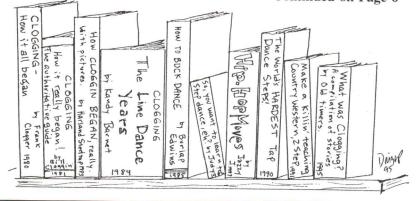
What Does It Take To Become A Nationwide Instructor?

As promised in *Front & Center*, Bobbie Adams has recruited a collection of instructors to give their insights into what it takes to become a "National" instructor. My goal was always just to be a well-liked person. I need the reinforcement. If the "National Instructor" part follows...gravy!

So, how does a local instructor find the need for road atlas and a Franklin planner? I think for me it was partially a matter of luck and timing. As a greenhorn dancer attending my first workshop at Fontana Village in 1982, I ambled up to the microphone at an open step teach like I knew what I was doing, and in my nervousness found that by making people laugh I could compensate for what I lacked as a teacher. The promoters booked me for the staff the following year. To this day, I've had people come up to me at workshops and say "Even if I don't like the song you're teaching to, I come to see what crazy thing you're going to do." Maybe I'm disqualifying myself from a serious discussion of this topic, but I do realize that - for me - what I do on stage is as much entertainment as it is instruction. Sure, I've come a long way in learning to break down steps and choreograph, but I've got a gimmick. I know it and I use it. Sometimes it works, sometimes it doesn't, and I sure wouldn't encourage anyone to try to copy that style. For every encore, there's been a flop. But no matter how you market yourself - how funny or cute or charming you think you are — you've still got to produce something that people want to dance. Maybe it's here that I can give some serious advice to you.

Origins of Appalachian Tradition

I envy the heritage of all those folks along the eastern mountains. They have ancestors who lived among them for hundreds of years without changing the way they lived. Some might look upon it as a lifetime of going nowhere. But there are other factors about that kind of lifestyle that reveal a profound sense of security and honor. It's a fascinating process to investigate the cultural idiosyncracies that bound the people together along the Blue Ridge. I thought I'd share some of it here, but you'll have to bear with me on this. It may get a little tedious!

The earliest documented exploration of the Appalachian region occurred in 1673, when Englishmen John Needham and Gabriel Arthur ventured south from Virginia to Hickory Nut Gap to establish trade with the Cherokee. England's subsequent attempt to half further western settlement with the Proclamation of 1763 failed to slow the advance of colonials, who already resented British interference. John C. Campbell described the "Great Road," which followed a trail from Philadelphia west to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, then southwest into Virginia and down "through the Blue Ridge," routing settlers into the mountains. English emigrant registers reveal that a large number of Scots-Irish emigrated between 1773-1776. Michael Montgomery pointed out that as many as 300,000 immigrants from Ireland arrived in America during the six decades preceding the Revolution. He identified Scots-Irish pioneers as one of the earliest and largest groups to move into the Appalachian backcountry.

The ethnicity of the Scots-Irish is a blend of the northern Irish, lowland Scot and North Briton migrants who merged along the border areas of northern England. Mostly tenant farmers, they displayed a mix of "poverty and pride," according to David Fischer, which set them apart from "other English-speaking people in the American colonies." A strong clannish background characterized the northern border immigrants, who formed intimate social groups among cousins, aunts and uncles, and banded together for common defense. This kinship structure served the people well in the secluded mountain regions of North America. Traditional responsibilities developed from the obligation to help one's kinfolk, the closeness of living in the same community, and the economic benefit of sharing the work collectively. Group chores like barn-raisings, hayings, corn-shuckings, bean-stringings and applepeelings, often preceded a community square dance. One scholar felt that the music bound the community together in the same way that joint labors created interdependence. Continued on page 8

