Then and Now

When I was a child we didn't have clogging classes where we could learn steps and figures. My Father clogged and part of what he taught me was called buck dancing. It was not the same buck dancing as we know today. We didn't have taps

on our shoes. However, a few, mostly men, had those half-moon metal pieces on their heels and toes. The metal pieces were put on the heels and toes to make the shoes last longer. All of this brings a question to mind ... when and where did cloggers begin to use taps. or was it picked up from the tap dancers?

We learned steps and figures at the Saturday night street dances, which were called square dances (not the same as we know today). We danced in one big circle. Since the caller danced as well, all of the calling was done from the floor. The acoustical band was on the 'stage', which was actually the sidewalk in front of the hardware store. The streets were blocked off and cornmeal was thrown down to help make dancing easier. The dress code was simple ... ladies wore dresses or

skirts, men wore pants, jeans or overalls. Everyone wore flat soled shoes.

Look where we are today! It's hard to grasp how it has all come about. In each part of the country the change has happened at a different pace, time and style. We have groups that insist on the up and down motion, while others say it must have a shuffling back and forth. There is low to the floor footwork, high-stepping, high leg lifts and kicks. With some dancers, the body moves all over, and with others the top part of the body stays straight while the bottom half goes loose and moves. The hands swing the skirts, arms and hands fly everywhere, arms hang loosely to the side ... different patterns for hand and arm movement to match their footwork. Jumps, stomps, skips, sways, slides, drags, slurs,

rushes, chugs ... lots of movement, and everyone is sure his or hers is the best and only way for clogging to be done.

It is easier teaching today in buildings with good floors and lots of space. Jim Hilton [and others] have provided us with great sound systems, turntables with variable speed, to speed up or slow down as we

> wish. The systems allow the use of a cassette player to both record and play. Microphones with long cords or remote mikes are available to make teaching from the floor easier.

Moving the clothing, into ladies now wear dresses and skirts (short or long), blouses or T-shirts, full slips or no slip, shorts, pants, jeans, overalls (short or long), bare legs, pantyhose, anklets style be any Men wear

stockings. and knee socks. Shoes can color, with or without taps, large or small taps and tennis shoes with taps. jeans. pants, shorts, overalls, longer short sleeve shirts, T-shirts, caps, cowboy hats, shoes of all descriptions, even with taps covering the entire sole of the shoe.

Costumes for exhibitions and contests are absolutely magnificent. We have special bags for shoes, shoe polish, foot pads, ribbons, shoe strings, ties, jackets with logos, etc

The record business must have felt the impact of clogging too. We are always looking for that special piece of music suitable for a routine, either exhibition or competition. We're all on the lookout for a new idea and that certain piece of music that will bring our ideas to life. At one time we used only country and bluegrass music. We now have many choices and it is hard to choose. There is western, pop, classical, rock and roll, new wave and music from other countries, all available on records and cassettes. Additionally, there are still live bands who are willing to play for the clogger's pleasure.

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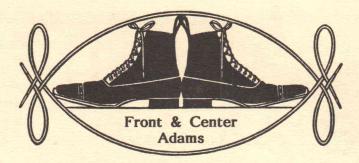

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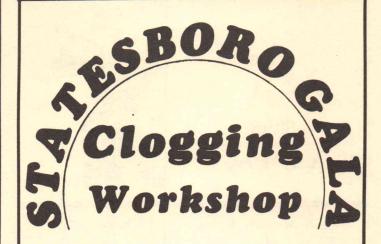

Rise and Shine GINA ZARAGOZA



Perth. Western Australia is the home of 'the mother of clogging' in this country. Her name: Gina Zaragoza. Gina had been square dancing for several years and accidentally stumbled across clogging while reading the American National Square Dance Directory containing a notice written by Shelia Popwell. Gina advertised Australia-wide for any information about this particular dance form, but no one knew anything about it. As a result, she corresponded directly with Shelia, organized the delivery of her first clogging video, and in January, 1983, proceeded to teach herself this unique activity. Three months later, she started to share her knowledge and began teaching, which in turn saw the birth of the Kangaroo Kloggers Klub, with an initial twelve members.

