Clog America 1991 European Tour

Utah's *Clog America Dance Ensemble* was the 1991 United States representative to three of France's most prestigious International Festivals. The Ensemble drew its dancers and musicians from four different areas of Utah. Under artistic directors Shawnda Bishop and Bonnie Romney from West Valley City and manager Dennis Cobia from Orem, the group consisted of 16 championship level cloggers, 6 band members, 1 Indian dancer and 6 chaperones.

After monthly rehearsals from October through May and several extra June rehearsals, we left on July 3, 1991 from the Salt Lake International Airport for France. Arriving in Paris the morning of July 4th, we soon found out that we were to spend the greater part of the day at the airport awaiting groups from Israel and Egypt. Our group was then divided for our ten-hour bus trip to Bayonne, France. One half of us traveled with the Egyptians and the



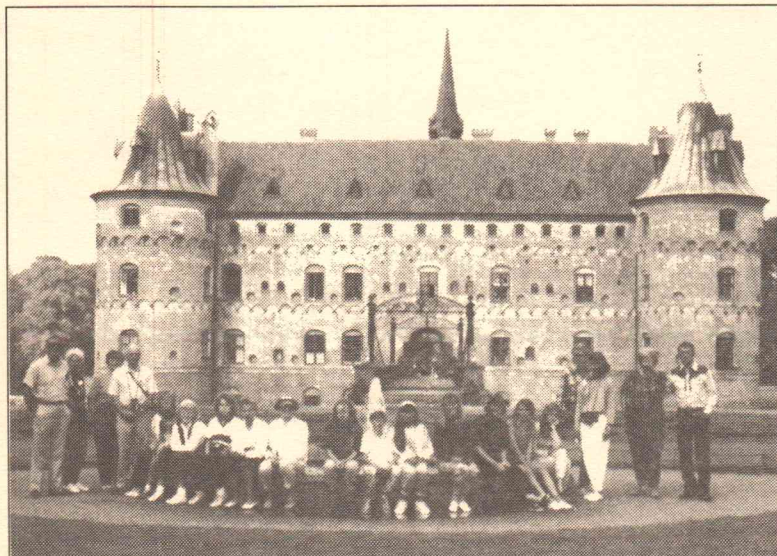
The Americans performed mini-shows in the streets of many French towns.

other half with the Israelis. Thus we began our adventures that would last the next three weeks.

The *Festival International De Folklore Du Pays Basque* was held in Biarritz, France. A resort community located next to Bayonne, it was discovered by Napoleon and hugs the

Atlantic coast on the Bay of Biscay. The countryside is green and the people are warm and friendly. The countries represented at this festival were Siberia, Mexico, Bulgaria, France, Egypt, Israel and USA.

Clogging goes to Denmark

With the 5:00 rising of the morning sun in Iceland, the *Fancy Feat Cloggers* of Central Florida found themselves on the way to Denmark. After a year-long planning, with the assistance of the *Campbell Folk School Cloggers* of Brasstown, North Carolina, our dreams finally came true. The *Fancy Feat Cloggers*, *Campbell Folk School Cloggers*, and members of the *Sidekick Cloggers* of LaBelle, Florida, spent two fabulous clogging weeks in Denmark. Donald Thompkins of St. Cloud, Florida was the group leader. The clogging group of 26 dancers were hosted by three different sport and dance clubs around Denmark. They were given a grand tour of all of Denmark and treated royally. They danced in Legoland, city squares, sport

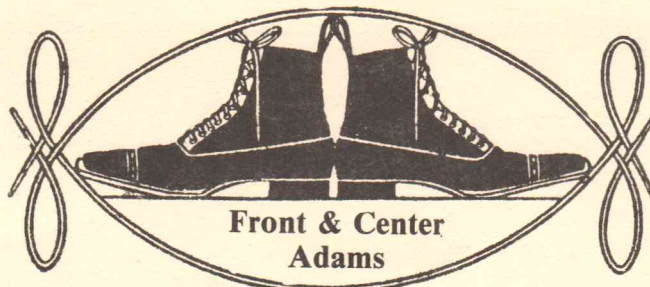

I have been following your articles on clogging and find them very interesting. I direct the *Chesapeake Bay Cloggers* and teach clogging, and I thought another opinion might be welcomed.

I have always believed that sharing is the measure by which everyone should be judged. After all, who is the better person - the one who has a lot, or the one who shares what he has?

I think we should all remember that clogging was originally performed by the people, not for the people. Today's new styles are putting the *By The People* farther out of reach. The contemporary routines with jazz, tap, acrobatics and even break dancing are the exhibitions of today, which is fine, but some people are led to believe that this is all there is to clogging. They are not even aware that the traditional dances were for everyone, and they walk away from the exhibition thinking "I could never do that."

I have been to exhibitions and workshops where only contemporary clogging was performed and taught, and it was presented as *Clogging*, as if it were the only way it is danced.

I have asked other directors and instructors about traditional clogging and have been given blank stares, like, "What are you talking about?" I have even been to open clog dances where "Big Circle" dance was advertised, and it actually ended up being line dance type routines done in a circle.

Please don't misunderstand this! I am not against the contemporary styles, I just believe that if people are going to present exhibitions to the public, they should be real careful not to misrepresent it.

The *Chesapeake Bay Cloggers* perform an average of 55 exhibitions a year. They run from 30 minutes to two hours and I am very careful to let people know the difference between the traditional folk dances and the contemporary dances.

Maybe, Frank Bonner's, *Clogging and the Southern Appalachian Square Dance* should be mandatory reading for all directors and instructors.

Maybe, one of the National Organizations will try to promote and give clogging back to the people, instead of spreading the gap between the dancers and the people. "I doubt it", but that's a topic for another discussion.