Work hard. Look around at the styles around you and at other dance forms to find that move or step that can make a routine memorable — a hook. Work harder than you thought you were able to make your students feel like you have real interest in their success. The new up-n-comin' instructors I've seen who are doing well are not the ones who win all the competitions, but the ones who take the time to make people feel special. Public relations is paramount to your success. The days of a national workshop promoter seeking you out are over. You have to have the initiative to promote yourself. Be seen, be social and be sure to let promoters know you're out there in a way that lets them feel like they can be a part of your success. Promoters have egos too. Send out some cuesheets to workshop promoters and seriously ask for their opinion. Don't be obnoxious, but be a presence. I know it sounds old-fashioned or corny to say "work hard" and "be persistent," but the truth is that being a national instructor is not glamorous. It won't make you a star. You have to put the time into your choreography, your presentation and your commitment to those who come to see you. The dancing has to come first. I always am just a little apprehensive when people ask me to sing at a workshop. I don't think it's everybody's cup of tea, and I sure don't want to give people the impression that I want their approval of my mediocre singing. Don't get caught up in the frills of public attention to overly promote some other interest. Make your routines be the gauge of your success as an instructor. Is your material being danced? You've got to take it seriously — not just flit around with your entourage, dropping names of exotic places and the celebrities you've met. Sure, I'd be kidding you if I didn't say I enjoyed the attention that goes along with being a guest instructor. I think we all consciously seek that. Besides, who wouldn't mind having their name on the flyer, getting your airfare and room paid for, and making a little money to boot. Just remember, hype will only go so far. You can have the biggest build-up in the world and go nowhere fast if you don't deliver the goods on that stage.

A good teacher puts the interests of the students first and their own second. There's not a point I've made here that I couldn't share with you a personal experience of regret. Most of the mistakes I've made as a teacher were because I was so busy worrying about the politics of becoming, being and staying a 'national instructor' that I forgot what an instructor was supposed to do—teach good clogging. Concentrate on making your routines fun and danceable. Now make them accessible. If you have talent and personality (or connections) the rest can happen. I promise you.

START SMALL — THINK BIG

Josh King [Tennessee], Jeff Driggs [West Virginia], and Marge Callahan [Florida], all nationally-known instructors, have agreed to share some thoughts about how clogging instructors can become more widely travelled.

Speaking as a former workshop/convention organizer; 1) one of the best ways to find new talent is to attend all the small workshops in your area. Watch the dancers. They will fill the hall to overflowing if the instructor on stage has charisma, exciting choreography and good teaching techniques. They will literally walk out of the hall if an instructor has none of the above, leaving only the instructor's own dancers who, for the most part, already know the material.

- 2) Watch the "good" instructor after they leave the stage. Does he/she "smooze" with the dancers? Does he/she honor the next instructor's stage time? Does he/she help a dancer (quietly, out in the hallways) who had a problem with a step or step sequence? Or does the instructor leave the stage, talk only to his/her clique (perhaps loudly interferring with the next "teach"), or just leave the building completely, having no interest in either the dancers or other instructors?
- 3) Do not make the mistake of inviting an instructor to teach at a workshop on the basis that they will bring their entire club along. There are many, many dancers who only clog one night a week and simply will not do demos, performances or workshops.
- 4) There is a huge difference in teaching on home turf with the ability to teach in a two-hour time slot over several weeks

that which an instructor must convey to dancers unfamiliar with his/her voice and terminology in a 45-minute time slot. Time's up! Boom! Dance it!

5) Finally, some personal criteria of my own. Is the instructor "clean in thought, word and deed," especially on stage. Our halls are filled with impressionable children who idolize some of the instructors. Is their material the kind that could be repeated in school or church? Does the instructor "Dress for Success?" i.e., conform to local costuming? Wear clean clothes? Use deodorant? Use mouthwash?