Whenever she was confronted with a problem or needed assistance, there was no one in Australia who could help. Needless to say, her telephone bill increased dramatically with calls to the USA, and her correspondence likewise. Through her subscription to the Flop-Eared Mule, she learned of the first National CLOG Convention in Mobile, Alabama in 1984 and made the long journey to see 'live' clogging for the first time and to learn from the top instructors. She has since attended all five nationals and as many classes as humanly possible, and has maintained contact with the friends she made on each annual pil-

grimage to the mecca of clogging.

In 1985, Gina and her cloggers auditioned for, and were successfully included in, the programme for the 26th Australian National Square Dance Convention in Perth, Western Australia. Later that year, on her way to the 2nd National CLOG Convention in Louisville, Kentucky, she stopped over in Sydney, New South Wales and gave a short clogging demo and mini-workshop at the "East Meets West" square dance function.

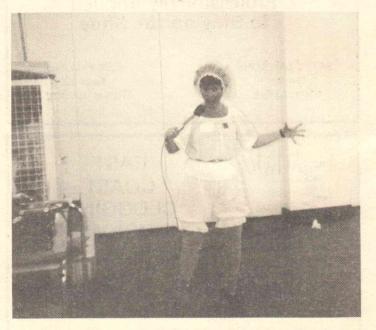
In 1986, Gina was requested to again present clogging at the 27th National Square Dance Convention held in Adelaide, South Australia, after which clogging became accepted by the square dance movement throughout the country. This was a breakthrough at the time, as clogging was still very much in it's infancy in Australia. Between 1983 and April 1987 (when the Australian Clogging Association was formed), Gina was the leading light in Australia, supplying videos, records, cue sheets, and taps to various states throughout Australia and New Zealand.

The club has grown from the original twelve members in 1983 to fifty plus in 1989, with other groups springing up throughout the state, the leaders of which received their clogging knowledge directly or indirectly from Gina. Meanwhile, her adult display

team has clogged for several different charitable organizations and some of the team members, over the last eighteen months, have been involved in three talent quests, winning two first prizes and being runner-up in the third. Gina is now is the process of forming her first children's team --- to be known as the Kangaroo Kloggers Klub Joeys. (A Joey is a baby kangaroo.)

Gina is also employed by the Education Department of Western Australia to teach clogging at various schools in the metropolitan area. In her spare time, she is training at a local radio station and will soon have her own country and western programme, in which she will feature her clogging music (of course!). During 1988, she was interviewed six times on local radio, and has appeared twice on television, each time advocating the fun and health aspects of clogging. Through her groundwork, clogging is now a healthy juvenile down-under, and with clogging leaders like Gina, the activity will continue to grow and flourish into adulthood. Our thanks to Gina for being curious all those years ago; catching the clogging bug; and spreading the 'epidemic'.

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Dealing with a 'HOTDOG' in Your Class

One of the most common and frustrating of problems that a teacher must eventually face in teaching public classes is that of dealing with 'hotdogs'. I will attempt to delineate between enthusiastic, creative dancers and 'showoffs/hotdogs'.

Enthusiastic and creative dancers are largely driven by their love for the artform. Motivation stems from internal satisfaction derived from expressing themselves through dance. These dancers are refreshing to watch and their exuberance is a testimony to their love and dedication to the dance.

'Hotdogs' are driven by their love of attention.
Their motivation is derived largely from the adoration and attention that is received externally from others.
Their dancing is often at the expense of others where they tend to separate themselves from others rather than join with others.

Before we get into how to manage 'hotdogs' in your classes, let's look at the development that takes place when a good dancer becomes a 'hotdog'. First of all, hotdoggers are generally good dancers. By being good dancers, attention is drawn to them by virtue of their skill level. They usually start out innocently enough just being excited about learning how to clog. As they improve, usually much faster than those with whom they are in class, they receive yet more attention, and it is very positive. Make no mistake about it, people are enjoying watching them, and they begin to enjoy being watched. People come up and say, "You know, I could watch you dance for hours." When they hear something like that over and over, there are several ways to begin to respond internally. Allow me to illustrate.

