





I've always liked the old saw that goes "you can catch more flies with honey than you can with vinegar" or the sage "if you can't say something nice, say nothing at all". For the most part I try to do just that in my observations and articles in this publication. It is amusing, therefore, when I write a 'squib' about a situation as I see it (usually local, but sometimes in response to a specific question from a reader in another locale) and immediately get both phone call and letters from a wide unrelated area demanding "how did you know . . . " or "who told you about . . . "! This simply proves that many situations and problems are similar . . nay identical . . in our widening Clogging world.

The most recent "identity crisis" seems to be global in scope. Heavens, I didn't realize my poor words could create such havoc!

This past summer I had a lovely chat with a new Instructor who was genuinely concerned that she was not "qualified" to be an Instructor. "THEY" said she had to pass tests!! I laughed and said "hogwash"! She is the leader of a group of fairly new dancers, and is learning right along with them. In MY book she is an Instructor! (One Instructor friend has just written his first routine, after four years of being the Instructor of two groups, and I don't believe he was ever "tested" or "critiqued" by anyone.) Without any further elaboration, let me state that the Instructor in question is NOT from Australia, nor was I aware of any problems among the growing Australian Clogging community.

From August Front & Center 1988:

The mysterious statement, "I shouldn't be teaching clogging because I haven't passed "the test" " is ludicrous! If you are brave enough to teach clogging to others, you are an Instructor! The fact that one has passed a test doesn't cut any ice with me, the dancers, or most convention planners either!

"In answer to your article which appeared in the August issue of The Double Toe Times re qualifications for Clogging Leaders. The Callers Association of Western Australia asked for guidelines to be set in order to bring Clogging into line with Square and Round dancing in this state, as Clogging has now been affiliated with the Square Dance Society of W.A. for the past four years.


I think the Callers Association should be congratulated in making this stand and in trying to maintain the high standard of dance in Western Australia. What the other states elect to do is entirely their choice, this was a decision made in Western Australia for Western Australia which has been blown out of all proportion." CC to: Edith Sandy - Chairperson Australian Clogging Association; Pauline Elliott - Co-Editor Clogoz; Steve Turner - President W.A. Callers Association.

A complimentary copy of this issue (of the DTT) will be sent to Jean Beatson who is apparently angry. Jean - fill me in, please? What ARE the requirements for a Clogging Instructor to be a member of the Callers Association of Western Australia? Why did you feel that Clogging had to be "brought into line with Square and Round Dancing"? Do your requirements include dress codes and rules of conduct? Must the Instructors ability be tested, and if so who does the testing? If Cloggers are a part of the Callers Associa-

tion, do they have an equal voice, proportionate to their numbers, of course?

Even though my thoughts were filled with vinegary ideas after reading this abrupt, unexpected letter, the next maxim that came to mind was "when in doubt, DON'T"! A Rawlism fo sho!! Okay Jean, the ball is in your court!



Doesn't this feller look lonely? That great big Hall had about 150 dancers and friends in it only minutes before this photo was taken. Sue and Tom Toor are the directors of the Sunshine Cloggers, Maitland, Florida. Sue, a Fourth Grade teacher, had a school Open House on Sunshine's Graduation night, the first Graduation she had ever missed. Since Tom is always playing practical jokes, Sue put the Cloggers up to Stinkering Tom. While Tom was cueing a routine, the entire group, through four doors, just walked out. Long ago, when this was done to Sue, her comment was "It sure keeps an Instructor humble. Without the Dancers, there's no reason for an Instructor to BE there!"

The August 8, 1988 Time magazine had a feature and cover story on Children that was noteworthy. Through the eyes of Children - Growing Up in America Today.

"In an age of broken families, working mothers and perils like drugs, growing up is not easy. . . . First, children do not remain as they are for very long . . . Second something is missing in the lives of many children nowadays. They are looking for someone --- parents, teachers, ministers --- to set limits and impose discipline. Without walls to bounce against, children seem lost."

