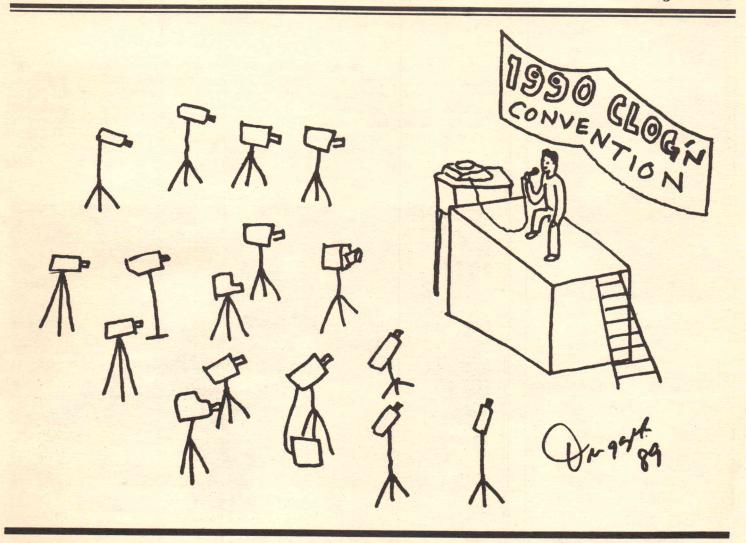

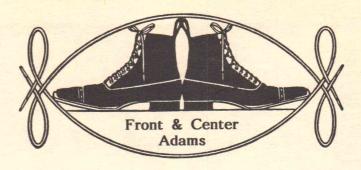

The photo above is of Diane Dolan, who traveled to Russia in 1988 as a part of a Square Dance exchange group, and demonstrated Clogging as a part of the program. The young man on the right is identified only as Viktor and is a member of the Bylorussian Dance troupe, Minsk, Russia. Diane corresponds with Viktor and several other Russian dancers, including two nine year olds who dance with "The Children's Palace Dancers". She has a local translator who translates the Russian letters. Through the tour guide, Diane has sent a dozen pairs of Clogging taps to the Bylorussian dancers, and they are very excited about learning to Clog. Diane said that there is the

possibility that the Bylorussian Dancers will be in Sacramento, California in January 1990, as the return part of the exchange. In Viktor's last letter to Diane he closes with, "Despite our language difficulties, I think we can easily find a common language, the language of dance, the language which made us friends." Conference on Old-Time Dancing in the **Appalachian Mountains**

From April 27 - 29, I participated in this conference which was held at East Tennessee State University in Johnson City. It was sponsored by ETSU's Center for Appalachian Studies and Services (CASS), and it's director, Richard Blaustein, described it as ". . . the very first conference entirely devoted to the dance traditions of a region which has long been recognized as one of North America's liveliest centers of the folk arts."

The program began on Thursday afternoon with the theme "Clogging, North Carolina Style." Whenever you intend to discuss a subject in depth, you need to agree upon terminology so that everyone knows what the other is talking about. So it is with clogging. Throughout the conference, it was referred to as buck dance, hoedown, tap, flatfoot, buck and wing, but strangely enough, "clogging" is a newcomer in the vocabulary of traditional dance. To some mountain people, there isn't a special name for it, it's "just dancin'."

Gail Matthews, of the McKissick Museum, was brought up with traditional dance experience, but also researched it academically. She brought up the notion that in mountain dance, there is not so much a basic step as there is an aesthetic that dancers of the mountains adhere to: how they carry their body while dancing; what rhythms they produce; how it fits in with the fiddle music; and also how they express their individuality through their dance. Gail also spoke of the changes that came about in the 30's, 40's, and 50's that changed the look and the sound of the dance. For example, the improvements in the country's roads, and the coming of World War II, reached even the isolated Appalachian mountains, and contributed to the breakdown of regional dance styles, as mountain people moved around more and had experiences outside their home communities. Also the folk festivals that began in the late 1920's gave rise to square dance teams, with costumes, and eventually bluegrass music, amplified country music, and taps on the dancers' shoes. In the late 1950's, precision clogging began, and the emphasis in this form of dance is on speed and technique over the individual style that traditional dancers espoused. The traditional mountain dancers were said to look down on this sort of dancing, and Gail suggested that one reason was because the old-style dancers felt that precision clogging would not teach their children the value of learning to work together as a group while still expressing their individuality, as the traditional mountain style of dance would.