I really do love clogging. I've been dancing for over ten years and teaching for over four years and I know, I can not do some of the dance steps done today. This has caused me to reflect on whether or not I should stay with it. I will, but it's because I know I still have some things to share and I like to see my dancers go beyond what I can teach.

I guess the best explanation of what I'm trying to say is this:

About two years ago I had set up a series of lessons and we were waiting for all the students to register for the lessons. We had about ten minutes before the lessons were to start, so I decided to let the team dance one of their exhibition routines (a Line Dance). About the same time, I noticed a woman with two young girls in the line, ready to sign up for lessons. When the routine started, this lady and her kids watched the routine with somewhat concerned expression on their faces. I thought, at the time, they were just impressed with what they were watching, and they were! When the dance was over I heard her say, "That was Great!!, but I'll never learn to do that." She took her two kids and left. I tried to talk to her, but she had been thoroughly intimidated and the topic was closed to discussion.

I will never let that happen again, but you can see it everyday, if you really look. I did not properly represent clogging and this woman thought that she had found out what clogging was.

So!! I think it is time for all cloggers to develop a new philosophy, It is not - "I'm this good." It should be, "I have this to share and teach."

From the "Show Me" state, I'd like to introduce you to the *Missouri Heritage Cloggers*. They started out three

years ago in their fifth grade classroom. When winter set in and recess was confined to the classroom, they started learning to clog just for exercise and lots of fun. As the kids and teacher seemed to both enjoy clogging they decided in the spring, when school was out, to start a clogging team. With advice and help from Pat Skinner Boshe, of Springfield, Missouri, who came to teach once a month, the *Missouri Heritage* team was born.

In the beginning there were 24 cloggers, eight boys and twelve girls, all but one were age ten, and the twelve year old became the instructor when Pat was not around. The following summer they went to their first BIG competition (Silver Dollar City) where they brought home one third place trophy in the team novice division and two male novice freestyle trophies, (Well, so much for the first competition.)

Silver Dollar City '91 was much more exciting as the team had grown to fifty members and altogether they brought home 11 trophies.

The team has traveled to the competition in Indiana, attended workshops and traveled around the state performing at festivals, dinners, fairs, parades, nursing homes, schools, and you name it . . .

On September 21, twenty four members of the team attended the Fifth Annual Clog Fest, sponsored by Pat Hughes and the Lockwood Cloggers at Greenfield, Missouri, bringing home a total of 13 trophies and medals.

The team is looking forward to beginning their new clogging year with a visit from Stacey Maples of Billings, Missouri, and a workshop just for FUN!!!

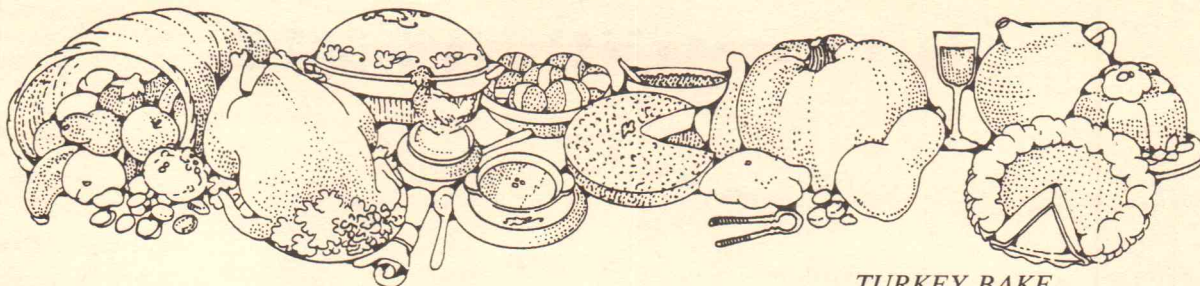

HOBO STEW

Here's an idea for a chilly class night now that November is upon us. Have a Hobo Dance and make Hobo Stew! Quantities will depend on how many attend. One preselected person must buy and prepare the meat (we suggest it be purchased out of club funds).

Brown stewing beef and onions. Slow cook, adding water to cover, several hours until tender. A *Crock Pot* would be ideal for someone who works. Dry Lipton's Onion Soup Mix and barley can be added.

On the night of the Hobo Dance every attendee must bring one can of vegetables i.e. tomatoes, corn, peas, cooked black-peas, okra, lima beans, green beans, potatoes, etc. Drain vegetables. In a LARGE pot combine all ingredients, add water and simmer during the dance. Serve with a beverage and french bread. For easy cleanup, paper soup bowls would be convenient. Don't forget a can opener and a ladle. Thanks to Square Dancer Mary Raney, Casselberry, Florida, for sharing the Hobo Dance and Hobo Stew.

Decisions, decisions - ham or turkey? Dear friends from years gone by, always roasted a goose on Thanksgiving, though they referred to it as a *Swoose*. It was basted with enough alcoholic concoctions that it became Swizzled Goose and thus Swoose! Goose has a lot of fat and the skin must be pierced while baking so that when it's done, the skin is crisp and lays next to the meat. Turkey, on the other hand, can become dry if not basted with fat and juices.

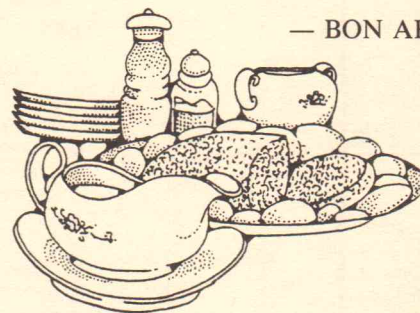
Whatever your predilection - turkey or ham, everyone has favorite dressings and accompaniments. The groaning board laden with everyone's favorite dishes become heat n' eat leftovers the next day. And then what? Here are two delightful recipes either from leftover turkey or ham, or from scratch. Both would go to a covered-dish supper nicely, for it is my experience that very few folks take a meat dish.