If the choice is made to view the compliment as a sign that their love of the dance is pleasing to others, and they are a joy to watch, then the praise will strengthen the relationship between dancer and audience. I saw a beautiful example of this during the past summer at the Ozark Mountain Center in Arkansas. During the afternoon, several employees there would break into free style dancing with a live band in the background. The contact between audience and dancer was marvelous to behold. Each enhanced the presence of the other.

If dancers choose to view the compliment as a sign of 'specialness', then they are creating several traps that will change their internal motivation for dancing. When dancers view themselves as special, the tendency is for separation, not joining to occur with others. The tendency is to become so self-absorbed that dancing is not fun unless they are receiving constant reassurance of their specialness. This is reflected in 'lonering' where the dancers sit out the big sets, squares, etc., but will dance free style where they can have sole attention. With line dancers, they will not be content to stay in the back where embellishment of the line dance will not irritate others, but will take front row center and

'recreate' the line dance to their own tastes. This way, attention can be drawn to them.

In classes, hotdogs often are a major distraction for the teacher in that they will hold 'clinics' off in a corner; park themselves on the front row exhibiting 'extra' footwork'; and in other ways struggle with the instructor for the class's attention. Some do's and don'ts:

- Don't Ignore their behavior, it probably will only get progressively worse. Avoidance of the situation can be an implicit sign to the hotdog that you really aren't very bothered by their behavior.
- Don't Assume that the person is aware of what impact they are having upon others. They are usually so caught up in their specialness that they can't imagine that they are irritating others. If they are aware, they usually explain it away as jealousy on the part of the other person.
- Do Talk to them alone and explain how their behavior is impacting you and others. Give them a chance to make a change in their behavior.
- Do Allow personal embellishment of line dancers, but only if they are in the back row and only when others are also dancing. No dancing while you are talking.
- Do Make it clear that you are the instructor and that your are in charge of the class.
- Do Take the risk of losing this student --- if not, you will risk losing many others that are being irritated. You may have to suggest that the student take higher-level classes elsewhere; attend workshops; or join a competition team if they are 'bored' with the level that you are teaching.

Enthusiastic, creative step-makers. We need you to blazon new trails and to inject us with your individual vitality for the dance. You are a gift to us all ... but as in all things, you've got to keep a sense of perspective. Teachers, it is your job to help them do so.

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Circle 8 Ranch

The Circle 8 Ranch in eastern Washington (state) is a group owned, dance oriented "camp", a concept often dreamed about by many dancers today. Much of the following information was gleaned from Editors Ken and Ginny Trimble's article in the September 1988 Footnotes published by the Square and Folk

Dance Federation of Washington.

In 1971, several families, with boundless imagination, enthusiasm and energy purchased 80 acres of forest land on the Eastern slopes of the Cascade Mountains near Easton, Washington. A Corporation was formed. After many months of donated labor, the Circle 8 Ranch was born. The group laid plywood down on an open concrete slab which had been part of a lodge which had burned down years before. Both guests and members ignored the restroom in the middle of the dance floor (part of the original lodge) and had a great time in spite of interruptions by infrequent rain. Campfires at night, singing, story telling, after parties, dancing and outstanding potlucks more than made up for the minor inconveniences posed by the primitive conditions. After seventeen years of hard work with little financial return, the ranch members built a rustic and spacious hall (a good floor and great acoustics), a restroom facility with showers, two A-Frame cabins, and have 100 RV camping spots with water and electrical hook-ups.

Dancing and clogging are in a Hall with a 3200 square foot wood floor and an elevated stage for the Callers. The Hall also contains a kitchen and a

"bring your favorite chair" seating area.

Immediately surrounding the Ranch are miles of forested trails to hike and streams to fish. Located nearby are both State and National Parks, the historic towns of Roslyn, Ronald, Easton, and Cle Elum, active and abandoned gold mines, and a 9-hole golf course.

Nature is in abundance at Circle 8, from the salamanders in the lake, to the deer and elk that visit the camp ground. In 1987 about 30 bird houses were put up around the ranch to house a variety of birds. In 1988 there was a dramatic increase in bird activity and population, especially the cedar wax-wings. In the evening around the time the sun goes down just before dusk, the birds put on a spectacular show over the lake. The Circle 8 Ranch has an ad this issue for two 1989 Clogging functions.