Phil Jamison, a member of the Green Grass cloggers, and dance editor of the Old-Time Herald, spoke on "the influence of the Green Grass Cloggers evolved out of a square dance class at East Carolina State University. Some of the original members of this class went to fiddlers' conventions in the early 70's, and met traditional dancers such as Willard Watson of Deep Gap, NC. They not only learned steps, but

developed a respect for, and were influenced by, the older generation of buck dancers who did not approve of the modern team approach to clogging. These old-style dancers stressed individuality over conformity, and old-time music over bluegrass and other modern forms of music. They also emphasized that dancing was for fun, not competition, and that individual dance styles were very important.

Over the nearly 20 year history of the Green Grass Cloggers, there have developed two predominant styles of clogging being taught now: the precision style and the Green Grass Cloggers' style. Phil described what he sees as the contrast between the two styles. In precision clogging, the emphasis is on competition, which brings about the standardization of performance, and it dictates to the dancers exactly how it should be done. The competitions are sanctioned by the clogging organizations to which these dancers belong. Modern precision clogging has evolved so far away from it's traditional roots that they are dancing to recorded music rather than live music, and to rock music rather than mountain music. The organizers of precision clogging feel that this is what they have to do to keep the young people interested. Phil said that as a result, he feels that now there is an entire generation of cloggers who have no knowledge of the traditional origins of their dance, and have no idea that you can dance to live music, or without taps, or that the fiddle has anything to do with this kind of dance. In his conclusion, Phil said, "The Green Grass Clogger style owes more to the traditions and the traditional forms of clogging than the precision forms do, and I see that primarily not in the dance figures but in the attitude." "... The most important thing is not the steps [the Green Grass Cloggers] have devised and have taught dancers, but the idea of dancing to traditional music, the idea of getting out and dancing for fun . . . also the idea that clogging can be non-competitive, can be for enjoyment . . .and the idea of individual expression.

In talking about his experiences collecting square dances in West Virginia, Bob Dalsemer also spoke about the need to learn more about traditional dance. He had some words of advice for those who would go out collecting old-time dances. My thoughts went back to Bob's talk later in that day when we visited the Beechwood Music Center in Fall Branch, TN.

Bob started by saying, "Don't have any preconceived notions about what type of music you'll find." He said during the 70's, folk revivalists tended to dismiss amplified music as non-traditional, however, in his experience, they are the rule rather than the exception. He also said to be prepared for a mixture of dances at these community dances: squares, couple dances, two-steps, "Paul Jones", etc. He advised us to take it all in, not just to observe the kind of dancing that we came to see. Some of the community dances get by with a limited repertoire of dances. In this way, beginners can become a part of the social dance more quickly. In these dances, the callers don't consider teaching a part of their role. The dancers are there simply to

That night, at the Beechwood Music Center, I recalled Bob's words. First of all, as I was waiting to enter the building, I could hear the jingle taps all the way out in the parking lot. Upon entering the build-Continued on Page 8

You asked in the March 1989 issue for some information for a new page, Rise and Shine. I think we have a unique situation here in Arizona, and we have mostly "snowbirds" in my clogging classes. That means they come here to the "Valley of the Sun"from November through March. During that time, they attend classes sometimes two or three times a week.

I began teaching here in the retirement parks, starting with ten students and one park five years ago and now have nine retirement parks and over two hundred students in three levels of clogging: beginner, easy intermediate, and intermediate.