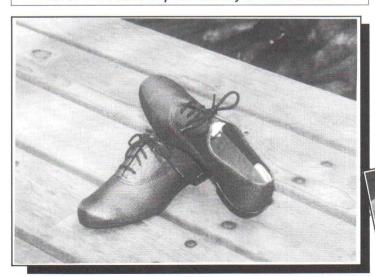

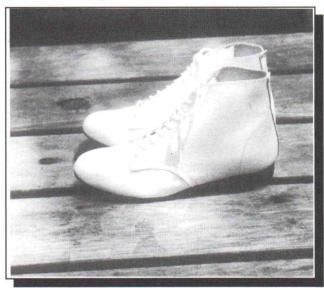

Origins of Appalachian Tradition Continued from page 1

The clan network governed a loosely-knit society and assured certain rights to every family member, including the right to own land. According to Fischer, a heritage that comprised rented lands and high taxes caused the Scots-Irish to be fiercely protective of their property. Harvest failures, the potato famine, and the growing sheep industry in England and Scotland, which claimed hundreds of acres of land for grazing, ultimately drove these emigrants from their homeland. The free land found in America became a permanent legacy for their descendants. The desire for land ownership thus became a significant factor in fostering the Scots-Irish determination to farm in the rugged wilderness. Indeed, centuries of solitary living in subsistence conditions formed a profound attachment to the land. Appalachians' reverence for their land lent certainty to their lives. Thus, "place" became an important aspect of their traditions.

While land gave the mountaineer his independence, isolation helped to insure his freedom from outside intrusions. In the back-country of Appalachia, these concerns translated to staunch resistance to change and a suspicion of strangers. Secluded family units had limited contact with the outside world and, consequently, little access to differing opinions. Thus, the mountaineer retained rigid views about the old ways.

Isolation influenced Appalachians in other ways as well. Loyal Jones believed the pursuit of independence in the secluded mountains was a withdrawal from the constraints of urban society. Since the earliest American settlements, the wilderness symbolized an escape from persecution. For example, Puritans viewed their colony as a "sanctuary"; isolation in America merely enhanced this idea. Hardships were considered necessary for achieving salvation. Horace Kephart recognized a "violent independence that made the Appalachian mountaineer forsake all the comforts of civilization." The seclusion created a free, self-reliant individual, beholden to no man but his own kin, and deeply loyal to family. Indeed, researchers argue that the intensity of isolation empowered Appalachians to resist outside pressures to modify their culture. They sought a simple way of life, unencumbered by government or industry. During the three decades including and after the Civil War, Appalachians moved deeper into their protected hollows, suggesting it was more a matter of choice than circumstance. Harsh living conditions did not improve, but were accepted as one's fate. Of necessity, mountaineers developed a sense of humor and love of music and dance that sustained them through difficult times.

A similar process of transferral occurred with America's square dance. It is unique because of the cultural ancestry that shaped it during the periods of isolation in Appalachia and throughout its journey across the continent. An oral tradition, in which calls and figures are passed down from father to son, generation to generation, helped preserve that heritage. Extreme isolation created an atmosphere in which the dance was repeated over and over. It enabled many facets of the dance to survive unchanged, to remain strong enough to flow over the trails west.

In 1917, Cecil Sharp conducted an investigation of folk songs and dances in Appalachia. He claimed Appalachian folk heritage "came from a part of England where the civilization was least developed—probably the north of England, or the border country between Scotland and England." He identified the Appalachian Running Set as a descendant of the May-pole Round, an ancient pagan ceremonial, and pointed to several figures related to early pagan ceremonials. "The Old Shuck Basket" or "Weave the Basket" is similar to a singing game called "Draw a Pail of Water," associated with rituals of well worship. "Birdie in the Cage" involves dancers circling around one person. Sharp interpreted this figure to be descended from the practice of dancing around a sacred bush in a prayer for fertility, i.e., a good harvest.

Consistent with the use of dances in religious worship, the Morris Dance emerged in England as a ceremonial exhibition performed exclusively by men. During years when a difficult winter followed a poor harvest, the Morris men were called upon to revive the season of spring with the drumming of their feet. As a result of the importance of the Morris men to ritual dance, a great number of figures survived.

For centuries, the English country dance sustained the Morris dance patterns in several formations — circle, longways (contra) and square. Sharp noted that the uniqueness of the country dance lay in the interaction between two or more couples. He considered it a "democratic dance," where couples "change positions in the set and take turns leading the figures." During the long period in England before monarchs ruled, such a dance culture thrived.

When the first of the Stuart kings came to power in the 17th century, it began to change. The country dance became popular at court during the reign of James I, where the longways set was predominant. Participants in the lines were arranged in hierarchial order from the head of the formation. French observers brought it across the channel in the 18th century and it evolved in France as a "contredanse francaise," or "contra dance." The varieties of the contra included a version of the English square, known as a "quadrille." It utilized only five figures that were executed from memory in a pre-arranged pattern. Despite the limitations of the French adaptation, it gained popularity in America during the War of 1812. Newly-liberated Americans considered it patriotic to practice French rather than English dances. French influence is apparent today in Anglicized commands of the dance, such as "Promenade," "Balance," "Chassee" (pronounced "sashay") and "Allemande."