TURKEY BAKE

- 1½-2 cups of cooked chunked Turkey
- 1 pkg. Stove Top dressing or leftover Dressing
- 1 can Cream of Chicken Soup
- 1 cup Grated Cheddar Cheese

Prepare dressing as directed on box and put in 9x13 casserole dish. Layer turkey on top. Mix soup with ½ can water and pour over turkey. Top with grated cheese and bake at 350° uncovered for 30-40 minutes. Can be prepared ahead and refrigerated. Great with Chicken too!

HAM LOAF & MUSTARD SAUCE

| 2 lbs. Ground Pork | Mustard Sauce |
| 1 lb. Ground Smoked Ham | ½ cup Tomato Soup |
| 1 Beaten Egg | ½ cup Prepared Mustard |
| 1 cup Bread Crumbs | ½ cup Vinegar |
| ½ cup Milk | ½ cup Sugar |
| 3 tbs. Canned Tomato Soup | |
| ½ tsp. Paprika | |
| ¼ tsp. Salt | |

Mix all ingredients for meat loaf. Shape into a loaf. Place in a baking dish and slice 1 medium onion over the top. Bake at 350° - 1½ hours (basting occasionally with a few teaspoons of water).

Mix ingredients for mustard sauce. Stir together and heat (stove top). Serve hot over sliced ham loaf.

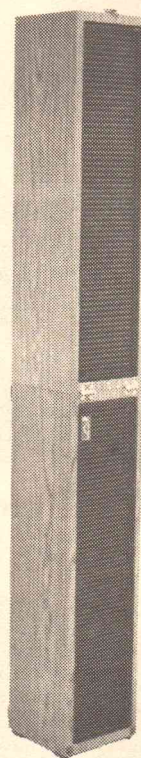

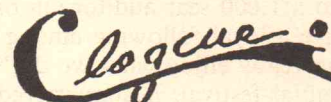

Getting a kick out of Italy - The American Folk Dancers on Tour in 1991

Ready at a moment's notice was the motto of a group of 22 college-aged folk dancers and a five-piece bluegrass band representing the United States at dance festivals in southern Italy and Sicily this summer.

"We like to think we were prepared for anything," says artistic director Charles West of Rexburg, Idaho, "but they managed to throw a curve or two at us." West, who teaches folk dance at Ricks College, a two-year junior college owned and operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, was referring to the "flying-by-the-seat-of-your-pants" approach adopted by Italian folk dance festival organizers. "We had prepared a 90-minute show and we're glad we did," West said. "More than once we were asked, at the last minute, to do our entire show. At other times they wanted twenty to forty-five minutes, once they made up their minds."

West's dance repertoire included a mix of square dances, clogging and round dances. A couple of novelty numbers, augmented by musical numbers by the band, rounded out the show.

After rehearsing three times weekly for four months from January through April, the group departed for Rome on July 19, 1991. A pre-tour show drew a sell-out crowd to a 1,000 seat auditorium on the Ricks campus. "We have a loyal following among vacationers in our area who really enjoy what we do," West said.

The initial festival, headquartered in Campobasso, (a five hour drive south and east of Rome) included performances at four different locations, with teams from Russia, Senegal, Yugoslavia, Indonesia and Italy participating in the first year of this particular festival. The United States team shared the stage with Yugoslavia in Pizzone and with Russia in Campobasso. All teams performed at the site of ancient ruins in Altilia. The final performance, a solo outing for the American team, came in Colletorto. The bus ride, to and from a ski resort area where the teams were housed, often took two hours or more one way.

The second festival, was located in San Giovanni Rotondo, in what is popularly known as "the spur" of Italy, an outcropping of land into the Adriatic Sea. Rain moved the ten year-old festival from a colorfully decorated outdoor stage into an overcrowded local cinema. Following two nights of performances, individual teams were featured in nearby towns before moving on to Catanzaro Lido, a resort town on the eastern seaboard of what is known as "the foot" of Italy.

Teams from Mexico and Spain, and a new Russian team joined the groups from the U.S., Senegal and Indonesia for three performances. All of the teams then moved on to the island of Sicily and dormitory-style accommodations in Messina, where they were joined by a



group from New Zealand and a new team from Yugoslavia.

Sicily, a mountainous island, has many of its towns located atop mountains, accessible only by way of narrow, winding roads. The Ricks College team performed in Borlo, Venetico, Castelmola, Bivona and Trecastagni. Travel to Bivona, for instance, required nearly five hours, one way. The stay in Messina was highlighted by a two-day festival in the town itself. In its 21st year, this year marked the first time a team from the United States participated.

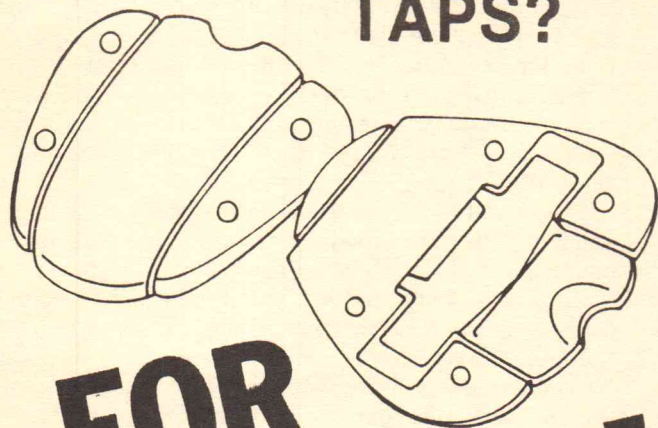
Some of the teams then moved on to Palermo, located on the northwestern side of the island. Two performances were held in Cefalu, east of Palermo along the coast, and in Corleone, inland from Palermo.

The U.S., another new Russian team, Senegal, New Zealand and Mexico were then transported back into the mainland of Italy to perform at Monte San Angelo. Also located in the "spur" of Italy, this three-day festival also had some of the teams performing at the nearby town of Mattinata.