This Editor, because of personal experience, has long touted the positive 'whole family' recreation to be found in a Clogging Hall. I know of few other activities where adults and children can participate together. Dad plays handball or golf, Mom goes to PTA or Aerobics, Junior has Cubs or Little League, Sis takes ballet and is a Girl Scout. All of these activities are wonderful but after a sometimes 10 hour day of work, school, day-care and car pools, they do little to


foster the 'togetherness' required to transmit family values from one generation to the next.

The things I see on television shock me.
"Movies and TV pour into children a bizarre version of reality." Rock videos, tangled soap operas, talk shows and even off-color game shows "tout sex to children who have no clear idea of what sex is anyway." MTV, with its suggestive rock videos, HBO and Cinemax R-rated violence filled movies are right in our family rooms sans family, with a latch-key youngster watching it all.

Growing up has always been tough. Confused parents, who find their own childhoods so vastly different, have to make new rules and their fight now includes bucking huge Corporations who use any means, both fair and foul, to capture the teen-agers dollars.

I am, therefore, horrified when I attend a Clogging Workshop and watch youngsters in suggestive street-walker attire, or hear lewd off-color remarks made over the microphone by prominent Cloggging Leaders, or see and Instructor turn his or her back and emphasize a suggestive body motion which has nothing to do with the dance.

If we are to continue to promote Clogging for the whole family, and we encounter Leaders whose language and actions are distasteful to many, we'd best use our feet and walk away, and more importantly, take our children with us. Perhaps some preliminary verbiage in contracts with featured Instructors could prevent unfortunate situations from occuring. "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure!"



# West Virginia Clogging Championships

One of the outstanding competitions of the year was held in Charleston, West Virginia and was hosted by the CBS Travelers. The attendance was excellent and consisted of highly competitive teams from all over the Southeast. In West Virginia, you see cloggers that you only see once a year and that in itself makes it a special event and adds to the fun.

Over sixty clogging and smooth teams, bucks and wings, show routines and hundreds of solo's lined up one after another from 9AM to midnight, nonstop clogging. All of this was judged by Lib Mills, Pansy Steele, Ruth Landis, Jeff Driggs, Paul Vaught, Earl Powell, and Bob Phillips.

Highlights of the day included Master City's open precision and lines, Dixie Dew's southern Appalachian smooth, Hickory Flat's hard-driving freestyle dancing, Flatland's Kentucky hoedown and southern Appalachian, and The Electric Company. "Who in the world is The Electric Company?" you ask. In my opinion, they are the most outstanding bluegrass band in all of West Virginia. To give you an idea of how good they are, they play tunes like "Billie in the Lowground", "Sugar in the Gourd", "Mississip-pi Sawyer", "Arkansas Traveler", "Saint Claws", "Golden Slippers", "Turkey in the Straw", "Red Apple Rag", and a long list of others. The last tune of the day was just as peppy as the first. They played for all traditional teams and one precision team. The precision team they played for won Over-All Grand Champion and took hone a handcarved, black walnut, banjo playing hillbilly trophy,

that was carved by an artist who's work is displayed in the Smithsonian. The team director gave The Electric Company credit for help needed to win.

Other noteworthy items were the order of dance and a well planned schedule which kept the teams dancing all day. Each solo number had a name combined with it which was repeated everytime the emcee called the number, a nice personal touch.

The only drawback I noticed was the "solo call back." Everyone who danced at all got called back and in most divisions, the winner got four or five callbacks. Solo competition lasted over four hours with no surprises at the end.

This festival was so good and enjoyable to everyone that it would serve no purpose to name the winners of the trophies. Everyone who danced and gave it their all, won, and the real rewards were good fellowship, good dancing, good competition, and renewing old friendships.

