

Ben Smathers and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers

Ben Smathers' name is either the most well known name in clogging or almost unknown, depending on where you are. If you are backstage at the Grand Ole Opry everyone knows Ben, but then they ought to . . . he has been a regular member of the Opry for over 31 years.

Ben brought the Stoney Mountain Cloggers to the Opry for the first time on September 13th, 1958. Since that time, on every other Saturday night, Ben Smathers and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers have danced for the "millions" of fine folks who have made their way to either the Ryman Auditorium, where Ben started, or to the new home of the Opry at the Opryland Park and Hotel Complex.

If you go to the mountains of Hendersonville or Maggie Valley, North Carolina, you'll find folks there that know Ben or at least know of him. That's where Ben grew up and learned the dance called "clogging" from none other than Sam Queen. Queen was the leader of a group called the Soco Gap Dancers, who were invited to Washington in 1938 to dance for the President of the United States and the Queen of England. Upon seeing the dance, the Queen was quoted as saying, "Why that looks just like our clogging."

Ben was like a lot of the locals in his community. After a long hard week at work, he was ready for



We received a long letter from Bernadette Savoie, Director of the Port City Cloggers in Canada. This lady is BUSY! She has a four unit apartment building and does all the carpentry and renovating herself - wood paneling, painting, laying carpet - but draws the line at electrical work. When Bernadette became involved in what was to become her favorite activity, little did she realize that she would be an early candidate for "teacher burnout". Folks said that they would like to learn Clogging, but did not want to drive across town. So Bernadette went to them, and soon had four small groups in four different halls. She attempted to teach all the dancers at the same rate of speed, spending extra time with those who needed it, and therefore lost some of the faster learners who needed extra challenges. Bernadette says she read the article on "Teacher Burnout" and did some tall thinking. She revised her teaching schedule and now has one with a more laissez faire policy, which has resulted in a happier teacher. "I feel like a new person and I have five nights off!"

She does have a slower paced/Senior class with over 40 students (the oldest clogger is 77) and they have done several demonstrations and performances. She has inaugurated once a month dances to review the oldie routines. (Proceeds go to assist a child needing surgery.) She candidly admits she is 53 years old and credits Steve Smith with being her idol, especially after reading his article on "How Do We Keep Our Seniors Dancing?" Our Editorial HAT'S OFF to BERNADETTE SAVOIE!

We don't ordinarily dignify anonymous letters with rebuttal. This one was postmarked **Seattle, Washington January 29, 1990** and was written on the blue centerfold subscription form. If someone doesn't value their own opinion enough to sign it, then why should we take it to heart? If this person is so disappointed in the **Double Toe Times,** would they please send me a copy of <u>any</u> clogging magazine that fulfills all the needs expressed in their note.

On the one hand this person said "Paying for adv. is not of interest to clogging unless we learn about the dance and customs and style of cloggers to make members keep clogging." Response: There seem to be three different thoughts in that statement. This person doesn't like paying for advertisements. In fact there were several other unconnected comments regarding ads: "All advs are Southern states of no value to us in Washington State" and Upcoming Events was circled with "Where in Washington State" added. There is one other comment about advertisements which I will reserve for last just to prove we don't Lack Humor as this person stated. The cold hard facts of publishing a magazine are that the subscriptions barely pay for postage and handling. Advertising revenues pay for printing, collating, stitching, and trimming. Advertising pays for the halftones, the typesetting, the office supplies, the office personnel, the long distance phone bills - in short it pays the bills. Our advertisers are, for the most part, pleased with the response they get from the subscribers. Oddly enough, the blue centerfold subscription form was in the January 1990 issue, the one that had a full page ad for a workshop in Kent, Washington. There was also an upcoming event in Tri Cities, Washington. If I don't know about workshops, conventions or competitions either the host or promoter isn't interested in letting everyone know, or it just might be that there AREN'T any! This person wants to know more about the dance and customs and style of clogging. We print every scrap of information we can lay on our word processor on, but, as any Editor can tell you, it isn't easy to find. We strongly suspect that this person needs videotapes and workshops, which are advertised in the **Double Toe Times!**

The last part of the sentence "... to make members keep clogging" seems to have some connection to "5th year needs 'cheering on' for new member interest - older ones are dropping out - no one to take their places." Sounds to me like a personal problem. This is the job of an INSTRUCTOR with a happy cheery positive attitude, one who keeps the dancers enthused at weekly classes. It is doubtful that this humble magazine can keep dancers from dropping out of clogging!