I have two exhibition groups, Steele Clog Tappers and the Golden Rockers. Their ages are from fifty to seventy years old. Even though we are all senior citizens, we are very enthusiastic about our clogging.

I have attended the national C.L.O.G. Convention the last three years, attended Possum Trot in California each March, and try to keep my students doing the latest material available. I've taught at the N.C.C.A Convention in California, the Nation Square Dance Convention in Anaheim in 1988, and will be teaching this year in Oklahoma City. During the summer months, I have workshops in Red River, New Mexico at the Community House and at a square dance resort in Colorado near Denver. I also teach aerobic dancing and have classes three mornings a week along with a walking group, Golden Vista Sleepwalkers.

Originally from Pennsylvania, after being a full time RVer for seven years, we are now residents of Arizona. I have four children, two boys, two girls, all married and have eight grandchildren, five boys and three girls!

All this **plus** the clogging keeps this **retiree** pretty busy.

ing, I saw that it was set up like a movie theatre, with a band where the screen would be, and a small area to dance between the seats and the stage. My first thought was "jingle taps on concrete! Oh my God!" The band consisted of electric guitar, electric bass, drums, and a singer. The music was the standard country/western repertoire, and the dancing alternated between two-steps, waltzes, and free-style clogging. I wore my granny shoes, and it was soon apparent that despite my prejudice against tap shoes, they did seem to work better on the concrete than what I was wearing. I also noticed that the dancers were of all ages, from 5 or 6 years of age to older people in their 60's and 70's, and all of them expressing the same kind of enthusiasm we see at the Clog Palace (Silver Spring, Maryland). Eventually, a caller reached the stage to call a mountain circle dance, and a fiddler was summoned. As the evening wore on, I began to tire of dancing on concrete, and I wandered around the music center. The most unforgettable part of the trip to Fall Branch was all the photographs on the wall. Someone had meticulously mounted pictures of dancers, on posterboard, perhaps 12 - 15 to a sheet. Each posterboard had a title such as "Spring", "Summer", etc. Underneath each photograph was carefully lettered the names of all the people in the picture, people I recognized as dancers I had seen that night. There were at least 20 of these posterboards, maybe more, and after looking at every single one, I got the feeling that I was inside a giant photo album. Now that's what I call a community dance.

Lyn Burley and Sue Morris, Hillbilly Stompers, Western Australia, write that Western Australia just had their first Clogging Convention called **The Wattle Blossom Special**. The convention incorporated square and round dancing as well as two full days of clogging. It was a huge success and a milestone for them and is to become an annual event. The western clogging clubs have formed The Western Australia Clogging Leaders Association which meets every six weeks to discuss ideas, learn new steps, and ask questions if they need help - "Who never needs help?" says Lyn. Several cloggers from Western Australia are planning to attend the C.L.O.G. Convention in 1990.

"Western Australia has a long way to go, but clogging is spreading, the leaders are helping one another, and the dancers enjoy reading material which enhances their knowledge. It is with the help of newsletters such as yours (and our own Clog News) that we cloggers from "Down Under" can grow and learn."

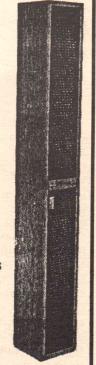

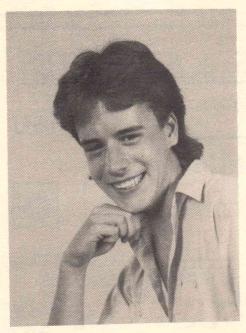

Variable Speed Clogger

Editor's Note: In July 1987, I traveled with the Flatland Cloggers on their annual trek to Harrison Maine's Old Home Days. After the long bus ride, and after settling into the dormitory, we loaded up and headed for town and the first performance. We took our bleacher seats, and soon the youngsters were on stage dancing up a storm. One of the adults seated with me leaned over and said, "One of those boys out there on stage has a pacemaker. Can you tell which one?" I couldn't.