# 6th Canadian National Square & Round Convention

The first full clogging program at a Canadian national convention was held in Hamilton, Ontario on August 4 - 6, 1988. Approximately 300 cloggers were registered for the event, and the room was in high gear from start to finish. Eleven clogging leaders from four provinces and two from the United States taught various levels of dances. Each evening there was a dance party following the teach. Groups from many areas put on clogging demonstrations for the enjoyment of all.

On Thursday, August 4th, the Maple Leaf Cloggers, under the direction of Shirley McConnell, gave a demonstration of clogging for the Showcase Program. On Thursday evening, the same group performed two other clogging numbers, and on the Saturday evening for the entertainment portion of the program, the Maple Leaf Cloggers were joined by cloggers from Cambridge, Ontario, under the direction of Jack and Dorothy McCulloch and dancers from Toronto, Markham, Aurora, and Scarborough under the direction of Sylvia Hunka.

Outside the Copp's Coliseum the heat and humidity were almost unbearable, while inside the airconditioned clogging room, the dancers warmed up to a number of new routines and then danced the evening away to a number of more familiar numbers. All a clogger needs to get started is to hear a good, lively piece of music and immediately they are up on the floor.

Introduction to clogging sessions were held each day of the convention, and over 400 people participated. Likewise, some of the cloggers saw square and round dancing for the first time, and some went to dance in the contra room.

The square dancers may have noticed in some of the demonstration routines that there were California twirls, swings, box-the-gnat and swat-the-flea and other square dance moves being used. Those round dancers in the introduction to clogging room could easily relate to the vine and the rock step.

A clogging register is presently being prepared, and we would ask that anyone send information regarding their club: name, address, nights, times, and level of dance and any comments to us at 1221 Springwood Crescent, Oakville, Ontario, Canada, L6M 1V8.

We look forward to the 7th Canadian National Square and Round Dance Convention and heartily endorse a full clogging program. We would be pleased to assist in any way we can.

#### Take a Little Peek

The Contra & Traditional Committee of CALLER-LAB announces the Traditional Dance for the fourth quarter of 1988 -- Take a Little Peek. This dance is particularly useful for first night lessons and one night stands. We recommend this dance as a good starting point to any caller who would like to begin using a few traditional figures. It's contents are also consistent with use in the community dance program.

Take a Little Peek (a.k.a. Take a Peek)

Formation: Square

Music: Any good hoedown with a country sound or a strong fiddle lead such as: Grenn "Cinnamon Twist", Red Boot "Smokey Mountain Breakdown", TNT "Stallion Grey".

Example Introduction:

All jump up and never come down, Swing your honey around and round, Swing her high and swing her low, Promenade around you go.

\* \* \* \* \* \*

Figure:

First (2nd, 3rd, 4th) couple bow and then you swing

Lead on out to the right of the ring

Go around that couple and Take a Little Peek\*
Back to your own and swing your sweet (or cheat)

Around that couple and peek once more Now circle up four in the middle of the floor

Leave that couple go on to the next\*\*

\*Repeat from here with couples 3 and 4

\*\*After dancing with the last couple; for "on to the next" substitute "go back home" and add an ending such as "Everybody dance and everybody swing -- Now promenade that pretty little thing."



# ACHF's Annual Grand Championships

America's Clogging Hall of Fame (ACHF), a non-profit organization, was formed in 1984 and is heavily involved in the sanctioning of clogging competitions and the attendant Rules and Interpretations, Score Sheets, Judges, and Calendar. It is also devoted to honoring past and present leaders in the clogging community through annual inductions into the Hall of Fame and the forty-eight member All-American Team composed of current, top dancers from all over the country. They also award two college scholarships to outstanding high school seniors/cloggers every year.