After four weeks of touring, the American group left Rome on August 19, returning late that same night to Salt Lake City, Utah. "It was a very demanding tour," West said recently. "The stage was often crude with loose planks and a poor sound system. The long bus rides tended to wear us out as well. As far as the accommodations and food were concerned, they were first rate," West said. "Italy is a beautiful country and the people seemed to appreciate our performances."

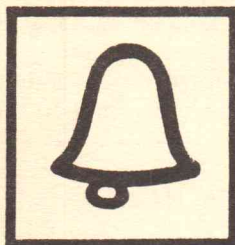

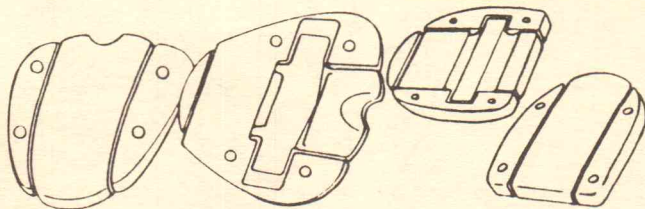

Nowadays, jazz movements and the strong beats of contemporary dance music provide opportunity for even more innovation by the spirited clog dancers of our country.

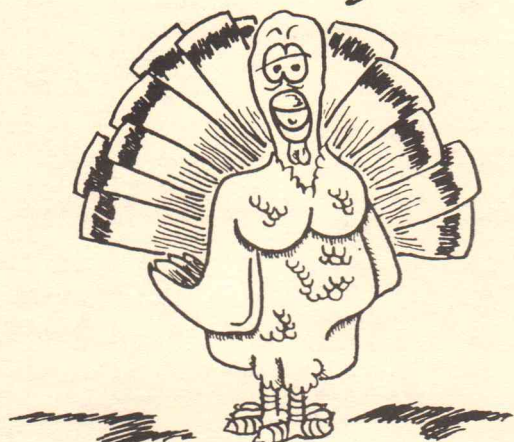

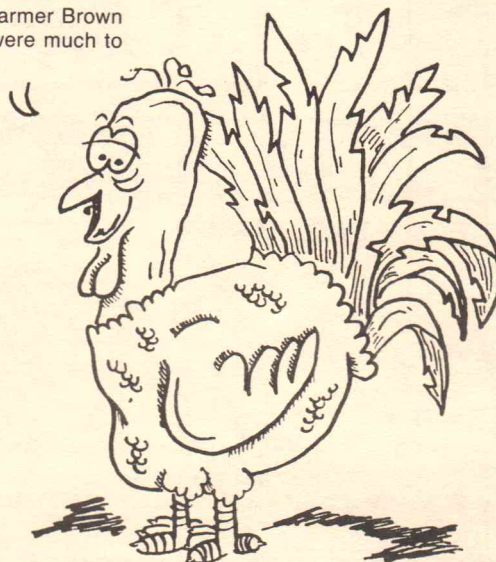

and dance clubs, and schools.

The Danes were very interested in clogging and expect to have the group back again. Clogging is virtually unknown in Denmark.

What a weary lot of 26 travelers we were - ten hours in the air and six on the bus - when we arrived in Rodkaersbro, Denmark. But what a thrill to see a large group of unknown yet friendly faces awaiting and cheering our arrival. Thus we started a two week odyssey in the wonderful country of Denmark.

During this time we were located in three distinct parts of the country - Northcentral Jylland, Fyn, Southeast Sjaelland. Therefore, each of us was hosted by three different families in small towns, villages, and farms. This gave us a unique opportunity to get the local flavor of the people and their culture and customs.

From these base locations we took in the surrounding countryside introducing clogging, seeing the sights, and visiting with the local people. We visited castles, churches, schools, windmills, farms, and parks. We were received by mayors, learned Danish folk dances, and received newspaper and radio coverage.

Observations and Impressions

People:

- Kind and gentle. Good sense of humor.
- Into health and fitness; emphasis on family and lifetime sports and recreational activities.
- Ecology-minded.
- Concern for children and the elderly.
- Pro-American
- Taxes (up to 50%) benefit local communities, health care, child care, elderly care, schools, recreational facilities, etc..
- Square dancing is catching on in some locations.

- 25th Wedding Anniversary celebrated in very special ways.
- Wearing apparel similar to U.S.; not a wide variety of fashion.
- Love flowers - outdoors and indoors; often see plants or flowers in every window.

Land

- Relatively flat and rolling; no mountains.
- No native stone. All rock material brought by glacier and deposited.
- Not much forest. Active planting effort underway.
- Hours of lingering twilight after sundown (Summer).
- Vast fields of grain - wheat, barley, rye, oats.
- Corn goes to the animals - especially pigs.
- Mostly small towns and villages.

Food

- Mueslix in creamy yogurt for breakfast.
- Open-faced sandwiches (never tops).
- Drink lots of juice - orange and apple.

- Enjoy ice cream.
- Most people have backyard vegetable gardens.
- Consume lots of cheese (even breakfast).
- Like licorice candies of all sorts.
- Drink much coffee; keep on table in insulated carafe.
- Lit candles at mealtime.
- Heavy, whole grain bread (dark).
- Eat less Danish pastry than expected.
- Using low-fat oleo; they export butter to common market countries.

Schools

- All grade levels housed in same school.
- Low pupil/teacher ratio.
- English is now mandatory.
- Quite locally controlled; school board is elected by parents.
- No grades given until 8th grade.
- High School graduates don a red ribboned white cap - the symbol of academic achievement.

Other

- No aluminum drink cans allowed.
- Auto headlights must be on at all times.
- Wide use of brick in building - even hundreds of years ago.
- Walking streets (no traffic) for shopping.
- Many youth do not drive right away; a license costs \$750.
- Gas is almost \$4.00 per gallon.