The original country dance, however, escaped the rule of kings and courtly English society with the first immigrants to the mountain regions of the New World. Sharp's identification of the Appalachian Running Set referred to a series of dance figures bound together by promenade movements. They were danced with considerable speed, with each participant's body "inclined in the direction of the motion, as in skating." According to David Whisnant, Sharp probably misunderstood regional terminoloy in naming the dance a "Running Set." He pointed out that locals considered "running sets" an activity, much like "playing ball."

Similarly, the square dance tradition in Appalachia involved a circle formation. Though sometimes limited by the number of dancers or size of the room in which it was danced, it was always a progressive dance with movement around the circle, from one couple to the next. Sharp observed groups of dancers running in smaller sets; hence, he documented square sets with only four couples participating. Margot Mayo contended that the figures themselves did not change much from community to community. It was the ''manner in which they were danced and the tempo of the music [that] constitute the chief differences.''

Twentieth-century society is a transient one in which technologically-advanced travel and communication fill people with hopes for better opportunities. Many have lost their special relationship with place, and without that connection, much of what provides them an identity is also lost. James Michener once referred to "home" as "the sum of all understandings, experiences, emotions and loyalties" one has been "allowed to accumulate." The Appalachian heritage, carefully nurtured in the 18th and 19th centuries, exemplifies profound cultural ties to home. Two hundred years of obscurity guarded many of its people's traditions. Fortunate for us, the square dance survived as a representation of the continuity of that heritage.

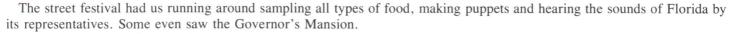

ing their short skirts. (They didn't win!) The boys for the first time were glad they had to wear jeans.

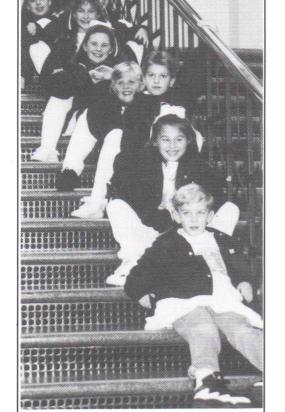

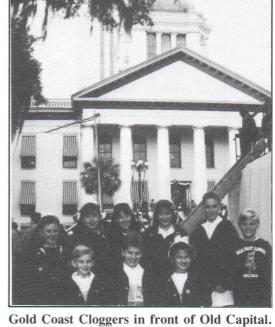

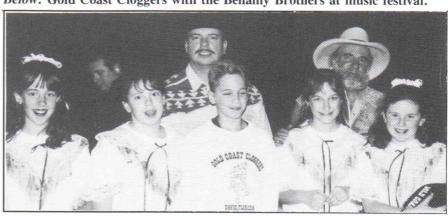
On Left: After hours of standing in the cold, City Hall was warm and the stairs made a great place to sit. What a line-up!

Partnering Techniques to Make Your Appalachian Figures Look and Feel Better By: Dibbie Dunnam, Musical Director, Hogtown Heelers, Route 1, Box 244, Micanopy, Florida 32667 (904) 466-3538

When we teach beginners, it is of paramount importance that we set up for them digestible bite size elementary skills and drills. In line clogging, we take 1-count steps and 2-count combinations and over time we turn them into 4-count and 8-count combinations.

In figure clogging, if you work with a dead-bang 4-count phrase, everybody, including your novice caller, will be listening for that first count in four, the downbeat. If you build 4-count "think pads" into the figures, you give brains a chance to catch up with feet. You build a 4-count infrastructure [infra: a prefix meaning under or beneath] on which everybody depends, a sense of timing evolves, and confidence builds.

To paraphrase a memorable line from Nancy Biehler's "A Frontier Christmas" article (Ref.: Double Toes Times, December 1994): The caller becomes the conductor of a living symphony of movement, a weaver of patterns. A novice caller does not start at the symphony level. He/She starts at the "Chop Sticks" level.