David Baines was born October 28, 1973 with a complete congenital heart block. His heartbeat was extremely slow, and David remembers his inability to do much of anything without great fatigue. In 1978, with improved medical technology, David underwent surgery for a pacemaker - an instrument implanted beneath the skin which provides a normal heartbeat by electrical stimulation of the heart muscle. His first pacemaker, battery operated, was set at 72 beats per minute all the time. A normal heartbeat is 75 - 80 beats per minute, but slows or speeds up on demand, i.e., sleeping vs. clogging. David recalls that his stamina improved dramatically, and that he could "... keep up with the other kids most of the time." When he was seven and a half, he took up clogging with two neighbor youngsters, under the tutelage of Louis Latham, and the Dixie Gold Cloggers in Portsmouth Virginia.



Because a pacemaker is battery operated, the battery must be replaced (currently) every five years. Thus, when David was ten years old, he became a candidate for a further improvement, dubbed a variable speed pacemaker. When exertion or sleep creates the need, the pacemaker will speed or slow the electrical stimulation of the heart muscle to a high 140 beats per minute or a low of 60.

David must physically work harder than his teammates, The Flatland Cloggers (under the direction of Bob Johnson, Chesapeake, Virginia), but he seldom complains and is a dependable team member - always

at practice and at every performance and competition. He has been with the Flatland Cloggers for two and one-half years and has placed among the top three winners in a number of solo and buck and wing competition entries.

David is a ninth grade, honor roll student at Western Branch High School in Chesapeake. He also plays the drums, rides a motorcycle, and water skis.

I spoke with David regarding this article, and while he was quite open about discussing the fact that he has a pacemaker, it was simply part of him, like freckles or red hair, and he was anxious to get off the phone and go water skiing!

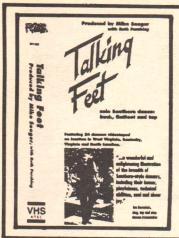

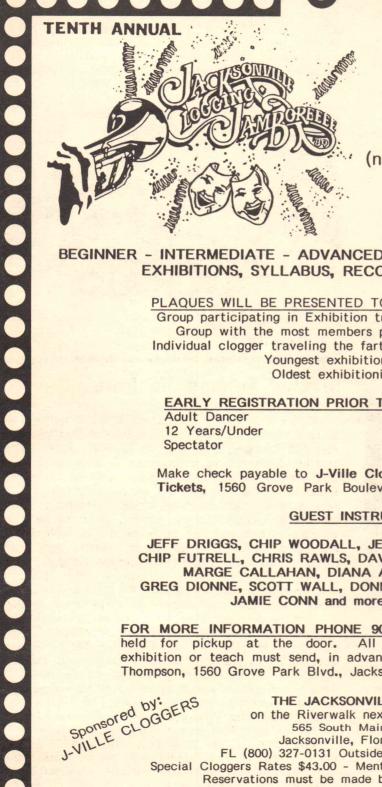

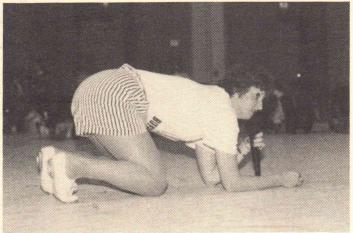
other than shoveling snow.)

cloggers.



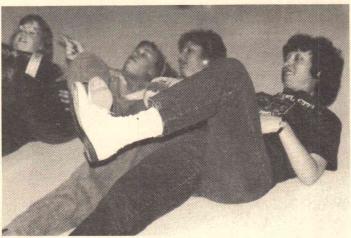
Sallie Adkins Administers the "Cloggers' Creed"

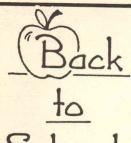

Where Have All The Adults Gone?