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The Audio Cassette Like the Bumblebee, Never Meant to Fly (or, "How to Record Better Audio Cassettes")

Have you heard the story about the bumblebee? How, when entomologists studied this little creature, they reached the conclusion that it was impossible for him to fly? Fortunately for him, this little fella never read that study and keeps on going about his merry way! The story of the audio cassette bears a close kin to that of the common bumblebee.

The audio cassette was originally developed by Philips Corporation of Europe as a means of providing voice support for visual, or slide presentations. With the technology of that day, the cassette was never meant to reproduce quality music. Fortunately, modern technology has come a long way, and quality music reproduction on audio cassette is now a reality.

Audio tape is --- quite literally --- RUST. Very small particles of iron oxide are deposited onto a mylar backing and held in place by a special adhesive. When this "tape" is transported past the record head of your tape recorder, small electronic currents produce a magnetic field that magnetizes the iron particles on the tape in the exact pattern of your music and voice.

If you take a blank cassette and play it on your recorder and turn the volume level all the way up, you will probably hear a hissing or "SSSHHHHHHHH" sound. This is because the iron particles are not arranged in any special or useful pattern. What you hear is known as "noise." When you record, you magnetize various amounts of these particles. If you increase the record level, you eventually reach the point where you can no longer magnetize any more particles. The tape is then said to be "saturated." Further increasing the record level will not magnetize any more particles. Conversely, it will cause those magnetized particles to no longer be a faithful reproduction of your music and voice. It will sound harsh and gritty. This is known as "distortion." It is between the noise and saturation that we wish to record. And the metering system of your recorder is designed to help you make the best use of this area of your tapes.

Types of Tape:

There are many brands of cassette tapes, but only three types. Type IV is known as metal tape. Metal tape is the highest quality, the most expensive, and probably the least used. Chromium dioxide, or CRO2, is known as Type II. Most major brands are not a pure chromium dioxide. It is a formula that they call "high bias --- high EQ." It is the best choice for our music usage. Ferric oxide, known as Type I is used primarily for voice reproduction, but can be used for non-critical music as well. Several years ago a major professional audio publication did a comparison of the major brands of CRO2 or equivalent (Type II), audio cassettes. They found no significant difference in quality between all the brands tested. So whether you prefer TDK, Maxwell, Sony,

3M, or any other major brand, the best choice is a CRO2 or equivalent.

What length should you use? Stay as short as possible. Many people chose a C-60 or C-90 and put one song on the front of the tape. This is a waste of tape, and can put unnecessary drag on your tape player. Finally, stay away from off-brand or bargain basement tapes. A critical [clogging] performance or competition is no place to economize.

For those interested readers, C-10 audio cassettes loaded with chromium dioxide tape, are available for

purchase from:

Steve's Electronic Services 618 S. Golden Prados Diamond Bar, CA 91765

C-10 cassettes are five minutes per side --- just long enough to contain one song per side for performances, competitions, or classes. The cost is 75¢ per tape, including the plastic Norelco box. If you do not wish the box, the cost is 65¢ per tape. Orders must be in quantities of 100, and must be prepaid. Please include 6.5% sales tax, and \$3.00 shipping charge.

Cassette Machines:

Cassette recorders come in many shapes and sizes. The quality of your recordings will depend on the quality of your recorder. Look for a machine that has a good metering system. Your recorder should be capable of recording all three types of tape (mentioned earlier). You should be able to manually adjust the record and playback levels. If at all possible, get one with a speed control. It might be worth your while to buy a good, portable, monaural recorder. Marantz makes one. Some research may scare up one or two others.

Metering Systems:

This is the heart of the recording process, and the key to making good tapes. Music is complex waveform, and the two different metering systems measure that waveform in different ways. Let's take a look at them. The first system is called a VU (volume units) meter. It is generally round or square in shape, and contains a needle that moves from left to right in step with the music. A scale consisting of an arc that is partly yellow/amber/red, is located behind the needle. Because of the construction of this meter, it measures an average of the music and voice that you are recording. Set your record level so that the meter, most of the time, is hovering around the 0 or 100% section of the scale, which should be at the top of the yellow/amber section. An occasional excursion into the red area is acceptable, but more than that will cause trouble.