ACHF's home base is The Stompin' Ground in Maggie Valley, North Carolina, and all Hall of Fame honorees' placques adorn the walls of the lobby. A Spring Workshop and Fall Competition are held in The Stompin' Ground with the Fall Competition incorporating annual honors, the presentation of Hall of Famers, and the All-American Team. Members receive free admission to both. All first, second, and third place winners from ACHF sanctioned competitions are invited to compete at the Fall Competition with no registration fee. NCHC has been invited to participate by sending their winners to the Fall Competition in Maggie Valley. The Ben Smathers Award, given to the highest scoring winner for male and female (over sixteen years old), will receive an invitation to dance on the Grand Old Opry (at Ben Smathers' discretion).

### HEAT

Last summer's blistering heat wave caused an outbreak of heat-related illnesses. Emergency rooms across the country were crowded with victims. Over 1,000 people in the southwestern United States died; others were left permanently disabled.

In one southeastern state where the temperatures ranged up to 105°F, 118 people died. The tragedy is that heat-related illnesses are preventable.

Certain groups of people can be identified as high-risk in relation to these illnesses. Athletes and military personnel who are undergoing rigorous training and conditioning in hot, humid weather are particularly vulnerable.

Anytime there is a combination of poor air circulation, ambient temperature that is close to body temperature, and high humidity, the setting is ripe for heat-related illnesses.

If high environmental temperatures persist over a period of several months, acclimatization usually occurs. This requires gradual daily exposure to high temperatures.

There are three types of heat-related illness: heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

Heat Cramps. These are intermittent, painful contractions of skeletal muscles. These cramps often occur in acclimatized individuals who replace the fluid lost in sweat by drinking water, but do not replace sodium. The sodium depletion is believed to be responsible for the cramps. Heat cramps usually occur in muscles that have been involved in strenuous activity - most often those of the legs. The cramps last a few minutes and generally disappear spontaneously. With heat cramps, the body temperature is normal and the serum sodium may be normal or low.

The treatment is to replace sodium with salt tablets or an electrolyte solution.

Heat Exhaustion. This is the most common heatrelated illness seen clinically. Excessive salt and/or water loss due to sweating account for the symptons, which include central nervous system disturbances, such as headache, dizziness, weakness and irritability; and gastrointestinal disturbances, such as nausea and vomiting.

Patients are generally sweating profusely, and body temperature may be mildly elevated. Since these symptoms are not exclusive to heat exhaution, Page 10

the history of exposure to hot, humid weather is necessary to make a diagnosis.

Treatment of heat exhaustion is rest, a cool environment, and intravenous replacement of sodium and water. If untreated, heat exhaustion can progress to heat stroke.

Heat Stroke. This is the most serious of the heat-related disorders. It is characterized by a body temperature of at least 40.6°C (105°F), central nervous system disturbances, and usually, a lack of sweating that results from unexplained failure, or exhaustion, of the sweat glands. The patient's mental status may vary from agitation or confusion to lethargy, stupor, or coma.

Heat-related illnesses can be prevented. Persons engaging in strenuous activities during hot weather should limit the activity to the cooler times of the day. Acclimatization is accomplished by gradual exposure to hot weather - 10 to 15 minute increments over a period of 10 to 20 days. Full acclimatization may, however, require up to two months. There is a misconception that because one runs three miles at 7 o'clock every morning when it is cool, he/she can compete at 9 AM in a running meet when it is hot, and expect to be acclimatized. Such a misconception could prove life threatening.

Salt tablets are beneficial, but must be accompanied by an increased amound of fluid. The drinks consumed during exercise might include electrolyterich products (Gatorade, Thirst Quencher); however, most juices, canned drinks (especially diet drinks), and buttermilk contain sodium.

When temperatures are unusually high, strenuous outdoor activities should be canceled, and individuals should be cautioned against starting weight reduction programs that include heavy exercise.

Clothing should be light-weight, light-colored, and loose-fitting. In addition, as little clothing as possible should be worn indoors. If it is necessary to go outside, clothing should cover as much skin as possible, and direct sunlight should be avoided. Shade can be created by a parasol or wide-brimmed hat. For those accustomed to air conditioning, going outside should be limited to cooler times of the day. Exertion should be minimal, and adequate hydration is imperative.