It is interesting to watch the evolution in clogging taking place. Clogging in the northern states of Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Kentucky, Indiana, Wisconsin, and New York is booming with new membership and enthusiasm. Our neighbor to the north, Canada, boasts a virtual explosion in clogging interest and activity. Classes are large and the "fever" is high. On the other hand, there are distressing indications that some southern states are experiencing a decline in clogging popularity, particularly among adults. This is evidenced by a decline in the number of clubs, reduced attendance at workshops, smaller classes, and fewer entrants at clogging competitions.

While it would be easy to dismiss the current trends as a result of the "newness" of clogging in the north or due to the increase in available quality workshops for northerners to attend in their own area, we must be open to looking more closely at some of the real problems that dancers have been complaining about for some time, which are now being reflected in their reduced attendance. I will be generalizing, which is dangerous, but keep in mind that I am speaking of trends that I believe exist at the present. Also remember that any trend can be changed. The first step in that process of change must be an openness to listen to the observations of others and an increase in awareness.

I don't pretend to understand all the reasons for popularity increases and declines, but I would like to share with you some observations and perceptions that come from the experts, the dancers themselves. People speak with their attendance. Their non-attendance reflects a dissatisfaction that while usually not expressed verbally to teachers and promoters, can be heard in the back halls of classrooms, workshops, or competitions. Those teachers/promoters who do not listen or choose to cut themselves off from dancer feedback doom themselves to extinction by attrition (non-attendance).

There are two thorns that repeatedly present themselves to explain clogger dissatisfaction:

 Adult dancers, especially recreational-level dancers, are not being catered to in the South while they are the central force in the North.

2. Competition is generally a separating force which disrupts and impedes the development of a sense of a "clogging community."

Let's look at each of these hypotheses closely.

ADULT DANCERS:

We must keep adult dancers dancing. If adults quit dancing then you have eliminated one of the most important and distinctive qualities about clogging --- it can be a family affair. So few activities exist that embrace the interests of both parent and child. Clogging is one such activity and can increase the sense of "community" by nurturing the family system.

Most adult dancers fall into an area we call "recreational dancing." That means that they have not chosen clogging as something that they want to work real hard at --- they've done that all day on their jobs. They are not interested at excelling in clog-

ging, but rather are interested because of exercise, fun, and the social aspect of clogging. Believe me, this is where the bulk of all adult cloggers fall. If we are not catering to the needs of this population, then our clogging population will continue to decline.

If we look at western square dancing for guidance, we will note that the bulk of dancing takes place at a level called "mainstream." This is similar to our "recreational level" in clogging. Western square dancers realize that mainstream dancers form the backbone of their organization and work hard to preserve and maintain this level of dancing.

It seems to be generally true that as people get older, they prefer a softer sound in music. My diehard rock-n'-rollin' sister went country at the age of twenty-five. It happens to many adults. If you want adults to keep dancing, you have to keep playing the

music they like to hear and can relate to.

Buck dancing is generally more physically demanding than clogging. Most recreational dancers, even though they might "wish" they could buck dance, have no intention of putting in the time and effort required to learn it. Remember, they've been working all day. Their experience with you must allow a physical and mental release of stress that has been built up during the day. They want to leave feeling better than when they walked in. If you can accomplish that, then your classes/workshops will flourish.

In the same vein, line dances must be easy. Recreational dancers don't want the mental strain of having to remember and perform intricate line dances. Finding a level that is fun but not frustrating is a difficult but most important task to be a successful teacher. One way of keeping your fingers "on the pulse of the class" is to watch them closely and ask for feedback! It is a relatively simple process to learn what dancers want in a workshop or class. ASK THEM! Give them feedback sheets to to find out what they like BEST and like LEAST. You won't always like what you hear, but you'll be in a much better position to provide what dancers say they want. I'm continually amazed at how seldom workshop promoters ask for and are willing to receive feedback from their participants. Charlie Burns and I do it regularly at our workshops, yet I have have been to only one other workshop in eight years where written feedback was actively solicited.

