
California Cloggin'



Yes - they have their own terminology.




Los Angeles County Fair Exhibit

It is held every year at the huge Los Angeles County Fair and sponsored by Carnation.

As a youngster I attended many Fairs in Ohio, and even raced my pony "Shorty" in the pony races. Fairs are a love of mine and I thoroughly enjoyed the 4-H exhibits and the brief glimpses of the dairy goat judging. This is an incredibly big Fair! 

Sponsoring Your First Clogging Workshop Part III Contracts

The days of the nod of agreement and handshake are over. Today, we are hit with written contracts or terms of agreement in almost every walk of life. The same scrutiny you give to agreements signed for your bank loans should be given to any agreements signed for your clogging workshop or other special event.

Written contracts serve a meaningful purpose and should be viewed as a comfort as opposed to something to be dreaded. Contracts are a confirmation of everything that you've mutually agreed upon with another party; in the case here, a supplier of goods and services. A good contract establishes a give-and-take relationship between the parties involved, not a one-sided deal to benefit only one or the other.

How do you make sure the contract you're signing is mutually beneficial? You read it very carefully and make sure you understand every clause in it. You also ensure that it covers every item you agreed to and contains no extra "hidden" items that were not discussed. Don't ever sign anything you're unsure of or don't feel good about. If a supplier tells you a particular clause is just standard procedure and a necessity, that's hogwash. If you don't like it, either rewrite it so you're comfortable with it or don't sign. Contracts are meant to be rewritten; I do it all the time.

For example - one particular hotel chain always provides the same, standard, preprinted contract. One page, two sides. The front side has a few blanks for the items agreed upon - number of guest rooms, rental fees, etc. The backside is completely full of very small (and light) print outlining dozens of special clauses that are standard to the hotel. Almost every one of them is one-sided; the group does something the hotel doesn't like, the hotel benefits. Never sign a contract like this without a few adjustments and clarifications. The first thing to do is draft an addendum and spell out everything that was discussed. Sometimes, this means repeating items already in the contract, although with clarifica-Rewrite every clause in the contract that is not in the best interest of the group. Above the signature line on the contract, type in that the group accepts the agreement only with the inclusion of the attached addendum. Send two copies of the addendum along with the original contract back to the hotel requesting that they sign both copies and return one to you. I've never run into a facility that refused to sign. However, many times they will want to renegotiate some items. Facilities will offer you the world to get you in their door - agreeing to it in writing is often a different story.

Another reason to make sure everything is included in a contract is because, by the time your event comes around, the sales representative you dealt with in the beginning may have left the company or the management may have changed hands. If they have a signed agreement in hand, there's no reason the new parties involved need to agree to all the little "extras" that you were

promised but were not put in writing.

Every written contract, no matter who the parties involved are, should contain the following:

the parties entering into the agreement the effective dates of the agreement

complete list of goods and services to be provided by each party

charges to be assessed for the good and services insurance/liability/indemnity protecting each party any applicable contingencies special instructions

cancellation agreement to protect each party (dates and penalties)

signatures of parties involved

The more you put into it, the better off all parties will be in the end. Facility contracts should specifically spell out the following good and services:

sleeping rooms, if applicable

- number and type of rooms; room night pattern
- room rates, including tax and services charges
- confirmation policy
- guarantees, deposits, cancellation policies
- reservations/reservation cut-off procedures
- credit arrangements
- complimentary accomodations
- check-in/check-out times

food and beverage

- function space; setups
- price guarantees
- dates of functions
- setup and service times
- staffing and service requirements

function space

- event schedule with assigned rooms and hours specified and approval requirements if changed; square feet minimum allowance
- setup and tear down times
- room setup requirements
- rental charges
- services, service level, staffing level;
- compensation for substandard performance

equipment

- items provided free of charge (tables & chairs)
- items provided for a charge and the charges (additional flooring that the hotel must go outside to rent)
- dates needed

renovations/construction

- projected dates
- areas of facility affected
- stop-work
- non recourse

safety measures

labor charges

parking and airport service

credit arrangements

other conditions of acceptance, if applicable special amenities or extended service hours (free turn down service for VIPs and extended pool

The cancellation clauses in most facility contracts are very one-sided. Basically, they say if you cancel your event within a certain time-frame, you're liable for X-amount of money. Rarely, do they ever mention any compensation for you if they cancel the agreement. This does happen! If a more attractive piece of business comes along, one which will bring in more revenue, your group could very well get bumped.