Tivoli Gardens, H.C. Anderson, and LEGOLAND are three attractions which were impressive. Tivoli is a fairy tale. This world famous amusement park in downtown Copenhagen was founded in 1843. It features 25 rides, Pantomine Theater, Concert Hall,

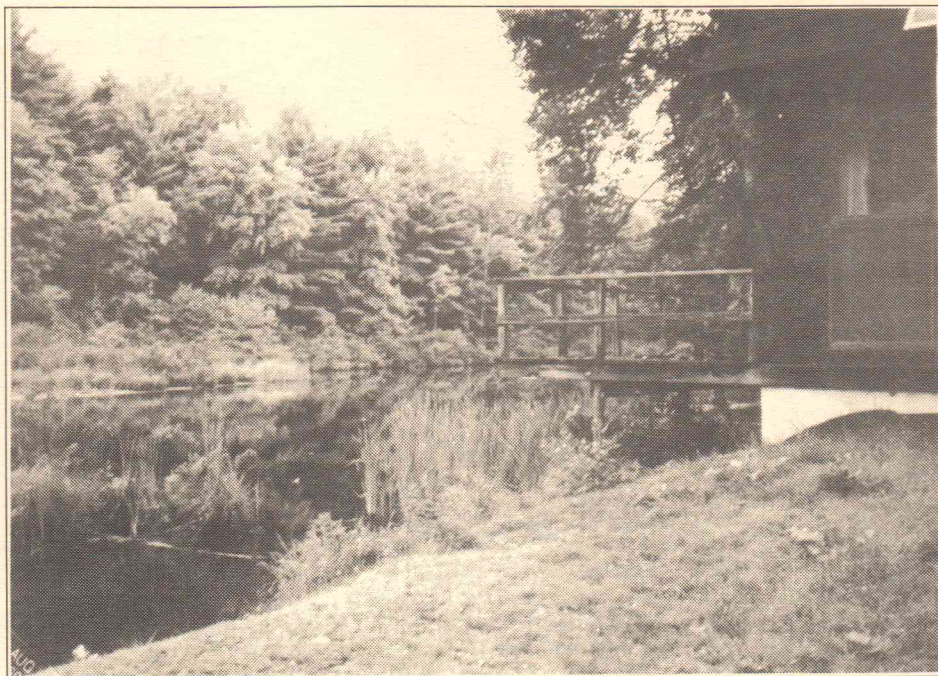

Ashokan

After I told my clogging friends about my experience at the Ashokan dance camp, they said, "Why haven't we heard about this? You should write about it for the *Double Toe Times*." And so I am!

Ashokan is a folk music and dance camp located in the Catskill Mountains south of Albany, New York. Many of you have probably heard "Ashokan Farewell", the theme song of the PBS series on the Civil War. That song was written by Jay Ungar. Jay and his wife, Molly Mason, run the Fiddle and Dance Workshops at Ashokan. There are four different weeks in August: Northern Week, Teachers Playshop, Western and Swing, and Southern Week. I went to Southern Week for the clogging.

Imagine spending a week with 150 fun people with good live music almost all day long and into the night. Add in good dancing and music classes, plus yummy food cooked by someone else. You can camp in tents under the trees or sleep in the bunkhouse. My car was not touched for an entire week!

The Southern Week program at Ashokan emphasizes southern style music, dance, and culture. There were many music and dance classes to choose from each hour. Each class met every day Monday through Friday. I danced 3 to 4 hours per day plus 2 to 3 hours at night! Even though hurricane Bob dumped rain on us for 3 days, we didn't care - we were too busy!

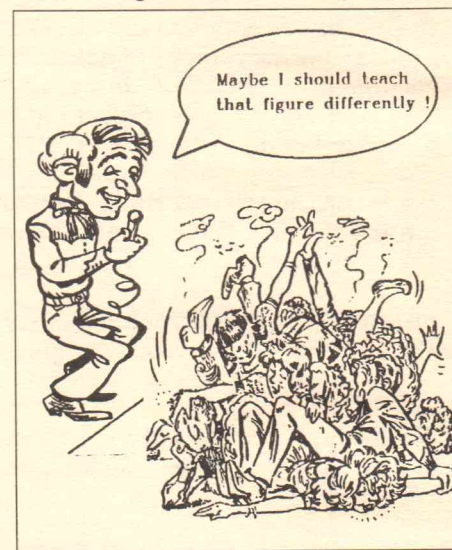
My days started with some informal

contra and square dancing. Then came the Clog II class taught by Clayton Shanilec, who is a member of *Rhythm in Shoes*. Clayton really expanded the way I look at clogging. He got us all doing the Tennessee Walking Step, which has four distinct sounds per beat of music. Then we played around with the step by taking out or putting back in parts of the step. We took the syn-copated step (step drag step step drag step step) and threw in some of the elements from the Tennessee Walking step to vary the rhythm. We then syn-copated normal steps, such as the basic step, the Indian, Buck and Wing, and even chugging. He took the pitter patter and had us take out or put in parts of it to hear what part of the beat we were emphasizing.

Clayton had us listen to the fiddle (all music was live) and to note when the music is high or low, and how to dance high or low along with it. We listened to banjo tunes and picked out syncopation. Sometimes Clayton would dance a rhythm for eight counts and then we'd try to imitate it - no easy feat! Clayton encouraged us to play with rhythms, make up our own steps, and to let the music tell our feet what to do rather than our brains.

The other clogging class I took was traditional clogging choreography. It was taught by Rodney Sutton, who used to be on the Green Grass Cloggers and the Fiddle Puppets. He started us out with things like Duck for the

Oyster/Dig for the Clam. Then he taught us a routine he used to do with the Green Grass Cloggers. It was a dynamic square dance with interesting figures and steps. One step was the Indian swing that you did with your partner. Imagine doing a square dance swing, but having your feet doing the Indian step. Rodney and another staff member showed us how you could playfully kick your partner's rear-end while doing the Indian swing!

