FONTANA CLOGGING JAMBOREE

The Birthplace of Modern Clogging Hosts One of Clogging's Favorite Workshops

The uniqueness of the Fontana Jamboree becomes apparent far before your arrival. The route that many take to the village is also one of a kind. The legendary "Tail of the Dragon is a narrow road with 318 sharp curves in an eleven mile stretch. The tales told of trying to master driving on this road were highly entertaining. Like the Fontana Jamboree, this road leaves a lasting impression. The village is nestled in the Smoky Mountains at an elevation of 1,821 feet. There are no traffic lights, t-shirt stands, or golden arches. Here, the mountain does not have to compete to be seen. The lodge lobby provides a comfortable congregating area, with a noteworthy stone fireplace, and a bank of windows overlooking the mountain. Others prefer to stay in one of the cozy cabins that are scattered throughout the village. The linens, cookware, and porch rocking chairs are supplied. These cabins are great for dinner gatherings, and late night campfires. Nearby, Fontana Lake is over 400 feet deep, and has 238 miles of shoreline. Boat rentals are available as well as guided tours. Undoubtedly, this is one of the most tranquil places you will ever visit. The scenery is absolutely breathtaking! No cell phone service

adds to the peacefulness of the area. A whole weekend without facebook, or text messaging!

A magnificent wooden floor in the recreation hall lures people in from the great outdoors. Words can not describe dancing on this floor, nor how the taps sound. Another oddity of this workshop are the attendees. The die hard Jamboree fans come every year. Then there are groups coming for their first time, most of them traveling great distances for the experience. The number of youths attending is also growing. The Jamboree is a great melting pot of cloggers!

Naomi's army of volunteers cheerfully handle registration, event t-shirts, and an array of cloggers needs. The workshop began Friday afternoon with one opened hall. One open hall is a bit unusual, but it was easy to spot your friends and make new ones, a great way to kick start the weekend! This afternoon four intermediate routines were presented. The fun dance Friday was excellent, tons of energy spent dragging and sliding across the grand wooden floor. Following the fun dance, was a cloggers social. I will try to set the stage...warm summer evening, large outdoor deck filled with clogging friends and new acquaintances, food and beverages available,



a black star filled sky, and live Bluegrass Music performed by the fabulous Grass Stains Band from West Virginia. It just does not get any better!

Saturday three halls were opened. A mixed assortment of classes, and levels were offered. All of the instructors present at Fontana Jamboree have taught at other workshops. However, it is different at Fontana, the pace is a slower and relaxed, giving the instructors more time to socialize with the attendees. His music selections, choreography and humor are definitely unique. The one and only Jeff Driggs once again rocked the house with his routines to Crave, Drivin' Nails, and Honey I'm Good. Our beloved, Naomi Pyle whose heart and skills have no boundaries, showed off her talent with It Feels Good, and Up Town Funk. Naomi and Barry Welch also offered a Swing Dance Class. Speaking of unusual Mr. Barry Welch. He lit up the dance floor with his routines to Fireball, and Burnin' Up. Chip Summey, with his contagious smile, once again presented new methods to achieve a pull back. His two country routines Steal Me Away and Your Side Of Town were awesome! It was super to have Matt Sexton back at Fontana, he is one very talented dancer. He showed off his talents with routines to Your Smile. Young and Crazy, and Locked Away. The fast and furious Scotty Bilz offered two advanced routines, You Sound so Good to Me, and Mr. Almost. Does this man in orange ever run out of energy? Hats off to Melissa and Rob Pack! The patience they demonstrated while teaching a hoedown for the evenings demo in just 45 minutes was unreal. Two large circles of dancers repeatedly asking... how do we do that? which way do we turn? should I be on the outside or the inside? Where is the bathroom? You get the picture total mayhem! But, Melissa and Rob are very special and somehow they pulled it together. Thank you all for making the Fontana Jamboree so special and fun!