The writer also stated that The Double Toe Times was a Disappointment - Lacks Enthusiasm - Reason I became a Subscriber was that your older magazine was better. WHAT older magazine? We completely agree that some issues are better than others, but it is the only one we have ever published. (Now in

our eighth year!)

And finally - this writer complains about the advertisements but also states (and I quote) "Lacks place to buy clogging dudes." We will assume that the person meant duds but on the outside chance that it is a "she" clogger looking to buy a "he" clogger, we will sadly admit that we have never thought of a Personal column! Hmmm? Who says we Lack Humor?

If anyone wants to comment on this mean spirited missive, have at it! I personally am contemptuous of cowards who slash and run without signing their name.

NINE - Never have a philosophy which supports a lack of courage!


TEN - Never look back unless you intend to go that way!


Skip also informed us that the **Hee Haw Clogging Championships** have been canceled for 1990. For verification, call Melanie Fly, Opryland, Nashville,







The Junk Drawer(s)

junk (jungk), n. 1. any old or discarded material, as metal, paper, rags, etc. 2. anything that is regarded as worthless, meaningless, contemptible, or mere

drawer (dror), n. 1. a sliding, lidless, horizontal compartment, as in a piece of furniture, that may be drawn out in order to gain access to it. junk drawer (jungk dror), n. 1. two separate words which take on a totally new meaning when used together. junk must be of questionable value and small enough to fit in the sliding, lidless, horizontal compartment which often becomes so filled with junk that a knife must be inserted into the top slit to compress the junk so that the drawer may be drawn out in order to gain access to it or conversely the junk must be mashed down in order to close the drawer. Dr. Ziggie Junkfreud considers junkdrawerism an extremely positive mental health sign. compulsive types with no piles or junk drawers often need extensive therapy.

(It's expensive to buy Hernia Insurance!) Fickle couldn't possibly afford to move. He has seven built-in drawers in the kitchen, two of which are devoted to kitchen junk. Jar lids to which there are no corresponding jars, a mashed strainer, a metal garlic press still in its original wrapper marked \$.29

Woolworth, and 17 mysterious appliance cords, one cloth wrapped. Of course the minute Fickle throws any one of these things out, he will instantly need it! The kitchen junk-junk drawer yielded an 18 year old knotted brittle dog leash for the Boss's 18 year old knotted brittle dog, 3 plastic doodads for electrical outlet/baby protection, seven years worth of Rabies tags, two glass doodads to put under table legs, (presumably most tables have at least three legs), a candle stub, picture hanging hooks, one phillips and three flat screw drivers, and an ear plug and cord for a tape recorder that died four years ago.

L. VanM. has lived in her new apartment a mere three months and itemized (and recognized) 31 things in her junk drawer. It appears to be a work-bench/ desk/sewing box combo with coupons, grocery receipts and TCBY flyers added for fillip. Fickle's request for this information resulted in a sleepless night for L. who wrote "Now that I have reviewed the contents of this drawer, it is going to drive me nuts!" Odd. Fickle views his many junk drawers as hoards of lost treasure. The possible exception is when he is looking for something which should have been in its proper place, and it is located in the last junk drawer

on the bottom. AAAARGH! Years ago, when Fickle lived in a place where Spring actually happened, a dramatic change came over the entire household, especially the Boss. As inevitable and predictable as lemmings marching to the sea, the battle cry was SPRING CLEANING! The entire family moved from room to room, and weird out-of-place things were dumped into a large box. Laugh A Little

by Stan Burdick from USDA News Vol II, No. 1 January 1990

Humor is one of the most valuable tools that a caller can have (many of us don't realize what a valuable asset it is) to go hand-in-hand with our technical skills. It helps us over a lot of rough spots (psychologically, mentally, and physically) and helps those we deal, with if we can keep 'em smiling both on and off the dance floor. Lately some items have been written that bear repeating in capsule form. From Callerlab (John Kwaiser) we quote, "Humor people are often surprised or insulted when told that they have a poor sense of humor. Many do not take humor seriously - they see it as a frill, as childish, as escapism, as a luxury or as unimportant in the larger scheme of things. Many people think that it should be enjoyed only after the important or serious things have been resolved. Humor is an integral part of square dancing (. . . and clogging!). When people come together for a dance, a principal objective is to have fun. People laugh at themselves and others for little things that are said and done during the dance. Thus, humor cannot be separated and done only after the dance."