Fire-On-The-Mountain Cloggers' Germany Tour

Faint music drifted across acres of knee-high green wheat fields. "Isn't that Fox on the Run or was that just my imagination?" We strolled toward the large building at the top of the hill. Peter had called it a "hall where you keep horses." "A horse barn!", I laughed and said, "we're gonna dance in a horse barn?" Although his English wasn't the best, he agreed vigorously to this during our telephone conversation. Luckily it turned out that the "horse barn" was a large building with riding stables built around it. The hall itself was the size of a football field, however, and wooden planks formed the flooring. Hundreds of tables were placed end to end with what seemed like every German in Guenzburg squeezed in behind those tables, smiling and waving a huge beer mug around.

Bluegrass music bounced off the walls of this giant clapboard building. There was a six foot tall stage running the length of one end of the hall, with a towering structure for a very professional sound system located in the center of the building. The other end of the hall contained booths with bluegrass records and country music galore. There was a rack with cowboy hats and western wear for sale, although it seemed to me that everyone we met already owned a ten gallon hat and cowboy boots. Some were even dressed in coonskin caps and chaps. The food

counter beckoned to us from along one side of the room, and our food tickets allowed us to sample with great abandon.

The Austrian band called **Southbound** began to play. Well known in Europe, they played many traditional as well as "new grass" tunes. The first note rang out and the crowd parted as we entered the stage. A separate platform had been built for us and was about two feet off the ground. It was large enough for the seventeen of us, and if some of the crowd in the back couldn't see, there was no problem - they just stood on tables! The band played, and our feet danced, flashbulbs went off, a loud roar filled the hall, broad smiles, fingers pointing and heads nodding. The audience clapped along with the music. Unfortunately, many times it was on the upbeat rather than the downbeat!

We had such a good time and a great response from the audience. But the second show later that evening was certainly the climax to a very worthwhile and eventful performance tour. I have never seen such an audience so wildly enthusiastic. Then after we did our final number they stood up and began to stomp and clap, refusing to stop until we came back on stage for an encore.

So our Germany tour was a success! Eleven shows in fourteen days. We performed in five cities and took in the sights of those cities and others, including Munich (and the Hofbrauhaus), Heidelberg, Oberammergau, Ulm, Augsburg, Rothenburg, Berncastle, Guenzburg, Goppingen, Baumholder, Burg Lichtenberg, Berncastle, Idar Oberstein, Saarbrucken, Kaiserslautern, and Schloss Linderhof and Schloss Neuschwanstein (castles south of Munich).

We loved those rail passes! All you need to know is "Bahnhof" (train station) and "gleis" (track) and be able to smile really big. Someone will be sure to smile back!

Note: This performance tour was made possible for ten of the dancers by sources in Europe. The remaining seven received funding from local sponsors.

Forward again in the same old track
Turn the opposite lady with the right hand around
Partners left with a left hand around
Corners right with a right hand around
Partners left with a left hand around
Promenade your corner as you come down.

Repeat figure three more times until each couple has original partner again.

VARIATION

There were many variations of this figure from town to town and region to region. This is one of the better-known ones.

Arkansas Traveler with a Cross Trail Thru

Couples ONE and THREE go forward and back
Sides Cross Trail Thru go around the outside track
Heads go forward, turn your opposite right,
right hand around
Partner left, left hand around
Corner right, right hand around
Partners left, left hand around
Promenade corner as she comes around.

This figure and variation can be used with any standard breaks of your choice and is a good foundation for teaching later of arm turn basics, such as Turn Thru. the Traditional Committee recommends that whichever variation is popular in your area be used.

The basic figure is consistent with use in the Community Dance Program (CDP).

Clogging Instructors, Clubs, Workshop and Competition Directors Must Tell the Public What They Have!

by Bobbie Adams

Clogging instructors, clubs, workshop and competition directors must tell the public what they have!

A clogging instructor or club can certainly be excused from knowing anything about the graphic arts part of advertising but there is no excuse for ignorance about the value of advertising itself. "Business without advertising is like winking at a girl in the dark."

Most will not be able to afford a professional advertising agency. Many of the quick printers or clogging trade publications will offer hints and suggestions for copy. The following recommendations are from the Small Business Administration (SBA) for people preparing their own ad copy:

 Make your ads easy to recognize. Give your art, copy and layout a distinctive personality and style; then keep the appearance consistent.