The second type of metering system is usually characterized by two separate, narrow columns of lights. These lights are either fluorescent material that produces a bluish-white/amber display, or LED's (light-emitting diodes) that glow green/amber/red. These meters respond faster than the VU and should be used differently. Set the record level so the music, most of the time, "peaks" or illuminates all the LED's except for the top one or two.

These procedures are recommended starting points. Make some test recordings using these methods, and play them back, listening to them critically. A little

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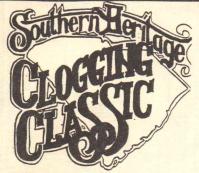


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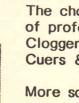
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3rd Annual Indian River POW WOW

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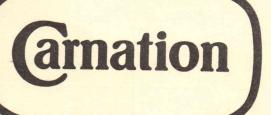
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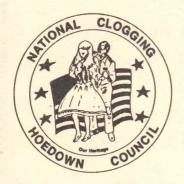
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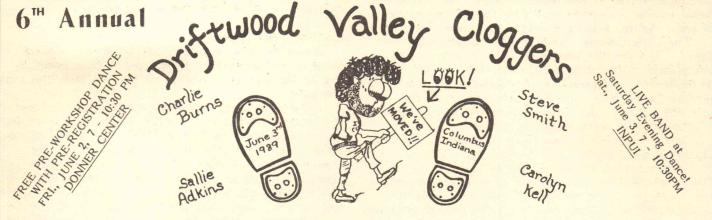

experimentation will help you find the best settings to use on your recorder.

Recording Your Tapes:

When recording your tapes, listen to the music first. Most songs start out low in level, and then gradually become louder. Some songs have critical beats or counts at the beginning that you need for a lead-in or cue. If you can't hear them, you could miss your cue. Increase the record level so these beats register properly on your meter. Then, adjust (or "ride") the level downward as necessary throughout the music. This will require your attention during the recording process, but will result in a constant, even level of music over the entire song -- a consistency needed for good performance tapes. A little practice will help you perfect this technique.

Try to use blank tapes whenever possible. At the end of your music, turn the record level completely down and allow the tape to continue recording for thirty seconds to make sure there is nothing on the

tape after your music.

Cassettes contain a colored leader at the beginning and end of the tape. Put your recorder in record and watch the supply side of the cassette. This is the left side that has all the tape. You can usually see the leader tape unwind and disappear. When this happens, push the pause button on your machine to temporarily stop the motion of the tape. Get ready to play your music. This avoids the problem of missing the beginning of your music because the tape is still in the leader section. It will also avoid having too much tape pass before the music begins. Again, a little practice will work wonders.

What about using Dolby or DBX noise reduction? Don't. The bottom line is keep it simple. Don't complicate things with noise reduction. It really won't make a difference in the success of your performance. You can't be guaranteed that the machine used to play back your music will be able

to decode your noise reduction properly.

Should you record your tapes in stereo? Most of us own a good quality stereo machine. Albums and 45's are recorded in stereo. Keep in mind that most places where you may perform or compete are not set up to play back stereo. It gets combined in the audio mixer and comes out mono to you and your audience. If something is not connected properly in the playback system, (or was not connected properly in your recording system), you could very well lose the bass information you need to provide the beat to which you dance, or the voice could suddenly disappear from your song.

Be Kind to the Sound Operator:

It is always best to have your music recorded at the proper speed before your performance. Don't depend on the sound mixer to increase or decrease the speed of your music. He may not have a variablespeed recorder, and if he does, he is usually so swamped with things to do that he could easily forget to change the speed back to normal for the next group. Hence that group winds up dancing their routine faster or slower than they practiced. And that group could very well be yours! How do you Page 20

record your music at the proper speed? Use a variable- speed recorder when you make your master tapes. If you need to speed the music up one notch, then record your music with the speed control set slower by one notch. If you need to slow the music down by two notches, then record the music with the speed control set faster by two notches. Play the recorded music back at normal speed, and it should be about right. A little experimentation will help you find the right speed setting. Another way would be to use a variable-speed turntable. Simply set the speed where it should be before you record your music.