"The following are taken from prescriptions for developing your sense of humor that apply to square

Think funny. There is a funny side or flip side to every dance situation.

Laugh at yourself. There will always be situations where the things that you do are humorous, and because you're physically active in a dance, they are more apt to occur.

Make others laugh. A square dance is a group of people that are always ready to have others help them laugh and enjoy the evening. Do you know people who are serious all the time? They seldom laugh, seldom kid anyone or tell a joke. They are no fun to be around. If you think you are a little bit that way, start by getting a good humor book from the library. Memorize a few, especially quick quips that you can use now and then. Skip the questionable ones. To the best of our knowledge, the human being is the only creature that has the capacity for humor.'

"Humor, in times of hurt will contribute to the healing and comfort so desperately needed. Humor, as we now know, is part of the healing process. It's now well accepted that humor releases endorphins, chemicals in the brain that are stimulated by positive emotions. We have always known thoughts stimulate the body glands to produce secretions. Researchers at UCLA Medical School have proven that the brain is, in effect, a gland that produces chemical secretions when stimulated by the positive emotion of humor." DTT research: Endorphins are natural peptides released by the hypothalmus which attach to pain receptors and produce an absence of pain. It is commonly thought to be the bodies natural morphine. Resolve today: I'll laugh a bit more (especially at myself) and make others laugh. Sometime you may then be able to laugh up a storm - in the middle of one!

How Do You Rate As A Director?



Competition Committee: Betsy Farlow Durham, NC (919) 477-2789 one of the Friday and Saturday night dances held at gathering places such as the "Farmers Ball", "Jump Off Rock", "Saddle Club". Clogging was never taught at the dances, you had to just keep coming and watching until you thought you were ready and got the nerve to get up and dance.

Ben used to watch Sam Queen and his group dance and picked it up and practiced until he was ready to visit all the dances and start participating. Ben enjoyed the dancing and it wasn't long before he formed his own group. They became known as, Ben Smathers and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers. Until that time, all of the other groups called their teams dancers. Ben was the first to use the term clogger, or clogging, to describe his dancers and the dance they were doing. Ben was also the first to put big taps on their shoes. "You couldn't buy them locally," he said, "so we had to order them out of Atlanta, I think." They went to dance at the Mountain Folk Festival soon thereafter, and Mr. Lunsford would not let them dance on his stage because of the taps. (Bascom Lamar Lunsford was a traditional folk dancer and musician who founded the Mountain Folk Festival, Asheville, North Carolina.)

Around this time Ben met a pretty young lady named Margaret Chapman. Ben and Margaret were married around 1950 and have been dancing together ever since. About 1955, Ben and Margaret started dancing on WFBC-TV, a local TV station in Greenville, South Carolina. They did part of the show in the studio, and then went live to the Promenade Party, one of the local Friday or Saturday

night dances, and finished the show there.

In 1958, Ben decided to try a long shot. He wanted a chance to dance on the World Famous Grand Ole Opry! He sent Margaret to Nashville with a 16mm film of the team dancing on the WFBC-TV show in Greenville. She delivered the film and was told they would review it and "get in touch" A week later, they were called to Nashville to be guests for one show. Ben loaded his cloggers up for a nine to ten hour drive to Nashville. Ben and Margaret and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers hit the stage that night and the crowd went absolutely wild! Mr. W. D. Kilpatrick, who was then General Manager of the Opry, liked what he saw and the crowds' reaction. He hired them on the spot and they have been regular members of the Grand Ole Opry ever since.

The trip from Asheville, North Carolina to Nashville, Tennessee was a long journey on winding, two-lane roads through the mountains of the Carolinas and Tennessee. Ben and his group left early every Saturday morning, performed at the Opry, then loaded back up and drove straight through, arriving home around 10 or 11 A.M. on Sunday morning. Ben then got ready to start his 3:00 PM shift at the Railroad. They did this every other Saturday for nine years, through snow, ice, rain and hazardous road conditions. Finally, in 1967, Ben and Margaret decided the job at the Opry was going to last, and they made the move to Nashville.

Ben's easy-going attitude and the uniqueness of his act made him a favorite of all the country music stars, and the group began to be invited to go on tour with them as part of their shows. The late Red Foley was among the first and from 1958 to 1963,

Ben and Margaret and The Stoney Mountain Cloggers were a regular part of the Red Foley Show.

