produced and directed production of these tapes (84 minutes long) that involved eleven musicians. David played violin and hammered dulcimer; Chris played fiddle; and Eric played piano on various tunes on the tapes which were completed in 1985.

The family has also produced two tapes for commercial distribution titled Live in Europe and Springhill 87.

In 1987, David, Donna, and Chris toured for the Department of Parks and Tourism as part of the Artist in the Parks program.

The Peterson family has performed more than forty musical programs per year for the last several years, and have appeared in concert in eleven states, as well as Germany and France.

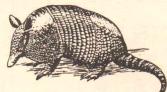

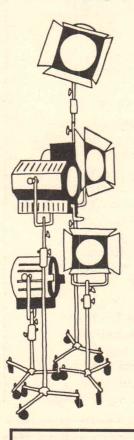