When you get slick enough in your calling skills and your dancers have a repertoire of several simple figures in which they feel confident, you can begin to drop the utility aspects of your calls and slip your refined calls into elegantly placed 2-count phrases. You can eliminate the figure padding, trim the fat, and those elegant, energetic, and precise figures will rise to the surface like cream on Grade A milk.

But that is not where we are at! Pop the bubble, come back down to earth, roll up your sleeves and tie double knots in your shoe laces.

Even at national workshops where the skilled and the semi-skilled meet to upgrade their knowledge and abilities, the caller/instructor will set up the dancers with "directionals". He/She will walk the dancers through the figures before he/she calls the figure by name, and before his/her vocals become an integral part of the dancing rhythm known as "patter."

What are some of the "teach tools" that shuck the corn so that we deal with the individual kernels on the local level?

- 1) Teaching and calling partnering units as recognizable 4-count dance units;
- 2) Dictating the simple step patterns over which you impose the upper body partnering moves;
 - 3) Padding figures so brains can catch up with feet.
 - OK! Preamble is over. Time to get down to business.

Vocalizing a 4-count timeline should sound something like this:

Two 4-count dance units can hitch themselves together to become one 8-count unit, two 8-count units into one 16-count unit. In line clogging, the "put the pieces-parts" together principle is used all the time.

Four "kicky-steps" [or however you encourage your beginners into double toe steps] become 4 double steps which become a triple basic which becomes 2 single basics which become a fancy double.

Because we are successful instructors, we weekly resist the internal drive to enhance our own dance skills or to show off what we can do. We resist skill level boredom and the temptation to buck every rock step. We teach and dance "plain vanilla".

The "plain vanilla" fascination of successful instructing is in addressing individual dancers at their skill and apprehension levels, and piecing together a group of individual dancers so that they become a single cohesive operating unit. "I can't do that!" or "I don't want to do that!" flops over and become "Hey! Yeah! I can handle that!". We develop skills for controlling the dance floor.

The art of calling a line dance is one of those skills.

It is interesting to observe that the "rise and shine" portion of the traditional partnered dances has evolved into a recognizable line dancing form. It is equally interesting to observe that as many of the 4-count, and 8-count combinations have become named, the ability to "call" the combinations is a valued teaching and recreational skill. Sequence is always a problem regardless of how skillful your feet become. We are

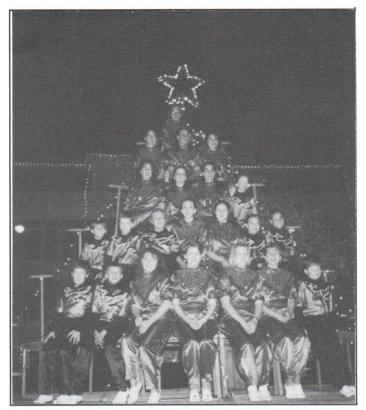
Here a Clogger... There a Clogger...

rupted television programs to watch new steps over and over and over, the burned dinners forgotten in the excitement of finally getting that new routine down).

She also warned that it was not over. Even though the workshop was finished, the cloggers were not. "They will,"

she warned, "be doing basics, triples, shuffles, and stomps in elevators, in airports, in Wal-Mart, behind a shopping cart in Brookshires and even in the halls of school. And let us pray that the church pianist never breaks into a rousing rendition of "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder" because *they'll be there.*"

With a final warning that few were immune to the clogging bug's bite and that even those who had complained the most about the new cloggers zeal could suddenly, without a moment's



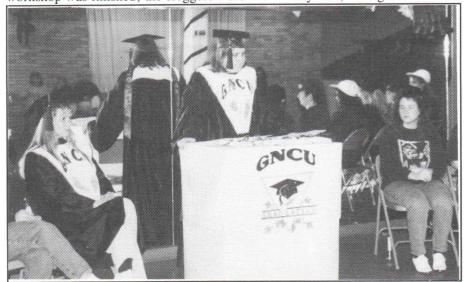

warning break into "Rocky Top," she turned the program over to Doctor Maus.