The routine also had steps like the Earl, the Eddie, and a variation of square dancing's "Grand Square" figure with high kicks at the corners and twirls in the center. But the thing I got the most out of Rodney's classes was the history of clogging and some of the roots of precision clogging.

Other than clogging I spent my time learning to cajun dance to the wonderful live music of Dewey Balfa and his band from Louisiana. At night there were great contras and squares, plus some swing dancing. Other clogging classes available were Rodney's beginning clogging, and Sharon Leahy's modern clogging choreography. Sharon is the leader of *Rhythm in Shoes*. She also taught an aerobics class that blended modern dance and clogging, if you can imagine that! *Rhythm in Shoes* is a professional dance company based in Ohio. They've almost finished producing a concert video featuring clogging, English step clogging, Longsword, tap and modern dance.

And I haven't even touched on the music classes that were available at Ashokan!

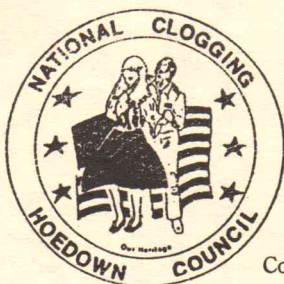

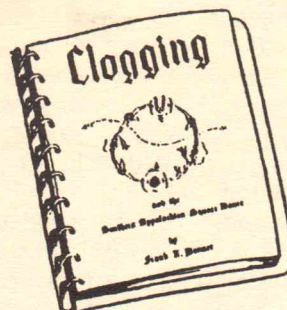

clogging, Big Circle Mountain Dancing, Contras, a pioneer section with songs of the western pioneer movement, Indian Dancing and an exciting hoedown. Our clogging numbers were very popular with the European audiences and they always wanted more. They were also taken with the smiles, enthusiasm and energy of our American dances and dancers.

Our most memorable shows during this festival were in the village of Cambo Les Bains and at the large Esplanade du Casino Municipal by the beach at Biarritz. Our show at Cambo was attended by many senior citizens of that

The performance at the Esplanade du Casino took place on a large stage in front of the Casino building just above the beach in Biarritz. The audience was seated in a large parking lot, on the terraces and along the streets above, making it possible for two or three thousand people to see each performance. We were scheduled to perform with the Mexican group. At the end of the show, the American dancers unwound the ball of yarn and snaked down into the audience to dance with the people before doing our final bow. This turned out to be a great experience. We danced with young folks, old folks, and in-between folks. The people loved it! Our final bow turned out to be two or three and

thusiasm. As our dancers left the stage, the crowd numbering in the thousands parted to let them through and clapped and cheered as they passed. We will always remember that night.

Needless to say, our departure from this ten-day festival (which also took us to San Sebastian, Spain for a performance) was sad. We had a wonderful experience in the Basque country. The friendships we made and the people we met will be remembered always. As our bus pulled out at 2 a.m., the Siberians waved until we were out of sight.

We arrived in Carcassonne, France about 9 a.m. the morning of July 15th. We felt as though we had stepped back in time 700 years. Here in front of us

area. We were told that they would be a hard audience to please because of their standard of excellence. With the challenge set, we proceeded to dance our hearts out for these people. After the show, we went out front to meet the audience. We were greeted by warm handshakes, smiles, thumbs up and many compliments. After being taken to the restored home and gardens of Edmund Rustand, the author of *Cyrano de Burguac*, the gracious people of Cambo fed us an unforgettable meal in the garden and entertained us with accordeon music and Basque folk songs.

then we were called back on-stage to repeat hoedown as the Israelis, Bulgarians and Siberians arrived from their performances elsewhere and demanded to see us dance again.

The next day the festival director told us that many of the townspeople were talking about the American dancers and asked if we could come back to the Casino stage after our scheduled show in St. Charles that night and do a couple of numbers again. We felt that was quite a compliment and of course agreed. As we arrived we were greeted with tremendous warmth and en-

thusiasm. As our dancers left the stage, the crowd numbering in the thousands parted to let them through and clapped and cheered as they passed. We will always remember that night.

We spent the day shopping and exploring and found out that evening, as we met our guide, that we were staying at a Youth Hostel inside the old city for two nights. What a treat!! We performed mini-shows in the new city and ate our meals at outdoor restaurants. Our main show was on a stage just in front of the castle within the old city and started at 11:30 p.m. Those Europeans

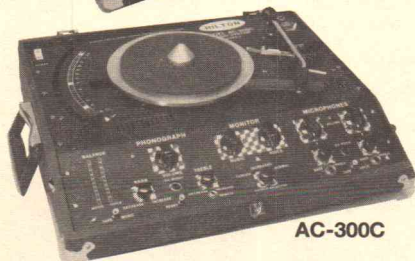

Square & Folk Dancing

The Folk Dance Picture

Despite the fact that the square dance has been designated by law as our national folk dance, it is generally considered to be a breed apart from other types of folk dance. The square dance has its own identity, as the only dance form performed by four couples in a square set, whose steps and formations are directed by a caller. Thus we are dealing with two separate dance forms; the square dance and the folk dance. Into the folk dance category fall all the other national dances. For the purposes of this book, I have limited discussion to those folk dances which can be performed in couple, circle or other group formation, and which may be either American or foreign in origin.

Some dance historians maintain that the United States has no indigenous folk dances except those of the American Indian. They claim that our folk dances are adaptations of those brought here by settlers from European countries. I don't hold with this view. There are steps and patterns which appear in folk dances the world over, and which provide a kind of common heritage. While American folk dances may be traced in part to those of other nations, they have developed their own distinctive characteristics and should therefore be considered and recognized as truly American.