Care of Your Machine:

Taking care of your cassette recorder is essential for good tapes. Periodically clean the heads and rubber pinch roller with a Q-tip soaked in isopropyl alcohol. Your dealer or other qualified person can show you how to do this. Have the head alignment checked and adjusted by a dealer or reputable person.

There are things you can do to determine if your machine needs servicing. When you first buy it or have it aligned, record some music on your machine that is rich in high frequencies like banjos, fiddles, guitars, cymbals, etc. Keep this tape as a reference. Use it periodically to check your recorder. Play it back. If it sounds as good as it did the day you recorded it, then your machine is still okay. If you don't have a reference tape, then make a recording on your machine, and play it back on several others. If it sounds good on other machines (again, rich in high frequencies) then your machine is still good. If it sounds muddy or muffled on other machines, then your machine may need to be cleaned; the alignment adjusted; or even have the head replaced.

Care of Your Tapes:

Avoid damage to your tapes by always storing them in the protective plastic boxes they come in. Better the box gets crushed or broken, than the tape damaged.

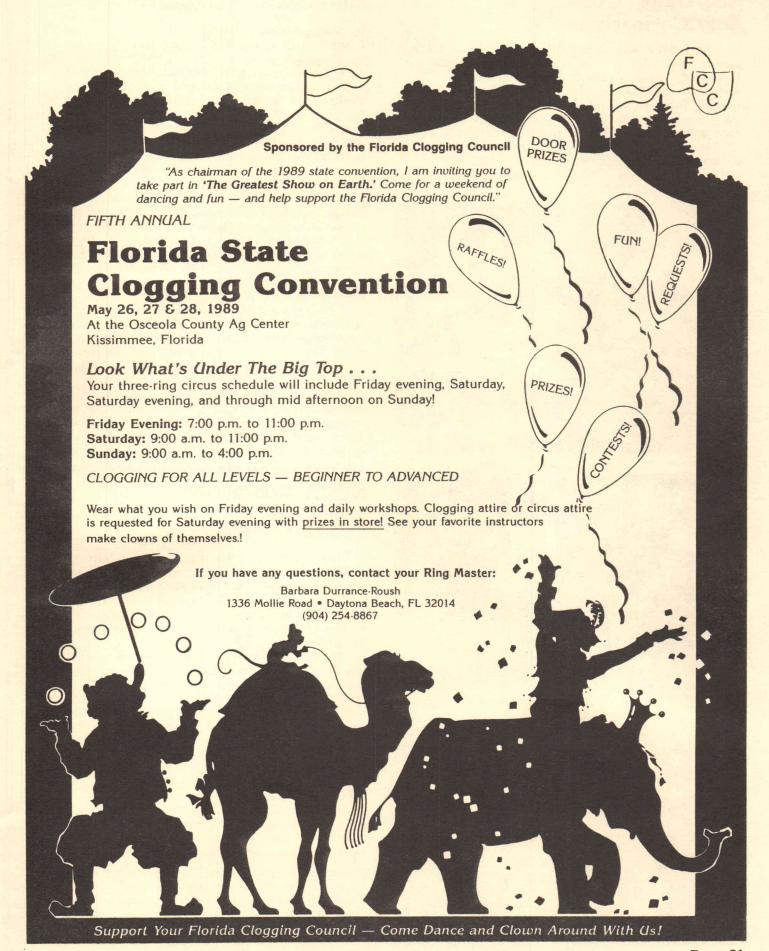
Keep your tapes out of direct sunlight, and out of the interior of hot cars. Keep them away from any magnetic fields such as speakers. Be careful of cassette recorders that have built-in speakers. The speakers have magnets that could partially erase your tapes. Try not to set your tapes on these machines. Don't handle the tape itself with your hands. Grease and oil from your skin can cause damage to the tape.