Editor's Note: Due to a recent tragedy involving a heat stroke, related death, we have had many requests via mail and phone to reprint this article from the July 1984 issue. May we suggest that instructors and directors copy this article for their dancers.

# The CHICKEN Came First!



by Bobbie Adams

This morning I made deviled eggs for a Labor Day picnic this afternoon. It has been such a long time since I've made deviled eggs that I had to get some help from my tattered, 1956 Better Homes and Gardens Cookbook. While waiting for the eggs to hardcook (not hard boil, mind you), I read through all the egg recipes, all twenty-six of them, with variations. The incredible, edible egg!

All my genuine farm friends will probably laugh when they read this, but my experiences with the producer of eggs - THE CHICKEN - for the most part was one of my most delightful memories of THE FARM. We bought pullets, two dozen I think, White Leghorns. The chicken house was ready with neat boxes on the wall in tiers and metal feeder troughs, glass waterers, and oystershell pan, all filled. The first, small pullet eggs took a whole days production to make a breakfast for six people. We went out and bought more pullets.

Another four dozen, as I recall. That made a total of seventy-two chickens, and though we lost a few chickens in the beginning, we were soon bringing nearly sixty eggs per day from the barn. The children 'sanded' the eggs to clean the shells. This, for my city friends, is exactly what it sounds like a wooden-handled buffer with sandpaper attached to lightly clean any dirt from the eggs.

I learned quickly that fresh eggs could be kept at room temperature for quite a while; that fresh eggs simply cannot be peeled; that twenty-six egg recipes were not enough! Our three dogs and seventeen cats had their diet supplemented by fresh, raw eggs every day. Four to six dozen was the rule for egg salad; the family got to the point where they begged for corn flakes in the morning. We delivered free eggs to friends and family gladly.

Thinking that we could sell some of the surplus eggs to pay for the chicken feed, we discovered that our neighbor, who had 10,000 chickens, had cornered the local market. Through our Agway feed store, whom we supported handsomely, we heard about a health food store owner who was looking for organically grown vegetables. Our garden was definitely organic - pure horse manure as fertilizer (nine horses) and no chemical bug sprays since we'd not had time to bother. Contact was made, and once a week he would arrive to purchase whatever was ripe. When he saw the wire baskets filled with eggs, he was at first ecstatic and then crestfallen. In order for him to sell the eggs as 'organic', we Page 18

had to 1) feed the chickens chemical-free feed; 2) have a rooster! The chicken feed was easy - Agway had it - and it was even a dollar less per hundred weight. The rooster was a bit more difficult to find. A local farm boy was raising a Penn State experimental flock, and we acquired the most incredible, multi-colored, big rooster I've ever seen. He was promptly dubbed "Gregory Peck" and every morning he crowed his joy at his work. Our organic buyer was delighted and every week brought egg boxes and hauled away the extra eggs at a far better price per dozen than my neighbor got for his eggs.

As we began to close up the Pennsylvania farm for our move to Florida, I had nightmares about what to do with the chickens. One morning, I was watching the Aussie Galloping Gourmet on TV. He be-bopped onto the screen and plopped a scrawny, plucked chicken on the counter. "The ONLY chicken one should use for broth and stock and certain recipes is an older, scrawny chicken!" he declared. The fate of our Leghorns was sealed. They were crated and delivered to a chicken processing plant in Doylestown, and a week later I picked up cleaned, frozen birds. They were tough! I cooked four to six at a time for the better part of a day, but they made wonderful pies and croquettes.

And so ends my chicken story. If you are fortunate enough to have chickens, a rooster, chemical-free feed, and are within an hour's drive from Orlando, let me know! I haven't had a fresh egg in years, and i have fifty-nine egg recipes!

P.S. "Gregory Peck" went back to the neighbor's farm to retire! P.P.S. If anyone has a sick chicken, I have a 'kill or cure' PEPPER BALL Remedy!