In tracing the growth of the popularity of folk dances, we must start from the time these dances were brought here by the Pilgrims. Special events of all kinds were often celebrated by the dancing of English country dances on the village greens or in farmhouses. The more fancy minuets and gavottes were danced in the drawing rooms of high society. All of these dances gradually diminished in popularity from the early 1700s until the Revolution, but the general downtrend continued until about 1870. Throughout this period of about 150 years, on the other hand, contra dancing grew in favor at a steady pace.

In the 1870s the rural frontiers began to disappear and give way to urbanization and industrialization. New England's economic base gradually shifted from agriculture to manufacturing, and as rural areas disappeared the older traditional country dances were all but swept from the scene. The contra dances, however, continued to be danced, although with diminished popularity.

During this post-Civil War period, feuds in the Southern mountains created a deadly animosity between families, and in many cases between communities. This made cultural pursuits involving intercommunity group participation all but impossible. The church created still another obstacle to the growth of dancing: many Southerners espoused dundamentalist beliefs, which for the most part forbade any type of dancing. However, rough interpretations of the old English country dances were still danced by a handful of "sinners." Their music was played by a fiddler whose melodies were given such typical frontier names as "Cumberland Gap" and "Criples Creek."

Despite this marked attrition in New England and Southern mountain dancing by the end of the nineteenth century, the folk dance scene was quite different in the West after the discovery of gold. In the cities, the fashionable folk dances of Boston and New York were imitated; in the mountain mine areas, old country dances and cotillions flourished, a combination of which (as we discussed earlier) later became the Western square dance. But by 1900, with the dramatic decline in the rural population, country folk dances - which at one time had provided entertainment for every segment of society - had all but disappeared from the national scene.

Then folk dancing once again began to grow in popularity. In 1903 Dr. Luther Gulic, athletic director of the New York City schools, added folk dancing to the curriculum for boys and girls. His success did much to spread the dance movement to schools and colleges in other American cities. However, the movement did not catch on in adult communities, largely because it was not aimed at that age group.

During the next fifteen years, the folk dance movement gained added impetus through the efforts of three people: Louis Chalif, Elizabeth Burchenal and May Wood Hinman. Chalif, a Russian ballet dancer and choreographer, conducted numerous dance training courses for teachers at the Chalif Russian Normal School of Dancing, which he opened in 1907. In 1914 he wrote four folk dance textbooks which were recommended by the New York City Board of Education. While directing his school, Chalif also conducted numerous folk dance festivals. Burchenal, who organized the folk dance committee of the Playground and Recreation Association of America, fostered the development of folk dancing in playgrounds and schools throughout the country through her books, demonstrations and lectures. And Hinman, a teacher in Chicago, taught a wide variety of folk dances and used this experience to help organize many folk dance festivals throughout the country.

For the next twenty-five years or so, folk dances were taught, for the most part, in physical education departments in schools. They were also danced by groups of all ages in many rural areas where this significant folk art was an important part of the community's social life. In recent years, however, there has been a revival of folk dance participation in all sections of the country, including towns and large cities; dances once regulated to children are now being performed by adult groups on a regular basis in clubs that have been formed exclusively for that purpose.

The allure of folk dancing grows constantly more seductive, proving that it has a durability in marked contrast to the ephemeral quality of dances like the twist and the hustle. Folk dances, after all, reflect the personality and temper of a people - which is a great part of their lasting appeal.

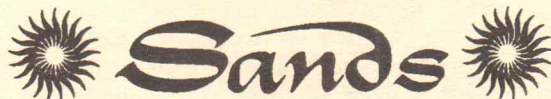

really enjoy staying up late! As we returned to the Hostel, we were greeted by cheers from young Europeans who were also staying at the Hostel and who had enjoyed the show.

We said good-bye to Carcassonne the morning of the 17th, but we didn't leave empty-handed. Among our souvenirs of this historic city were swords, cross-bows, maces and other weapons of war along with books, postcards and shirts. Later that morning we arrived in La Grande Motte on the French Riviera. The city of La Grande Motte is filled with modern hotels and marinas for all the boats there. It was very different than what we had experienced up to this time.

Many countries were represented at the Festival Mondial De Folklore including France, Martinique, Columbia, Switzerland, Italy, Kenya, Czechoslovakia, Soviet Georgia, Azerbaijan, Israel, Jordan, Poland and the USA. The opening ceremony that night was memorable. After a large parade, each country danced only two minutes while their flag was presented and taken to the top of the stadium. After all the groups had danced, the dancers returned to the main area intermixed and holding hands. There, surrounded by new friends from many countries, we heard words of peace translated in many different languages and watched a spectacular fireworks display.

We were housed in college dorms at

Montpellier about 30 miles away from La Grande Motte. Our main show was in Theatre de Verdure, a large outdoor theatre. We performed with the exciting Israeli dance troupe and the spectacular dancers from Soviet Georgia. Performing on the same stage with such professional dancers is an honor in and of itself. The audience again loved the intricate and energetic clogging of the Americans and cheered at the final bow after hoedown.

During our last night at the festival, we traveled to a small town to perform before another large audience with the Italians and the Georgians. As we closed the show, the audience wouldn't let us off the stage without performing *O Susannah* during which many people from the audience joined us on stage. It was another fun opportunity to share a part of our culture with the people of France.

As we returned to Paris, we carried the memories of people from around the world and the special friendships and bonds that were formed. It's truly wonderful when you realize that the world of dance knows no language barriers and can bring people from many different cultures together in harmony, love and peace.

After returning home, we received a special letter of commendation from the festival in Biarritz. Directors Jean Nesprias and Gerard Cuesta wrote, "Following your participation in the twentieth Festival International De Folklore Du Pays Basque, we sincerely wish to thank you and congratulate you.

We congratulate you for the quality of your presentation and the energy that you demonstrate. You represent with honor your country and your culture."