The back of each cassette has two openings with plastic tabs over them. After you have recorded your master tapes, punch out these tabs. This will protect your tapes from accidentally being erased or recorded over. It is conceivable that a very busy sound operator could hit the wrong button and put a hole in your music, or wipe out the opening. If afterwards your want to re-record on the cassette, you can always put scotch tape over the openings to defeat the record lock-out feature of your machine.

Travel

Always make two master tapes when you travel. Give the tapes to two different people to take to the performance. If one person is late, or his luggage in which the tape is packed gets lost, you won't be without your music.

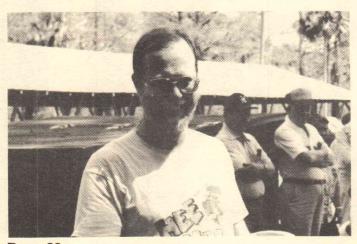
The Gator Trot Solo Competition

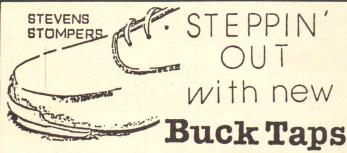

Then came the video world. Some of our cloggers bought videos for learning and teaching purposes when VCRs were still a very new item. Now they are as popular as TV. Teachers are selling tapes showing steps and figures. Groups are using tapes to view routines ... did you ever notice when you are looking at a video of your group, you see the mistakes first, then the good parts? It's true one picture is worth a thousand words ... what a wonderful invention!

The world of printers has also seen their share of cloggers. Look at the business we take to them ... clogging books; cue sheets; monthly magazines; weekly newsletters; advertisements for conventions, contests, workshops, festivals, dances; class diplomas for graduation; bumper stickers and business cards.

Clogging has helped the business world in many ways. Producers of records, recorders, tapes, VCRs, cameras, sound equipment, typewriters, copiers, paper products, and shoes and taps have all benefited from the increased popularity of clogging. The last contest that I attended, I was fascinated by the beautiful costumes. It was wonderful to see one gorgeous costume after another appear on stage. My friends and I agreed it would be great to have just half of the money cloggers spend on costumes.

Clog dancing appears to be changing ... or is it? We still have the basic steps. 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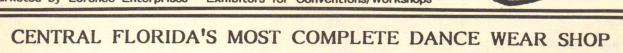

and join both hands.)

Footwork: Opposite throughout, man begins with left

foot, woman with right.

Measures:

Measure 1 - 4

(Toward COH or IN) Side (Toward Wall or OUT) Side

Side, Close, Side, Stomp; Side, Close, Side, Stomp;

Measure 5 - 8

(Toward COH or IN) (Toward Wall or OUT) (Banjo position in LOD) Side, Stomp, Side, Stomp,

Walk, two, three, turn**;

Measure 9 - 12

(Sidecar position in LOD)
(In facing direction)

Walk, two, three, turn**; Walk forward, pass one &

Measure 13 - 16

Swing the next

** All changes of direction are done by each dancer doing an individual U turn back without dropping hands. After second change of direction, partners drop hands and walk forward in the direction each is facing (man in LOD, woman in RLOD; or man, CCW and woman CW) passing one person to swing the next dancer (8 counts) to end with man facing LOD to being dance again.

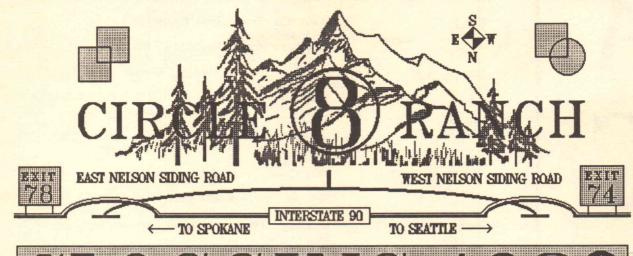
Note: The original dance as written for measures 13 - 16 has two turning two steps and four pivot steps in closed position. There are many variations of this dance in use. The Contra and Traditional Dance Committee recommends that whichever variation is popular in your area be used with the proviso that the dance be kept as simple as possible.

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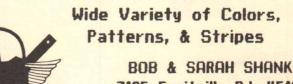
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