#### Use Your Head When it Comes To Your Feet

This article is a follow-up to last months' article on foot care. Information on foot-strengthening exercises was given last month and my own experience with foot injuries was shared. In this article, I have provided illustrations of foot-stretching exercises and will discuss foot supports/shock absorption.

I can think of no other form of dance or athletic activity that has so neglected the attention that should be given the feet and legs of its participants as has clogging. As clogging has developed to be a sometimes strenous and athletic activity, it has become imperative that emphasis be placed on foot care. Runners now have many choices of excellent foot wear that provide protection from injury. Much research was done in order to properly design appropriate running shoes. There are shoes for aerobics, basketball, baseball, tennis, ballet, jazz, etc. Are there shoes for clogging?

Oh sure, there are vendors who advertise shoes for clogging. But, do they have good arch supports? Do they have cushioning in the balls and heels of the shoe? Do they provide lateral support? Do the soles allow adequate slippage so the knee joints are not atrained? My answer to these questions is NO!!! Clogging utilizes different muscles and provides different tensions on the feet and legs than other activities. Therefore, the shoes that you walk in that feel so comfortable may be awful choice to clog in.

If you clog at all--especially if you clog a lot-consider some form of cushioning in your shoes, Forget the Dr. Scholls pads. They are useless. They flatten over time and provide little support. An economical and better choice are SPENCO supports. I have found these in running stores and large sporting goods stores. They will not lose their elasticity over time and provide very good cushioning. I promise you that if you get used to them you will never believe that you danced without them. They tend to make your shoe tighter so I have had to order shoes ½ size larger to accommodate them. I like the ones with flexible arch supports.

As a result of my injuries, I have been forced to move to more expensive supports called ORTHOTICS. These are made from a cast formed by each foot. In other words, they are tailor-made foot supports. They will cost you anywhere from \$200-\$300. For me it was never a choice. I could not clog without them. I now wear they every time I dance and most of the other times that I am in shoes. My injuries have virtually disappeared as a result of the

supports and exercises that I have outlined. I have read where approximately 75% of professional football players wear them.

We are just learning how damaging that concrete, asphalt, astroturf, etc. are on our feet. I believe that if I had restricted my clogging to wooden floors that I probably would not need orthotics today--- but that would have restricted 90% of my clogging!!!

Foot-stretching exercises are so important!!! Not only will stretching aid you in avoiding injuries, it will make you a more flexible dancer! Not a bad side effect huh? Below are illustrated foot-stretching exercises. Try them and notice the difference--expecially the day after.

I hope that these articles have been helpful to you. I'm still learning about foot care, I have to if I want to clog when I'm 70. I hope your're there with me!

STRETCHING



#### PLANTAR FLEXION

- 1. Kneel or sit on the edge of a chair.
- 2. Point your toe and place the top part of your foot on the floor.
- 3. Slowly press your ankle and foot into the floor until you feel a stretch.


HOLD FOR COUNT OF 10



#### ACHILLES STRETCH

- 1. Lean on wall.
- 2. Keep heel of back foot on the ground.
- 3. Slowly lean forward until a stretch is felt.

HOLD FOR COUNT OF 10-REPEAT 6 TIMES



#### HAMSTRING AND ACHILLES STRETCH

- 1. Lie on your back.
- 2. Using a strap, lift your leg with your knee straight and ankle fully bent toward your head.
- 3. Hold this stretch position for 10 counts then push down with your foot for 3 counts.
- 4. Relax your muscles as you bring your leg up to the stretch position again.

REPEAT 6 TIMES FOR A TOTAL OF 60 SECONDS

\*Do not go any higher than you can with your knee straight.



#### QUAD STRETCH

- 1. Stand erect.
- Grasp ankle or foot.
   Move leg backward from your hip.

4. Do not lean forward with your trunk or arch your back.

HOLD FOR 10 SECONDS-REPEAT 6 TIMES