2) Use a simple layout. Your layout should lead the reader's eye easily through the message from headline to illustration to explanatory copy to price to your club's name. Avoid too many different typefaces, overly decorative borders, and reverse plates.

 Use a dominant element. A large picture or headline will ensure quick visibility. Photographs of real people win more readership. Whenever possible, show the dancers in action.

- 4) Show the benefit to the reader. The prospective customer wants to know "what's in it for me." Instead of packing the ad with reasons to dance, give the customer one primary reason and feature it in a compelling headline. Amplify this message in your copy and subheads.
- 5) Let white space work for you. Don't over-crowd your ad. White space focuses the reader's attention on your ad and will make your headline and illustration stand out. If you have many items to offer, group them so readers can find their way through the list easily.

6) State prices. Dollar figures have good attention value. If the price is low, support it with statements that create believability.

- Include a name and address. Double-check every ad to make sure that it contains your name, address, telephone number and club name.
- 8) Make your copy complete. Select the benefits most appealing to your customers - friendship, exercise, health, performance, fun. Complete sentences are easier to read than phrases and random words. Short sentences are better for radio and TV because the ears cannot absorb information as easily as the eye.


Keep in mind that continuity is important. This is especially true when advertising in a local newspaper, which people tend to discard rather

quickly. If they suddenly have an urge to learn to dance they may recall your ad, then pick up the most recent issue of the publication to search for your ad.

Proof read your copy! We recommend $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ flyers - not $8\frac{1}{2} \times 14$! Check for who, what, when, where and why. The National Ad Council stated that an ad must be in place 3.4 times before it is even read by the public.




Nineteen teams participated in thirty team events. There were nine duos and thirteen duets. In the individual categories twenty three males and ninety five females competed.

Hook power pack on your belt, run wires down inside pants leg (ladies with skirts use invisible tape to attach wires to leg) and connect to "Flapper-Tapper" tap on your shoe. Push button "C" for fast tapping sound (especially good for "rise and shine" performances) or button "D" for a "double-toe" tapping sound (good for most beginner and intermediate routines).

The "Flapper-Tapper" set is a marvel of modern technology. An enlarged view shows the rotor inside of the power pack. As it hits a metal contact it creates an electro-magnetic force, through the wire, to one side of the tap plate on your shoe. The magnetic force attracts the side of the hinged tap below it, causing it to slap into the plate with a tapping sound. As the rotor continues to turn it hits the other metal contact point and the process is repeated for the other side of the hinged tap on your shoe, resulting in a fast tapping sound. Button "D" on the power pack sets up a "double-toe" rhythm programmed into a small micro chip in the power pack.

An advanced model (Model 2) is also available, with taps and wire connections for both left and right shoes. Button "C" operates both taps at fast staccato rhythms, and button "D" operates both taps at "double-toe" rhythms. Good for all advance dances.

Depending on the event being booked, I recommend crossing out the facility's cancellation clause and offering to rebook equivalent business within a one-year time frame, rather than pay large fees to compensate them for loss of revenues. If the facility cancels, I'll usually give them a choice of two resolutions: 1)search for and secure equivalent facilities and services within x-radius for the same price that meet with our approval, AND pay for the printing and mailing costs of notifying everyone already pre-registered, in addition to new promotion costs, AND pay the group \$X-amount for undetermined losses. OR 2) pay the group \$X-amount for lost revenues and aggravation (this figure is normally very large . . . enough to discourage them from cancelling).

Option two is often more to the group's advantage monetarily, however, it's often more of a headache than it's worth to completely cancel an event without trying to move it. If you need to move your event, you might as well have the facility do the work for you. Rather than lose a lot of money and completely destroy the possibility of your future business, a facility will try to book the group elsewhere.

Make sure the cancellation clause contains a provision that holds neither party responsible for cancellations due to circumstances beyond either party's control, i.e. Acts of God, strikes, governmental regulations, civil disturbance, or curtailment of public

transportation facilities.

To avoid personal liability, make sure the group you are entering into this agreement for is listed as one of the contracted parties and not you personally. Also, make sure it's noted where you sign that you are empowered by the group to make these arrangements. As the individual making the arrangement, you can still be held liable for a number of things, but this will offer you some protection.

When it comes to signing contracts, just be aware. Read them carefully making sure they are all-inclusive and mutually beneficial. Securing all of your arrangements in writing ahead of time does not guarantee a perfect event, but it sure will make your life

and your event go a lot easier.