We were very proud to represent the United States of America at these World Folk Festivals and share with the people of Europe some of our dance traditions and culture. Clogging is extremely popular not only here at home, but all over the world.

famous Tivoli Guard, and 29 restaurants. 110,000 lamps light the grounds in the evening. No wonder Walt Disney found inspiration for Disney Land here.

We had a great time performing on the main stage at **LEGOLAND** which has won international acclaim as one of the most exciting and unique vacation spots in Europe. Famous people, places, and things are recreated through the use of **LEGO** blocks - 33 million of them. There's a 45 foot tall Chief Sitting Bull and Mt. Rushmore made of 1,500,000 **LEGOs**. In addition to Miniland and indoor exhibitions, rides and amusements abound. There's also a "Wild West" town, a driving traffic school for kids, antique doll and toy collection and the fairytale Titania's Palace.

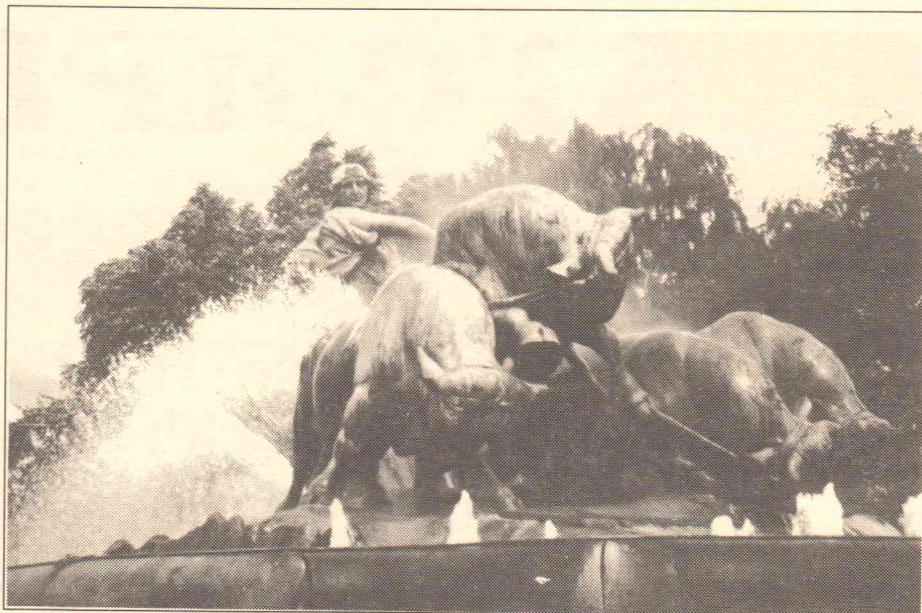
After our show at one of the schools, it was fun watching our youngest clog-

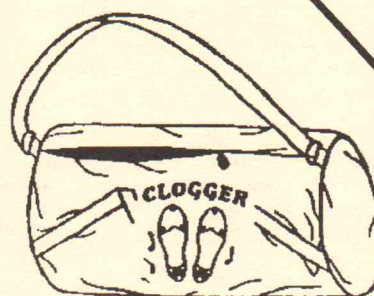
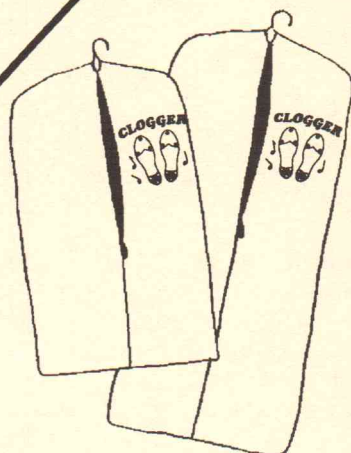
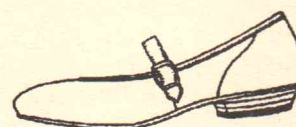

Dangerous Dan Squirrel Extrodinaire

Many of you have inquired about my raccoons. They are GONE! The construction in the back woods probably only flushed them to my yard temporarily.

I was startled to learn that there are no squirrels in Australia. There are probably several different kinds of them here in Florida - I've seen the very shy fox squirrels out in the country and of course the common gray squirrel and all of his forty-seven cousins in my back yard.

Seven or eight years ago, after watching these clever bushy-tailed acrobats calculate "leap and destroy" campaigns on my wild bird feeders, we finally out-manuevered them. A squirrels nest is a peculiar looking affair - like a big clump of dead leaves caught high in a crotch of branches. Makes you think that a good wind would blow it away, but, in fact, it is reused year after year.

After loading up the squirrel feeder, I was back in the Office at my desk, when I noticed Dan. He circled the feeder, went half-way up the post a dozen times, and finally made it to the top. He immediately spread-eagled himself on top of the pile of bread and squalled noisily at any blue jay or squirrel who dared try for a crumb. He was so busy defending his hoard that he couldn't eat. This went on for several hours and finally a pair of kamikaze jays knocked him clean off the feeder along with enough bread cubes to keep him busy for a while.

My daughter Katie was the first to notice Dan one morning, paw over paw over paw over paw *walking the wire toward the bird feeder!* He wibbled and wobbled but finally made it. He then hung upside down, back feet holding firmly on the wire while his front paws opened the top lid and his whole front half went into the seed storage. We could see him clearly through the plastic sides of the feeder, happily chomping away. When he'd had enough, he walked the wire back to the tree, and was soon out of sight in the treetops.

This past Sunday morning, I was here alone at my desk when I heard a commotion on the back deck. I glanced up and there was Dan hanging on the window screen not two feet from my face. We studied each other for a while, and as I picked up my cup for a sip of coffee, he repositioned as if to see what I was eating. He hung there for quite a while and then casually moved to the bench next to the window and laid down for a nap.

My guess is that *Dan the Squirrel* is being hand fed by a neighbor. If not, he was born fearless, and knows where his next loaf of bread is coming from!