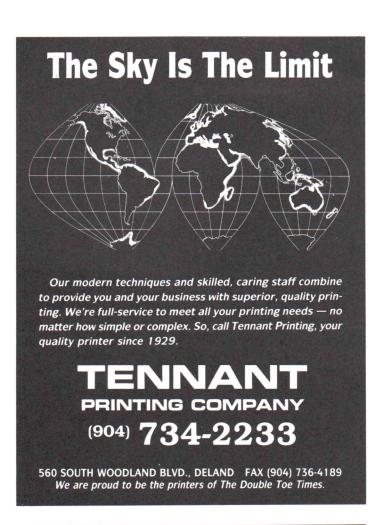
Doctor Maus, with much handshaking and heartfelt congratulations, bestowed the Bachelor of Clogging Degree on each graduate as she handed them their diploma.

constantly reinventing ourselves and "What goes around, comes around."

The really skillful callers are the ones who call the next combination in the 4-count phrase preceding the 4-count dance unit

Here's the bait and the hook!

If we have this skill in line clogging, we can build this skill in figure clogging. To make figure clogging work for our groups, we must be able to:

- 1) Identify and teach simple 4-count partnering combinations which will later be pieced together into 8-count, 16-count, 24- and 32-count figures.
- 2) Identify and teach upper body partnering skills that make partnering a fascinating and non threatening dance activity, regardless of gender (All Position Dancers, known as APD's).
 - 3) Be able to control the floor.

Note aside: One of the criteria on a competition score sheet is "ability of the caller to control the floor".

But that is not where we are at! How does a novice caller take control and maintain control of the floor on his own home ground with people who go glassy eyed when he/she says "Partner up"?

The handiest "utility call" for controlling a mess of beginners is:

Mark Time, 3,4.

A "utility call" is a teaching tool at the most functional level.

Recall that the emphasis of this series is not on the "already do's". This series focuses on the "wannado's", groups with four to twenty dancers, female dancers most likely in the majority, not located in the heartland of figure clogging, with needs to homogenize their double/double hot shots with their beginning and intermediate dancers.

This can be done on a recognizable 4-count infrastructure. It can be learned and passed on.

The question that "wannado's" need to ask themselves is: "How do I control the floor while I figure out what to do next?". Mark time,3,4 is a good enough solution to the problem until you figure out something that works better for you and your group.

Regardless of how well you prepare your partnering units for 4-count calls and 4-count dance units, when you stick them in that circle for the first time, time and space continuums are going to go fuzzy and somebody is going to lag behind or end up facing the wrong direction. Mark Time,3,4 is your call to hold position, keep dancing until the next call and should be used frequently.

A bevy of beginners is like a flock of ducklings having just quit the nest and is bravely swimming behind the big duck across the pond for the very first time. To keep the flock focused on the problem at hand, the big duck has to quack frequently or the ducklings loose track of the problem at hand, get disoriented, become lost and quit swimming.

Even if the big duck is a little shaky about where he/she is taking the flock, he/she must be brave and appear to know where he/she is going.

Here is a fifteen minute lesson plan for a beginner's partnering drill using pull-by/follow-up utility calls and single basics, all partnering units facing front.

Set up instructions: Leads (left foot) and Tags (right foot) face to face. Shake right hands or right hands across. Do not drop hands.				
Caller <4-count phrase>	Dancers <4-count phrase>			
Call: Mark Time, 3,4 [sets tempo and cranks the engine.	Marking basics.

Run this drill three or four times until the partnering units are keying their follow-up positions relative to the person with whom they are dancing.

Working to the left: Now put your dancers in that scary circle. Tell everybody to take just a minute to decide which is their left hand. Tell leads to turn 1/4 left and tags to turn 1/4 right and shake left hands with their corner. Now run the same drill on the left with corners. The admonishment is still: "Do not drop hands".

Set up instructions: You are now facing your partner. You are going to execute a 4-count right pull-by, back to back, with your partner and a 4-count left pull-by, back to back, with the next person down the line. Do not drop hands with the person behind you until you have taken the hand of the next person down the line. After second pull-by: "Add 2 stomp doubles, please."

