A GiFt and a promise

I started teaching clogging from the garage of my parent's home in St. Albans, WV in the early 1980s using a portable cassette player and Radio Shack turntable. Not exactly a professional setup, but adequate for the handful of students that grandmother came to every practice and show, beaming with pride.

They always arrived early to assure a seat up front, and make the necessary time for Mary Scott to be helped to her seat. You see, Mary

came to the garage/studio each week. Every dance teacher's dream is to have a professional variable speed sound system with enough power to use for exhibitions and shows and enough versatility to slow music down for teaching purposes. The problem with this type of equipment is cost. A base model -- one without any bells and whistles -- can run four hundred dollars or so, and the top of the line systems run into the thousands. A dance teacher with a few dozen students charging three dollars a pop just can't afford that kind of investment.

Among the group of

students that I taught each week during the 1980s was a young girl named Sarah and her dance partner Robby. Sarah was a blond-haired little lady with a smile that filled the room when she danced, and Robby was a



Scott walked with a cane. I understood from some of the other parents that she had suffered from a brain tumor and was partially paralyzed from the surgeries and treatments. Mary Scott's mother was always on hand to help her daughter with the things that she could no longer do, and that front row seat was always assured for the beaming family whenever and wherever Sarah danced.

As I continued to teach Sarah and Robby over the next couple of years, a friendship grew with their families. I became a guest for dinner and parties, and

often visited Sarah's home to view the videotapes of recent shows. On one such visit, Sarah's dad, Doug, pulled me aside to share some

heartbreaking news -- Mary Scott's cancer was back. Over the following months, we watched and prayed as Mary Scott went through batteries of treatment, her already fragile body weakening with the powerful drugs and painful surgeries she endured.

One Wednesday evening, Doug

rubber-legged little guy with coal black eyes. Together, their duet dances were the highlight of clogging shows in the area, and they won many awards at competitions with their high-stepping routines.

Sarah's parents and

called and asked if I could come over. He and Mary Scott needed to talk to me. On the drive over, my mind raced. With all of the many issues this family was dealing with at this important time, why would they want to see me? Doug greeted me at the door and led me into the family room, where Mary Scott sat on the sofa draped by a

hand-knitted shawl. Her cheeks were hollow and her face pale, but her eyes still twinkled as she recognized me.

As Mary Scott and I talked, Doug got up and left the room. A few moments later. he

returned carrying a large black case, which he placed on the floor in front of me. "We want you to have this", Mary Scott whispered. I leaned forward and carefully released the latches on the case and lifted the lid. Inside was a brand new variable speed record player, amplifier and speaker set. "I can't take

this," was my immediate reaction. "Please," Mary Scott spoke furtively, "It would mean so much to me for you to have it." As tears streamed down my face, Mary Scott and I embraced. "There is one thing I ask," Mary Scott said. "Please promise me you'll try to keep Sarah clogging. It's been so important to this family, and it's my joy." I nodded in acceptance, still speechless from this act of love.

Within weeks, Mary Scott's conditioned began to decline rapidly. Finally, the family realized there was no hope, and Mary Scott entered the hospital for what would be the last time. I paid a visit to see her. She had fallen into a coma, and her frail body was drawn and parched. Her eyes were mere slits, the twinkle gone. I stood in awed silence at the guiet dignity of this woman who shared such a special gift with all of us. The trifles of my own life shamed me. I pledged my oath that day to do my best to keep Mary Scott's

promise.

I sang at Mary Scott's funeral -- a song she'd heard me sing a dozen times before. It

was one of the hardest things I've done, but one of the most important. We stood at her graveside that day as a family -- Mary Scott's husband and children, and cloggers and their families

> all gathered together to remember a very special lady.

Sarah continued to clog for a few years following her mother's death. School, boys and other things finally dampened her interest, and she drifted from it. I felt that I had failed Mary Scott by Sarah's decision, but Doug reassured me that clogging had been one of the greatest influences in her life, and had helped them through many difficult times.

I ran into Doug at the grocery from time to time through the years, and he would catch me up on what Sarah was doing. Doug told me with

pride how lucky he felt that his girls grew up with so many blessings. It's funny, what with all of our little aches and pains and troubles that seem too big to handle, there are those who endure true sorrows and adversity and look back at life as a string of blessings.