During that period in 1961, they appeared for the first time in Carnegie Hall, New York City. (As of this date, they have been the first and only cloggers to dance there). They also appeared at Carnegie Hall again in May 1981. In early 1960-61, the group appeared in their first (of six) major motion pictures. It was titled "Country Music on Broadway", and featured Ralph Emory and other Country Music Stars.

Canadian television was yet another vehicle by which Ben was able to reach hundreds of thousands of viewers by exposing them to the dance. Ben was a regular on Carl Smith's Television Show on C.B.C.-T.V. in Toronto Canada for five years, 1963-1968.

In 1968, Ben and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers toured with the Roy Rogers and Dale Evans Show, a tour that lasted six years and reached people of all ages and from all walks of life. Everyone was fascinated by the strange "new" dance they were seeing. In the six years Ben toured with Roy Rogers (1968-1974), he took the dance to civic centers, high school gyms, rodeos, and even to some of the largest casinos in Las Vegas.

In 1975 through these combined efforts and all of the good will and interest Ben was stirring up and spreading to others from the state of Tennessee, the Governor of Tennessee gave Ben Smathers the title of "Dance Master of Country Music". Things were starting to happen for Ben, and his talents were be-

ginning to be recognized.

One of the greatest honors to bestow on someone is to commemorate a special day in their name in their home state. Such an honor was given to Ben and Margaret when the Governor of North Carolina proclaimed January 17, 1976, as Ben and Margaret

Smathers Day in North Carolina.

In 1977, Ben was asked to join the Charlie Daniels Show to tour as a regular act. After almost twenty years on the Opry at that time, Ben was hesitant to accept. He feared that perhaps the crowds would not accept him and this simple dance which had been so much a part of his life. He thought that since clogging was a little "old-fashioned" and the crowds that followed Charlie Daniels were a much younger generation, that clogging might not be well received. But Charlie was insistent. He knew that what Ben and his dancers did was unique for any kind of audience. He persuaded Ben it would work by saying, "You just dance and I'll play the fiddle and we'll After about two seconds into the dance at their first show, Ben looked at Margaret, as they were on stage clogging, and proclaimed, "This is going to work!" As they danced on to the stage, crowd went wild. Much to Ben's surprise not only was he accepted, but year after year, from 1977 through 1983, the crowds at the Charlie Daniels concerts expected and looked forward to seeing Ben Smathers and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers!

Ben was oblivious to the interest he was creating. People everywhere were talking about this dance and seeking others who shared the same interest. What was this dance they were seeing? Was it taught by anyone? A great amount of interest was growing among the concert attendees who saw Ben Smathers and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers and those that had seen them before were coming back for more, trying to see how to do the dance called "clogging". People

What's in a Name?


The search for a name for a new clogging group can be frustrating. If yours is the first group in the area - the town, the county, a creek, or a mountain can be the proper choice. Naturally, you don't knowingly want to use a name someone already has (though there are lots of Orange Blossom and Sunshine groups).

Grass Valley and Nevada City are twin towns in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada Mountains of California. They are in real GOLD country near gold mining towns like Placerville, Sonora and Gold Run. During the Gold Rush, hard-rock miners from Cornwall, England were imported for their experience and skill and vast knowledge of tunneling and mining techniques. Along with their mining skill, the Cornish brought their language, their lively personalities, their fatalistic view of life, and their mining superstitions.

Tommyknockers were elves said to be descended from ancient elves known as Vugs and Piskies. The



Cornish brought them to America and they were as important to the miner as his hard hat and double jack. The elves were said to watch over the deep miners, leading them to rich ore veins, testing shaft conditions, and issuing life-saving warnings of cave-ins, water leaks or runaway carts by tapping on air pipes or timber supports. Miners often left pieces of their meat pies for the Tommyknockers. With the decline of hard-rock mining in the Gold Country, the Tommyknockers activities ceased. But not quite! The Tommyknocker Cloggers of Grass Valley, California are as mischievous and lively as the Cornish elves of bygone days.

Sponsoring Your First Clogging Workshop Part VII: On-Site Management - Keeping Your Event Running Smoothly

The key to any successful event is advance planning and preparation. Think ahead. Develop floor plans, a schedule of events, signage, and back-up plans.