The rundown on shinsplints

Errors in training and hard terrain are leading causes of lower-leg pain

Shinsplints is a hot topic - it seems that everybody who has ever slipped on a pair of sneakers is eager to review in painstaking detail the agony of shinsplints. Yet the term itself is a misnomer. Like bellyache, the term shinsplints is generally a wastebasket diagnosis.

Shinsplints most often refers to leg pain - anything from a dull ache to a sharp pain - along the front of the shin or the inner border of the the lower leg. The American Medical Association defines shinsplints as an inflammation of the shin's muscle, tendon or bone.

There is a variety of reasons why shinsplints develops, but the following are the most common.

1) Training errors. Many people who begin a program try to incorporate too much too soon.

This sudden jolt to the body can cause problems, including shinsplints. It's essential for everyone to stretch both before and after exercising, but it's especially critical for newcomers. Failure to ease your muscles and bones into exercise is like providing an open invitation to shinsplints.

For the more seasoned athlete, a sudden increase in the duration, frequency or intensity of exercise is equally harmful.

Surfaces and terrains. Abrupt changes in running surfaces, from grass to sidewalk, or from track to concrete, are classic causes of shinsplints.

This can be avoided if you perform additional stretches and lower the intensity and duration of exercise to adapt to the change in surface. Likely victims are runners who fail to vary the direction of their run, such as those who always run clockwise around a track. By alternating and running in a counterclockwise direction, pressure is distributed more evenly in the legs.

Running on hills also can put a sudden strain on the leg muscles and result in shinsplint symptoms. But those who exercise indoors are not protected from shinsplints - performing an aerobics routine on a gym floor or on a particularly hard surface that doesn't provide enough shock absorption can result in leg pain.

3) Footwear. don't worry if your shoes don't match your sweatsuit or tights - if you are going to exercise or take part in a sport make sure you wear the shoes that are appropriate for your particular ac-

If the heel of your sole has worn through the first layer of support, throw the shoes away and invest in a new pair.

Mechanics. If you have, or develop, a faulty gait, it's possible for this imbalance to result in shinsplints. If, for example, you are unusually tired or a bit under the weather, your mood and/or physical condition may cause your stride to change during your run, and this discrepancy may cause leg pain. And if you're a beginning jogger, and you fail to learn a proper stride, you also may develop shinsplints.

Medical factors. If you were born with a discrepancy in the length of your legs, this imbalance may result in shinsplints. If you are such a person, check with your doctor before exercising. Pronated, or flat, feet also may cause shinsplints, so consult your doctor or see a podiatrist about this problem as well.

Although solid foot support and exercising on a good surface are two ways to prevent shinsplints, don't forget the crucial step for avoiding shinsplints - conditioned calf and shin muscles. When theses muscles are stretched and strengthened, they act as anatomical shock absorbers for the shin area. Here are two of the most effective stretches to help condition the shin area:

-- Stand facing a wall. Straighten your legs and place your heels flat on the floor. Placing your arms on the wall for support, slowly lean forward at the hips (you can vary this by slowly bending forward at the knees instead of at the hips).

-- Kneel with the tops of your feet flat on the floor. Slowly sit back on your heels and feel the

stretch on your shins.

The initial home treatment for shinsplints involves ice plus the second exercise described above. Begin by applying ice to the shin periodically for about 48 hours. You can apply it for 10 to 12 minutes at a time, as often as hourly.

After the acute pain is over, start on a stretching and strengthening program consisting of the kneeling exercise above followed by a 10-minute application of ice. The exercise should be done about five times a day, for 10 seconds at a time. But be patient recovery may take four to six weeks.



The 45 Single Spins Toward Oblivion

Editors Note: "The other opinion on 45's. . ."

The 45-rpm single - the little record with the big hole that has been spinning hits for record buyers, disc jockeys and juke boxes for four decades -- may be about to fall off the Top 40 chart for good.

Pummeled by many of the same technological forces that are threatening the traditional record album, many record stores already have stopped releas-

ing some singles in the 45-rpm format.

Capitol Records recently discontinued its entire catalog of 45-rpm oldies save for ten Beatles records, and A & M Records has slashed its wholesale singles prices in exchange for asking retailers not to return unsold 45s.

And for the first time in history, Billboard magazine's chart of the nation's one hundred most popular singles includes several titles that are not available as 45s.