Now, Sarah has grown into a beautiful young lady with children of her own and we have spoken through social media about the many memories of those early clogging days.

Many years have passed since Mary Scott left us, and since those early years, I've purchased several sound systems, but I'll never forget the gift -- and the promise -- of the first.

A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Workshop

Those who have booked me for a clogging workshop can tell you that if both I and my luggage make it to your city at the same time, consider yourself charmed. Instructors have for years enjoyed trading horror stories about delayed flights, flat tires, four foot snows and countless other demons that have plagued our clogging travels.

Back in the early 1980s, as a younger, greener and slimmer instructor, I accepted a spot on the teaching staff of a square dance convention in the South. As some of you may know, instructors at some national dance association-type workshops are not paid for their services. A room and entrance ribbon are about as much as some offer.

Teachers normally see the experience as a way

to reach a large audience with their promotional efforts, so they don't harp about the lack of pay too much. I was comforted in knowing that the person who booked me -- one of the BIG names in clogging at the time -- had promised that a room would be provided for me at the convention site, a local university.

Because I was fresh out of

college with a new job, money to burn, and a very self-impressed attitude about being included on the staff of a large event -- I decided to fly. A teammate from my clogging team worked for an airline and found me one of those airfare war tickets for not much more than the cost of gas for the trip. Arrangements were made with my host for my arrival at the airport. Everything looked to be in



order.

Looks can be deceiving.

As you can guess, my luggage was misdirected. Disgusted,



disturbed, and luggage-less, I waited for my host to pick me up. He never showed. What plan now? I had no literature on the convention, or a phone number to call, so I hailed a taxi and

asked to be taken to the University. I would find my host there.

"Which University?", the driver asked.

"There's State, Eastern and the Community College".

This driver looked exactly like Grady. You know, the guy from Sanford and Son. I swear. "I don't know", I blurted, "The one where all the square dancers are". The driver figured that it must be Eastern, noting that it was the biggest.

He was right. Eastern was big. He dropped me off at the student union, and inside I saw the welcome sight of petticoats whirling and the thumping bass beat of bluegrass patter. I walked past the entrance table to take a peek in for my hosts, when an arm gripped my wrist. "You 'can't come in here, son," the man said. "You're not in proper square dance attire." I explained my plight and the man directed me to the registration area to get my entry badge and room packet.

I arrived at the registration hall three counties away, only to find that they had no badge or packet for me. I didn't exist. I explained my

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My host was escorted to the front desk some twenty minutes later. He (amazingly) seemed surprised to see me. "Hi, Jeff," he said, in that tone of voice that can't help but make you feel that what he really means is "What the heck are you doing here?"

My host did some quick talking to get me a workshop ribbon, and escorted me back to the clogging hall. It was really a hall, not the service entrance stairwell like some square dance conventions stow the cloggers.

We had a great evening. Things were looking up. The evening ended and everyone began making their way to their respective rooms or hotels. Feeling better about my luck, I told my host I was ready to check into my room and begin making calls to the airport to check on the status of my luggage.

"Oh, my," came his reply. You guessed it.

He had not made any reservations for me. No

problem, we'll just go to registration to get me a room. There were none available. Zip. Nada. Nuttin' honey. My host said he would go to another hall to ask there while I continued to plead at registration. Still no use. They suggested some hotels in the region.

After an hour of waiting for my host to return, I finally called for a taxi and began making the rounds -of local hotels. Because the Square Dance Convention was an incredibly large affair, there was nothing for miles. We finally found

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ourselves within minutes of the airport, and I asked the driver to dropped me off at car rental. My taxi bill was already larger than a day's rental. I rented a small car and continued my room search, stopping at each exit along the interstate.

There was no room at the inn.

Finally, over an hour away from the convention, site, I spotted a KOA campground. What can I lose, I thought. The night's half over, and I have no clean clothes. Why waste money on a room for a few hours sleep, I thought. I circled the campground looking for an empty slot. It was packed. I refused to give up. I parked my car in the grass near the shower house and reclined my seat. Boy, was I humbled. My big fancy booking was turning into a living hell. I drifted off to the sounds off crickets and frogs, a baby crying somewhere in the campground, and the sound of the wind whistling through my partially opened driver's window.