It is the facility's responsibility to set up your function rooms the way you want them. Rental fees should include room setup. However, unless you convey your desires very clearly, you're bound to be frustrated during the setup. I recommend actually drawing a scaled down diagram of each room. This accomplishes three things: 1) the facility will have no excuse for setting rooms up incorrectly; 2) you'll get a good feel of how much space each stage, dance floor, and chairs will occupy. You may even discover a particular room(s) is too small or not adequate; and 3) it's a good means of determining how much staging, flooring, and chairs are needed. The facility may not be equipped to supply all that you need and arrangements with an outside supplier will be necessary. Doing this in advance will save you a lot of pain on-site.

It's important that you develop a schedule and plan out your time in advance. Many of us have big plans for everything we're going to do at our "three hour evening dance." However, once we actually put it all down on paper, we realize there's not enough time for everything, and we need to scale back. While the event is occurring is not the time to begin cutting back and telling people you're sorry but you won't be able to "fit in" their exhibition, skit, fun dance, etc. A schedule is an excellent vehicle for keeping things moving smoothly. If your emcee knows what's supposed to happen and when, he/she

can keep the program moving along.

Get to know your facility and develop appropriate and adequate signage to direct people. Nice signs take longer to make than we realize, so prepare them ahead of time. Then, all you need to do is set them up upon arrival. Do not go without. Even the smallest of events can be frustrating for your guests if they have to figure out where to go, so make it

Prepare back-up plans for everything. Know other suppliers who can fill your needs in case those you've contracted with do not come through. Be prepared for instructors who may cancel at the last minute,

exhibition groups who may cancel, etc.

Prior to your event, a few days to one week if possible, have a pre-event meeting with your staff, review all aspects of your event. Make sure your people know what is expected of them. Find out if they have any concerns and resolve any issues before hand.

At the meeting with the facility, a member from each of the facility's departments should be present. In the case of a hotel, this would include: your sales contact, convention manager, banquet manager, front desk manager, head of housekeeping, head of security, and anyone else you deem necessary. Review your event with these people in detail. Discuss the

all out for them. If you're expecting dance halls to be refreshed every half hour, let the banquet captain know, even if it is clearly written in your event orders or contract. Let them know when you will break for lunch, dinner, etc. Leave no stone unturned. This will provide you with quite a bit of leverage after the event in case you are dissatisfied and want compensation for unsatisfactory service. Also, at this meeting, be sure to secure all of the phone numbers and/or extensions of key staff people who will be available to you during your event.

Okay, all the preliminaries are complete. Now what? First of all, arrive early the day your event is to start. Oversee the facility staff as they do their part in setting up for your event. Be sure you have adequate help arriving early to help set up sound equipment, decorations, signs, registration areas, etc. These responsibilities should be delegated in advance. Each of your chairpersons should be responsible for whatever preparations are necessary to carry out their duties. It takes considerable time to set up, so make sure you allow yourself enough (and then some). Depending on the size of your event, a quick method of communicating (ex. walkietalkies) with your "key" staff people can be very helpful. Appropriate equipment can be rented in advance. some occasions, a facility's audio visual department may be able to supply you with walkie-talkies or bee-

If your event is large or spread out, it's helpful to have an individual assigned to each room to handle any mishaps or instructor's needs which may arise.

During your event, you and your key staff people should rove constantly. Talk to as many people as you can - guests and volunteer staff. Let guests know you appreciate their patronage. Solicit their ideas for improvements. Let your workers know they're doing a great job and you're available to them for assistance. If some things do go sour, the feelings of warmth and friendship you've generated will keep people from being overly negative and leaving unhappy. Keep phone numbers and extensions for important facility's staff with you at all times. When a need arises, you can act quickly by calling for assistance from the nearest house phone.

Keep in mind that you can **never** please everyone. There are bound to be people who'll complain no matter what. Take it all in stride. Constructive criticism should be filed in the back of your mind for future action. Destructive criticism (useless/unfounded complaints) should be forgotten as fast as you've heard them; they're not worth fretting over. All you can do is put your best foot forward, and no matter what the outcome, everything will be okay.

Last, but not least, have a place where you can escape to on occasion and be alone. I recommend that every event director have their own sleeping room, if applicable. If no room or "private space" is available, go for a walk outside and get away from everyone for a few minutes. There are times when the best thing you can do is "escape" and try to relax. After a bit of rest or refresh, you can return with a better perspective of things.