Saturday evenings activities began with an hour of live bluegrass music courtesy of the Grass Stains Band. Afterwards came the demos which were top-notch. Majesty Young started and ended the demos with country routines. She is a total package, strength, control, impeccable timing, great choreography, and wonderful facial expression. The Clog Mafia from Wisconsin captured the audience's attention with a routine to Feelin' So Fly Like a Cheese head. These

gals were super funny! Evermean Evergreen team performed a lively hoedown, their costumes were beautiful. The Kudzu Cloggers preformed two demos. These young ladies are remarkable dancers! The Tangled Feet Stompers put on a good show. The Chattanooga Choo Choo the oldest traditional team in the country is always a crowd pleaser. The Fontana Parking Lot Hoedowners did a fine job showing what they had learned earlier in the day. The acapella performed by Scotty's fan club was extraordinary! Naomi Pyle's lip syncing demo to Patsy Clines She's Got You was hilarious! She dazzled the crowd as she continued to pull various items from under her blouse. The question of the evening... how much can that blouse house?

Bringing the Jamboree to a close was another fantastic fun dance. The final dance of the night was Rocky Top a tribute to the late Joann Gibbs.

WNC youth clogging teams keep traditions lively

It's about having fun while you dance. That's what young cloggers say about dancing on a traditional clogging team. The current crop of dancers is the strongest in many years, keeping mountain traditions alive and ensuring it will be there for the next generation.

"I really like the cow's tail, a step where you just bend your knee and throw your foot in a circle while the other leg stays straight," said Tommy Miller, a nine-year veteran of the Cole Mountain Cloggers.



Now 15 and a sophomore at West Henderson High School, Tommy's been dancing since kindergarten, when parents Mike and Kathy Miller took him to see the Cole Mountain Cloggers perform at Shindig on the Green.

Grandparents Judy and E.J. Miller have both served on Asheville North Carolina's Folk Heritage Committee, charged with the task of defining, presenting and preserving regional traditions on summer Saturday nights downtown at Shindig on the Green and the Mountain Dance and Folk Festival held every August.

"If it's a big thing, like going for a title, it can be nerve-racking, a bit scary. But if you are going out to have fun, you just do," Tommy said. "It's like a family, you grow up with everyone, go through hard times and good times and you stay a team. I love it."

He says it's not the awards and ribbons that are the big draw, it's the flat-out fun of dancing with other kids, a tradition that almost died out in the 1980s. Prior to that, every mountain school and community center sponsored teams. Asheville's



famed Youth Jamboree, hosted by Hubert Hayes, packed Thomas Wolfe auditorium from the '50s through the '70s.

"I grew up in Georgia.
At my first competition
there, a school bus pulled
up and real mountain
people got off," said

Jeff Atkins, founder of the award winning Cole Mountain Cloggers. "It was Shirley Finger and the Dixie Darlings, from Waynesville. They were so impressive; we couldn't believe how good they were. They won everything, you couldn't beat them."

Atkins had been learning line and precision dance, but knew he was seeing the real thing and wanted that. Attending Mars Hill College on a clogging scholarship, Atkins worked to bring traditional clogging, big circle and smooth dance back to the college team, who at the time were only performing more modern precision clogging.

"One thing I noticed coming to join the Mars Hill Bailey Mountain Cloggers in '89, there were no young teams," Atkins said. "When the school teams fizzled out in the '70s, no one filled the void. There was one youth team in Canton, the Billy Bob Cloggers."

Traditional clogging had given way to modern competitive precision clogging, and while adult teams were surviving, youth teams had disappeared. Atkins got permission to teach family groups at the college and eventually had enough participants for a full youth team.

"Joyce Ledford from the Leather and Lace

Cloggers in Leicester, North Carolina helped us re-establish smooth dance," Atkins said. "I'd also seen the Pisgah View Ranch dancers who were quite famous but I didn't know them."

Piecing traditions together, the Bailey Mountain Cloggers once again became the premier dance team in the region. Atkins fell in love with teaching kids and by 1996 was teaching formal classes in studios and the roots of Cole Mountain were in the works. From 1997-2001 they performed as the Dimension Cloggers (named for the studio in Mars Hill where he taught), and

in 2001, with a full set of kids, became Cole Mountain, dancing at traditional festivals across the region.