If you are getting brave, you just overlaid your last call on top of the second stomp double. If you didn't, you'd better be prepared to "bark a quick quack" before you lose track of your flock.

This fifteen minute lesson plan establishes a call and count protocol between your novice caller and your novice dancers. It is not written in stone. Modify or embellish it as you choose.

When the next national or regional Appalachian workshop becomes available in your area and your group says: "Let's do it!", now that's a job well done.

Lest We Forget

Mountain men and mountain music. You can't separate the two. They go together like sourwood honey and cat head biscuits.

That goes for good clogging and good music. They go hand-in-hand. Any old square dancer will tell you right up front that whenever they hear a good fiddle tune being played the way it is supposed to be played they can't keep their feet still. Heroes we like to yarn about really lived. Mountain born and raised.

Take the late Les Waldroop, who was just one song away from greatness when the Great Architect of the Universe called him home. Fired by a dream, Les spent his entire life playing and writing country music. His words spoke of a life of serenity and love for his beloved Nantahala Mountains. The legendary Loretta Lynn recorded one of his songs. When the World's Fair came to Knoxville, Tennessee, Les was asked to write a song for the celebration. He accomplished it in just one day and released a few weeks prior to the opening ceremony in Knoxville.

Back in fifty-one Les began his own band using his kinfolks. There was Lloyd Waldroop, Wendle Waldroop and "Fiddling" Mickey Waldroop. They played for the high school assembly programs and on any given Saturday night you'd find them "making music" wherever there was a square dance being held. Les playing the steel guitar, Mickey on fiddle, Wendle on base and Lloyd on guitar. The sets would last about fifteen minutes and while the dancers were outside catching their breath the Waldroops would do what they did best, pick and sing the music of their mountains.



LES WALDROOP

Les was a giant of a man. He could go bear hunting with a hickory switch. His massive arms showed signs of a man used to hard work. The callused hands of this music man were as gentle as a summer breeze. His heart was overflowing with love for his fellow man. In the fifty-some years of knowing Les Waldroop I never heard one person say anything bad about this gentle giant.

His red suspenders were his trademark. They added a sort of flair to stage appearance. When Les was on the stage he was in charge. Here was a man that knew what to do with a song. His music was pure and written in a way to glorify what he was singing about.

Les opened the "Musical Mill" at the bottom of the town hill. On Friday and Saturday nights, folks would come to listen to the mountain balladier as he sang his songs. These same folks would take to the floor when the band would play Arkansas Traveler, Back Up and Push, or Steel Guitar Rag. During the summer months the "Mill" would be packed with "Summer Folks" who would just drop by to take in the local flavor as the Waldroop Boys went about making music the ole fashioned way.

Les is gone now, but his music will live forever. Come sundown, when folks gather at "Pickin On The Square" the locals speak freely of Les and his music. If you listen closely you may hear the steel guitar in the background playing a medley of songs Les wrote. Of all his accomplishments I think that Les would be most proud of the fact that those who knew him as a brother, friend and neighbor, felt that he lived proudly, with honor, dignity and respect from each of us.

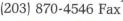

"I have seen some major differences," Adams said. Dancing has lowered blood pressure and cholesterol and helped those with diabetic and arthritic conditions. "It also promotes fellowship and friendship and fills a gap for women who love to dance, but have no partner," she noted.

Gahanna resident Marilyn Sindel claims clogging is a stress outlet. "The steps are so fast and furious, you can't think of anything else," she said. "After watching a performance, my son laughingly said, 'I can't believe you people retire — to work so hard!"

For years, Rita Speakman of Columbus, watched her kids participate in activities and sporting events. "Now the role is reversed," she said. "My children and grandkids watch me perform. They think it's great! And that makes me feel good. It gives me self-confidence."

Columbus resident Michael Figliola lost 12 pounds by clogging. "I like exercising, and I also enjoy the fantastic friendships I've made!" he explained.

Bertie Allen of Gahanna doesn't have anybody to dance with. So she clogs. "I have bad feet," she said. "But that doesn't stop me. I take two Advil. And when the music starts, I forget my aches and pains."