Running an event can be easy, providing you plan well in advance, prepare yourself for mishaps, communicate with the facility and your volunteers, allow yourself adequate time, keep your perspective (as well as, a smile on your face), and just do your best.





NCHC Judges/Directors Workshop

The fourth annual Judges and Directors Workshop was held February 3 and 4, 1990 in Charlotte, North Carolina. All NCHC categories plus solos, duets, and scorekeeping were covered. The focus of the workshop was not only on how to judge, but also what directors should do in and out of the competition environment. It is a course that every judge and director should attend at least once. This workshop is part of the criterion for becoming a certified judge. The instructors were:

Betsy Farlow, Durham, NC, who instructed on

Smooth Mountain Square Dance.

Garland Steele, Tornado WV, instructed on Running Set Hoedown, Southern Appalachian, and Open Freestyle.

Elliott Skeen, Denton, NC, on Open Free Style, Southern Appalachian, and Country Hoedown.

David Phillips, Atlanta, GA, ethics of judging and

scorekeeping.

Ray Hattaway, Havana, FL, Duets, Duos and Solos.

Susan Stowe, Jefferson, GA, instructed on Open Precision, 4Couple Precision, and 6 or 8 Couple Precision.

Jean Stephenson, Catawba, SC, the chairperson of the instructors for the workshop taught Show and Line Dance and kept the seminar on time and moving

for two days.

The workshop provided everyone with an insight as to what judges should look for in each category. Everyone was allowed the opportunity to judge several teams from each category on video. This gave them the opportunity to use different types of scoresheets. After all was said and done, the group not only appreciated what judges go through, but also what the directors experience. There were participants from Georgia, Florida, Wyoming, North Carolina, South Carolina, and West Virginia. Remember to keep the first weekend in February open next year for this fantastic workshop. Hope to see you there.

The NCHC Competition Rules and Guidelines meeting was held Saturday evening February 3. This meeting was relatively calm, compared to previous meetings. Does this mean that everyone is finally getting satisfied with the current competition rules?

"Cross your fingers."

NCHC holds this annual discussion on what rules should be added, changed or deleted for the next competition year. This is the time of the year where team directors, judges, and competition directors can voice their opinion and make a difference. The most significant recommended change is to create and sanction a new category, Open Smooth. This will allow open teams (uneven numbers of girls and boys) to learn a dying dance form and perhaps keep it alive.



started talking and searching out others with the same fascination for the dance.

People began to try imitating the clog steps at Bluegrass Festivals and fiddle contests where Bluegrass or country music was being played. Ultimately some of the better dancers started teaching clogging. Today there are about as many different steps and variations of the dance as there are teachers, and clogging has become popular not only in the small rural areas of its origin, but in large cities as well.

This Thanksgiving, November 23, 1989, Ben spoke to over five thousand cloggers as he welcomed them to the Music City for the 6th Annual National C.L.O.G. Convention held at the Opryland Hotel. The cloggers represented all 50 states, plus a group of five hundred from Canada, four from Korea, two from Japan and about ten from Australia!

Today, at 59, Ben Smathers is still working his spot on the Grand Ole Opry, still doing it in the original and pure form as he learned the dance. and Margaret have five children and he is as energetic as any of his sons or daughters who are dancing with him today.

Ben Smathers and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers still keep up a fair amount of tour dates, doing conventions, fairs and festivals all over the world. They are scheduled to return to England again this year as well as Switzerland and possibly Germany.

Ben has performed before many dignitaries and leaders of foreign countries. In 1974, he entertained the Foreign Diplomatic Corps in the Roosevelt Hotel in New Orleans, and in August 1976, he entertained members of the United Nations.

Ben has received awards and honors too numerous to mention in the more than 31 years he has been a member of the Grand Ole Opry. He has toured all over the United States, Canada, and Europe. He has 300 plus network television appearances (including a recent episode on America's Most Wanted, where he played the part of a grandfather who was killed by his grandson).

He has 6 motion pictures to his credit. He has appeared in Nevada's largest casinos and showrooms; and the group is the only clogging team to ever appear in Carnegie Hall. While there are probably many contemporary cloggers who are unfamiliar with Ben and Margaret Smathers and the Stoney Mountain Cloggers their performances have spread the joy far and wide, and inspired others to CLOG!


Amber Hanford/Amy Dunlap Ain't No Mountain Cloggers De Motte, Indiana