"Many people didn't realize it had slipped away," said Atkins, who is a past director of Asheville's Folk Heritage Committee and still volunteers with the nonprofit

organization that falls under the umbrella of the Chamber of Commerce. "Our motto was keeping the mountain tradition thriving. We've been kind of looking to that as a committee.

"Locally, people who had danced all their life had





began having families and have started teaching kids again." The committee asks for adherence to traditional costumes, style and choreography. A slow but steady revival spread across the mountains.

The Fines Creek
Flatfooters started
when dancers like
Keith Silver from the

Southern Appalachian Cloggers encouraged youngsters in the region. Tiffany Perkins directs that group; they appear at Shindig July 18.

Paul Cagle started the Mountain Tradition Cloggers, in Waynesville, North Carolina

about eight years ago with Christy Warren as his assistant. Cagle's son Zac began dancing at age 5 and now, at 15, leads the team as caller.

Both Cagle and Warren dance with the Dixie Darlin Cloggers. Cagle has danced for 50 years,

since age 4; Warren's been dancing since she was 3, for 43 years.

"My son is Korey Warren, who plays in the band Sons of Ralph," Warren said. "He began dancing at the age of 4 and has passed it on to his daughter Charlotte Warren, who is 2 1/2. ... She made her first appearance at The Mountain Dance & Folk festival last year."

"When I was little, clogging was just something my whole family did together, some of the best times in my life have been dancing with my grandmother," Korey Warren said. "It was passed down to me and that's why I think it's important to pass it to my daughter to keep it alive."

Kristie Autrey and Atkins work together coaching the Mountaineer Cloggers, an afterschool team in Mitchell County. Atkins met the Little River Cloggers from Eastern North Carolina while Cole Mountain performed at the North Carolina State Fair in Raleigh years ago. This

will be their 4th year performing at Shindig.

The Avery County Smooth
Dancers are a youth group
preserving the original form of
mountain dance, with no taps

and a smooth sashay
step instead of the more
boisterous clogging.
Siblings of different
ages dance together on
the same team; boys
and girls work together,
developing friendships
and leadership skills.

"It is our hope to pass on a mountain tradition, while promoting teamwork and pride for our mountain heritage," Autrey said. "We are just a big family who love to dance."

Atkins agrees it takes a community to raise a clogging

team.

Jeff Atkins and the Cole Mountain Cloggers

At 8 years old, a young boy had finished his baseball practice when a friend invited him to his clogging dance class. It was at this class

that his life was changed greatly. This was where Jeff Atkins, a now well-acclaimed clogger, national competitor, and Folk Heritage committee leader began his love and respect for clogging.

Family

As a young boy and teen, Jeff learned the clogging steps quickly; he took lessons and joined the Gem City Cloggers team near where he was raised in Georgia. Jeff became more involved in clogging and brought along his brother and two sisters to the practices. The four siblings spent large amounts of time practicing and became an unstoppable force as they started competing with Piney Wood Cloggers.

tuition, so the director offered to help Jeff get a scholarship if he would be willing to help the Mars Hill clogging team. After Jeff had accepted this offer, it was only the second year of helping the team when they won first place in the national competition in 1989.

A Mountain Vision

After working with Bailey Mountain Cloggers and

graduating, Jeff noticed the Asheville Area only consisted of adult clogging teams. He began working with children, teaching clogging at a dance studio and eventually developing a team in 2001 called the Cole Mountain Cloggers (Featured to the right.). This team currently focuses on students 18 years old and younger. He teaches traditional clogging, Freestyle Mountain clogging, and Smooth Mountain clogging. His local team performs all around the Asheville area as well as competing at the State Fair in Raleigh, NC, where they have won 8 years straight.

Jeff Atkins also went on to earn a double major at Mars Hill University in business and psychology.

He currently continues as the teacher of the Cole Mountain Cloggers competing and performing regularly. However, his highest calling is his ministry as the children's pastor for ages 0-5th grade at North Asheville Baptist Church.