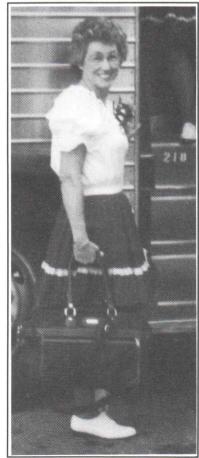
Like her students, Instructor/Director Adams benefits from clogging. "In addition to keeping fit, I get a deep sense of satisfaction from performing," she said. "Especially in nursing homes. They are very receptive to our performances. In fact, one woman asked us to return on her

birthday. We returned and gave her the greatest gift we could give — ourselves."

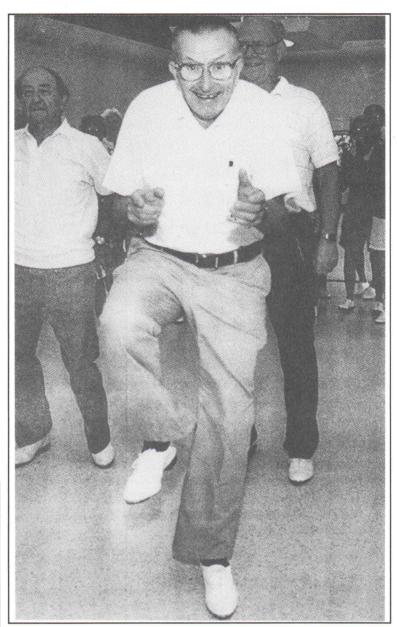
Adams teaches 102 seniors whose ages range from 56-82. She has room for more. "The requirements are minimal," she said. "A good attitude, and ability to pay attention, a willingness to learn, share your knowledge with others, and have fun. That's all I ask of my students."

Adams never stops. If she's not clogging or teaching, she's making plans. Big plans. If you think the Disney World appearance couldn't be topped. Think again.

D.C. "We want to Lee Adams is instructor/director show the lawmakers of the Clog-4-U team.

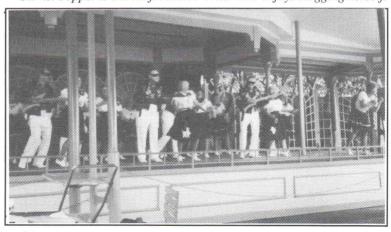


Ken Strickler, 75, of Grove City, Ohio, hams it up while practicing with the Clog-4-U group at McDowell Senior Center.

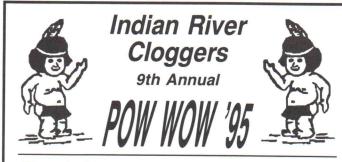

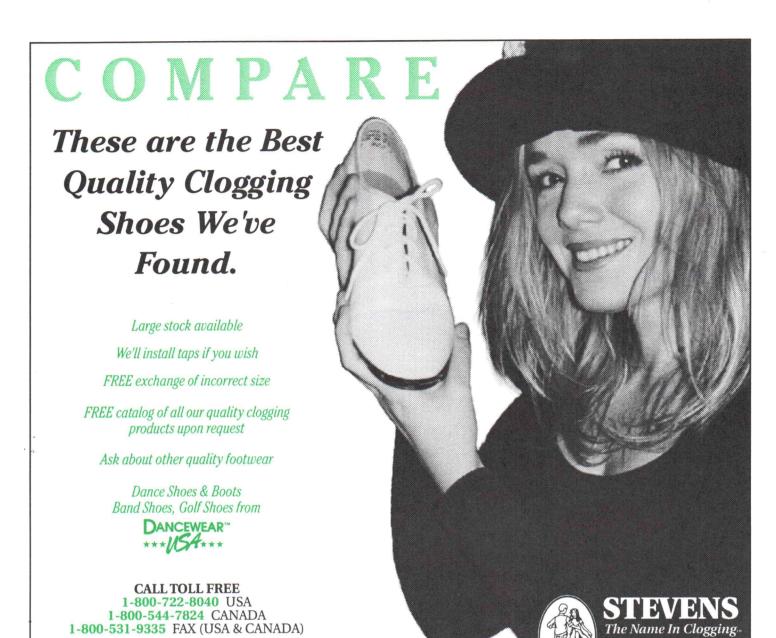