Those who actively avoid obtaining feedback from dancers are engaged in a process called DENIAL. Often the workshop promoter is heard saying such things as, "I GUESS EVERYBODY HAD A GOOD TIME, I DIDN'T HEAR ANY COMPLAINTS." Folks, that is DENIAL! When the attendance is down next year/next class, you can bet your boots there were lots of unvoiced complaints. Very few people will approach the organizer and voice their complaints. They will simply do it by choosing not to return. Give them a voice and open your ears to what they have to tell you. I promise, you will learn a lot!

Getting back to serving the recreational dancer, I estimate that of all the people I have ever "lost" in my public classes, I lost most of them by frustrating them. They were frustrated by my teaching at a level that was too much work and too demanding. Advanced dancers will be more vocal, "Speed it up! --- Go faster!" will be their commands. Frustrated students are the silent majority. They just quit. Charlie Burns tells the story where he lost a large

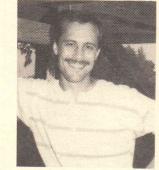

percentage of dancers in one class, so he called them up --- every one, to ask why they had left. He learned a lot, and as a result, hasn't had the need to duplicate his efforts since. Now THAT'S actively soliciting feedback! Remember --- advanced dancers can always fancy-up a dance that is not demanding enough for them. However, recreational dancers who are totally frustrated do not have that option. Also, because they have less history and commitment to clogging as an activity, they are a much higher risk to attrition than advanced students who are "hooked" and highly committed to the dance form.

Last but not least, adult dancers are the "torch-bearers" of tradition; in all of life, not just dancing. Clogging has a rich history and tradition that will simply fade from our art form if we only cater to the young and their penchant for novelty and rock music. Adults serve a useful purpose by helping to maintain equilibrium in clogging, balancing the old with the new. They serve to embrace the past and pass it on to the younger dancers as they mature.

COMPETITIONS:

I'm going to say very little about competitions except that in general, competition tends to segregate people rather than congregate them. It forces comparisons, segregation of teams, produces few winners and lots of disgruntled losers. This doesn't make a competition a negative force, but it does mean that there has to be a healthy "communing" in clogging in addition to the competitive aspect. In areas where competition has become a predominant force, the adult community of dancers has dwindled. Why?

First of all, competition has increasingly been structured to favor young dancers. Buck dancing and Canadian step-dancing are being increasingly rewarded in competition. This was not always so. This recent development eliminates most adults since that is not the style of dancing that they do. It leaves most adults asking the question, "Whatever happened to CLOGGING competitions?" There is a sense of frustration that the emphasis has moved from rewarding EXCELLENT PERFORMANCE OF A TRADITIONAL DANCE FORM to rewarding the most NOVEL and INTRICATE presentation. And when this happens, there is no sense of history or personal connection with what is going on. Adults get lost in the shuffle.

Secondly, age categories in individual competition cater primarily to the young. Most competitions lump middle-aged dancers into a forty-and-over category. This is an obvious message, not so subtle, that competition is for YOUNG dancers, and there is a catch-all category for the over-the-hill crowd. Enough said about competitions.

In summary, we have a **wonderful** art form that is healthy in so many ways. Let's work to keep our clogging "community" as flexible as possible so that people of all ages and skill levels can find their place in the sun (or on the dance floor).

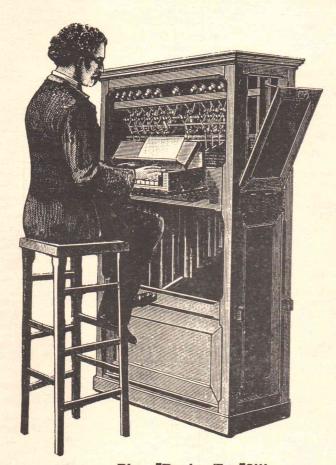