Jeff's motto is "to keep a mountain tradition thriving". Jeff also lives by the mission "to teaching young people to dance, enjoy dance, do demonstrations, and keep the mountain dancing alive".

Jeff is on the Folk Heritage Committee scheduling and preparing for Shindig on The Green, as well as performing there every weekend, May through August. To know more about what the area offers, visit folkheritage.com



Clogging for an Education

At age 18, Jeff started his own clogging team called the "Foxfire Cloggers" which competed around the southeast. During one of the competitions, they won easily against the Bailey Mountain Cloggers directed by Mars Hill College. After the competition, the director of this team asked Jeff some tips on why his team was not competing as well as the Foxfire Cloggers. It was during this conversation that an idea came across from the director to help his team and help Jeff with a college education. Jeff was raised in a family that was not able to support college

To Clog or not to clog

...that is the question.

If you are a clogger, the answer is easy...Yes! Let's clog. Let's make friends. Let's have some fun.

As a five year old, my mother enrolled me in the typical dance classes of the pre-Beatle generation, tap, toe, acrobatics and ballet with Miss Leona. I may have had dreams of being a Rockette at the time. Needless to say that didn't happen. What did happen was a love of dance, any kind but not clogging because there was none in our area at the time. In school we had square dancing class and the local YMCA/YWCA frequently held square dances on the weekends for adults and kids.

Over the years while attending county fairs, clogging shows would always draw my attention to the dancers on stage. The music, the complexity of the steps was fascinating to me. It would leave me breathless just watching. Of course, my toes were tapping to the beat. I wanted to learn how to do that.

It would be a long wait and rather unique yet common twist of fate that led me to my clogging

group, The Lehigh Cloggers (LVC).

The Lehigh Valley Cloggers began on Sunday, January 9, 1990 as a one hour clogging teach sandwiched between the square dance class and club dance of the Lehigh Valley Chapter of the Bachelor and Bachelorettes Square Dance Club in Bethlehem, PA. led by Mary Snyder.

After about six months they started to do shows and branched out on their own as the Lehigh Valley Cloggers. Clogging was very new to the area at that time and the first show at a local fair, Musikfest in 1991, earned a standing ovation. The club remained in the Bethlehem area teaching classes and performing about 20 shows a year until September 2000, when they could no longer find an affordable place to practice in the area.

The group, led by Mary Snyder, migrated to Phillipsburg, New Jersey's art center which offered a minimal fee for the use of their mirrored dance studio on the second floor. Climbing the steps to the second floor was equal to a cardiac warm up before you even started to clog! Most of the adult cloggers did not make the transition to the new facility so the group started practically from scratch. The local newspaper helped by

giving the group some fantastic publicity and soon new members joined the beginner class.

April 2001 found the group with a full schedule of summer shows, three seasoned adult dancers, six children who were just beginning to take off (two of these didn't dance in the summer), and several new adult dancers who thought Mary was out of her mind to try to put them in shows. Simple solution by Mary was to add extra practices, so Tuesday evenings began as a supplement to the Sunday afternoon schedule. It worked! The LVC completed the entire show schedule with great success. Nine years would pass with dancers coming and going within the group.

Finally, as my retirement loomed on the horizon and with family obligations winding down, fate at last intervened and clogging enter my life or should I say I entered clogging! More than good exercise and a fun hobby, dance is also a friendship builder and sustainer. It was through friendship that an invitation to attend a line dancing program at the local senior center occurred. And it was there that a new friend told me about clogging, specifically LVC. "Come with me," she said. Within the week I had my first pair of clogging shoes and my first lessons from Mary Snyder. Clogging was Mary's life. She loved it and befriended those who joined in the fun. I thought I might be too old but Mary assured me if I wanted to clog, I could clog. And clog I did and still do. It would be letting Mary down if I at least didn't try. Her inspiration to all who came to LVC still resonates in our classes.