Many record labels are sticking by the 45s, also known as 7-inch singles. But other industry executives predict that they soon may follow the 78 rpm record and the eight-track tape into oblivion. Within eighteen months, there probably will not be seven inch versions of hit singles, said Paul Grein, Billboard's music research and analysis editor. "Kids today don't have turntables. They have cassette players, they have Walkmans, they have boom boxes, they have CD players . . . They really have no way to play a 7-inch single."

The possibility that the 7-inch single could soon become extinct is particularly troubling to makers and operators of the nation's 225,000 jukeboxes, the largest consumers of 45s. A special committee of the Amusement and Music Operators Association has begun negotiating with record companies to find ways

to keep the 45 alive.

Some in the industry believe that if major record companies stop making singles, independent companies will license songs from the majors and make 45s ex-

pressly for the jukebox market.

Record industry executives say the 45, introduced by RCA Records in 1949 as a rival to Columbia Records' 33-rpm LP, never has been much of a moneymaker. Over the years, the single has served mostly as a promotional device to introduce consumers to artists and songs, in the hope that they eventually will put out the money for an LP.

The single enjoyed its heyday in the 1960s, when the Beatles, Motown groups and others were revolutionizing popular music and every kid had a stack of 45s. But sales have plummeted in recent years as cassettes and CDs replaced vinyl as the most popular media for music. Last year, the record industry shipped 65.6 million 45s, about half what it shipped

just four years ago.

The 45 is being largely supplanted by the cassette single, which was introduced just two years ago and already has reached unit sales of 22.5 million annually. Sales of "cassingles" are expected to surpass those of 45s soon. Experiments in marketing compact-disc singles so far have been inconclusive,

but another format, the 12-inch single popularized by dance music, has been a steady seller.

As sales have slumped, record labels have begun looking carefully at the singles business, evaluations that have led to A & M's new discounting and no-return policy and to Capitol's decision to delete most of its oldies catalog. In addition, Capitol is not releasing three new singles in the 7-inch format, and other labels reportedly have taken or are considering taking similar steps with some new releases.

Capitol officials insist they are not trying to kill

the 45.

"We're not stepping out or setting a trend," said the label's vice president for sales, Lou Mann, who added that the decision not to release some new singles as 45s involved circumstances peculiar to those records. However, he said, "We're evaluating our position in the 7-inch singles market like everyone else is,"





Incorporation? So, Sue Me!!!

What would you do if someone sued your clogging club? Have you ever thought about it? Well, you should! Because if someone should sue your club for liability in excess of your insurance coverage, for breach of contract, or for civil damages, you and the other members of your organization could be held severably and jointly responsible. What that means is if the court find against your club and there isn't enough money in the treasury, then the balance comes out of your pocket!

Fortunately, there is something that you can do to avoid finding yourselves footing the bill and that is INCORPORATION. Incorporating your organization is an essential protection for you as dancers and certainly should not continue to be ignored in today's world. By the simple act of filing a Certificate of Incorporation, the organization becomes a legal entity, thereby relieving you, as individuals from liability.

If you are an organization officer, take time to talk to your members about incorporating. If you are an organization member, talk to your officers about incorporating. There is no truth to the rumor that incorporating will affect your tax status, or if we don't incorporate they won't know we're out here. This is something that you need to give serious thought.

Incorporating is not difficult. The time and nominal cost involved will provide enormous protection from a potential financial disaster.

Shinsplints from Page 22

There is no question that shinsplints is much easier to prevent than to treat, says physical therapist Marilyn Roofner, who owns the Orange Physical Therapy and Sports Rehabilitation clinic in Orlando. And one of the simplest preventive measures is adequate calcium intake. "Most recent studies have revealed a significant link between shinsplints and low calcium intake," Roofner says. Good sources: skim milk, plain yogurt and salmon.

How to prevent shinsplints

- Stretch both before and after exercising, especially if you're a newcomer to exercise.
- Ease yourself into more intense exercise with training rather than just plunging into it, even if you're a seasoned athlete.
- Perform additional stretches and lower your intensity and duration to adapt to changes in surface or terrain.
- Buy athletic shoes that are designed for the activity you participate in.
- Check the floor before signing up for an aerobics class make sure the floor provides sufficient shock absorption.
- Learn and maintain the proper stride for jogging.
- Consult your doctor or a foot specialist before starting an exercise program if you have a discrepancy in the length of your legs or a condition such as flat feet.