I had barely gotten my toes tapping, in 2010, when the center closed and the LVC were again in search of a practice hall. In late 2010, a temporary fix found us in the basement hall of a nearby church as we searched for a permanent home. It was a temporary fix that lasted nearly a year, but gave us a bit more time to dance with Mary. She taught countless individuals to dance. I was lucky to be one of them.

On September 29, 2011, Mary danced her way into heaven. At this crucial time the group split

once more as another move was needed, our temporary fix had used up all its time. It was during this period that fate stepped in again and my clogging future was saved through yet another friendship. This time with the Pastor of a local congregation who was willing to open the church's community center to us. Mary would have loved the new studio. We have mirrors and family waiting space, chairs, heat and air conditioning! And just a few stairs.

The group continues to meet Tuesday evenings and Sunday afternoons. It has been a difficult time for the group, but one made stronger by the friendships built through clogging. Not just the LVC's but the many friendships forged within the larger clogging family. Through iClog and other clogging groups, a scholarship program in Mary's honor was opened in 2012 to perpetuate her love of clogging. Information on "A Time to Dance" is available at iclog@mac.com.

A new leader of the group, Gail Binns, guided us through that time and the cloggers regrouped and have carried on. Gail has become our leader emeritus and Donna Becker now leads the group. We have weathered a recent indoor flood when the plumbing failed this winter. Once again we thought a move was imminent, but the center has been restored and the studio renovated mirrors and all. Sunday and Tuesday evenings we are there clogging with old and new friends.

We have grown to over 35 adult and children members. We continue to do shows at senior centers, local fairs and hold workshops. The Harvest Stomp is being renewed and will be held in October each year, honoring the more than 25 years of clogging that it represents.



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Nevada Band Wrangles Up Family Fun!



A family run dinner theatre in downtown Henderson, Nevada is wrangling up crowds with a fun evening of good food, foot-tapping live music and lots of foot-stomping clogging! The entertainment is presented by Mama's Wranglers -- the Jackson Family Band and Cloggers -- who have been performing together for more than 15 years. The Wranglers, Toni (aka "Mama"), Tess (age 24), Grayden (age 22), Mickinzie (age 20) and Skyler (age 14), all sing, play fiddles, guitars, mandolins, banjo, etc., and they love to clog

The group performed more than 350 shows out on the road a year, and decided it was time to stay at home a little more. So, they set out to create a family friendly atmosphere where audiences of all ages could enjoy old western song favorites while enjoying a great meal of Fox Smokehouse barbecue, voted number one in Las Vegas. The Firelight Barn Dinner Theater was born. Music in the show ranges from classics by Johnny Cash to sibling harmonies of Alabama hits. A recent production is themed, "The Devil Went Down to Georgia."

The Wranglers have been clogging for about 8 years now. When they first started out as a band, they were known as the Kid Fiddlers and only knew how to play the fiddle and piano. As they grew, they learned to play so many more instruments and they learned to sing! When «Mama» asked the band teacher about putting clogging into the show, the teacher discouraged it, saying that it would take away from the music. Undeterred, the

family persisted in adding clogging to their repertoire, and it took their shows over the top! "Clogging just brought the energy level up, and with an "over-stimulated" world now a days, gave it the extra boost that it needed to set it apart from ordinary bands and shows," Toni said.

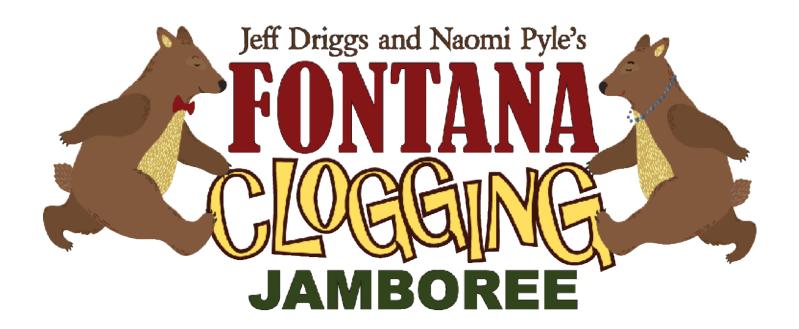