My watch began beeping at 6:00 a.m. I'd need

the time to get showered, drive the

nearly one hour to the airport to check on my luggage, then get to the college in time to change into my proper square dance attire and make it to my 9:00 a.m. teach. I stripped down and stepped into the cold concrete stall of the campground's shower house. No heat. No curtain. No shower massage head. No Eurogel dispenser. What a dump.

Right as I got my head

lathered up to the point where my eyes were squinted shut, I heard a voice. "Jeff?", "Jeff Driggs?", the voice said. "Is that you?"

Anyway, I rinsed off as quickly as I could to find myself face to face in the shower house with my host's son. "What are you doing way down here," I asked? "I thought you'd be staying at the College."

"Yea, me too," he responded with aggravation. "Damn Daddy forget to get me a room."

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From the Trenches Random stories from the workshop trail

Get a handful of clogging instructors together and inevitably the conversation will turn to sharing "war" stories from classes and workshops they have attended or taught at. While the majority of events are well-run and well attended, with hosts who treat us like family, we sometimes find ourselves in situations that lend themselves for great story telling. You just can't make this stuff up.

You just wouldn't believe some of the places and situations workshops coordinators put us in! You be the judge: 52

I taught a workshop for over 500 kids in a parking lot with a picnic table for a stage and a boom box for a sound system!



I taught in a state park open air picnic shelter, with a cow pasture directly beside us -- and no mic! I had to yell over the tape deck, tap sounds and the mooing not to mention the SMELL!

I taught in an vacant shopping center, where the floor had been stripped and cleaned the night before. The strong cleanser had soaked up under the tiles, and as the dancers clogged a black oily goo oozed out of the cracks. We called it the LaBrea Tar Pit Workshop.





I've taught at a community center where Hall A was on one side of the public pool and Hall B on the other. Dancers had to walk past the splashing and heckling local teens to get from room to room.

I helped organize a workshop in a small Midwestern town, where a local clogger suggested an auction house for our site. What we didn't realize was it was a livestock We danced 20 feet from a auction!

heaping mound of *manure in zero* weather. Not one soul complained, and we had a great workshop!

I was at a charity conference out of state and called a local teacher to see when their classes were. I wanted my work related friends from around the country to see a clogging group in action. I called the teacher and mentioned that I might pop in. He was very excited and said he wouldn't say anything to the class to make it

a big surprise. About a dozen of my colleagues

made reservations at a primo seafood restaurant and we left a few minutes early to drop by the clogging class on the way. When we arrived at the class about fifteen minutes after it started, the director came running up to me saying "Where have you been?", "Everyone's been waiting". The



teacher then went to the mic and announced, "I have a real surprise for all of you ... Jeff Driggs is here and has volunteered to teach the class this evening!" My jaw dropped. There I was, In a three piece suit and no clogging shoes, getting bamboozled into teaching this guy's class. My hungry friends had to wait over an hour while I did the quickest free teach of my life!



I once taught a workshop in a large hotel with two ballrooms, only two teachers, and about 500 screaming kids. I would teach a routine in Hall A to group A, then the next hour go to Hall B and teach the same routine to a different group of kids. The other teacher and I taught eight hours straight with no lunch break. Around Noon, this toe-headed little 12 year old came up to me and asked if I wanted to eat lunch with him. I said thanks, but I couldn't. I explained that I had to run across the hotel to Hall B to teach the second group. He said "Aren't you gonna get to eat?" "I guess not right now", I answered. "Here", the kid said as he reached



into a wadded paper bag and pulled out a banana, "You can share mine". That banana was the only thing I got time to eat until later in the day! As I hurriedly rushed from class to class *I* often caught a glimpse of

this same young man quietly making his way to the stage to leave a glass of water for me before my teaches. The kid, Randy Vawdrey, is married with his eldest child in high school. He's remained a very dear friend through the years. He's still involved in clogging -- as a matter of fact, he and his wife LaChere and their family are cloggers and run a very successful program in Idaho. We spoke about this memory as an adult and he didn't even recall how his kind and caring gesture made an overwhelmed *instructor feel very humbled. That's just the way* Randy is.

Talk about wrong turns. I once was part of a convoy of West Virginia Dancers making our way from West Virginia to Fontana, North Carolina for a clogging workshop. Somewhere in Tennessee we got lost and a member of our group, who is very religious, said he felt strongly that the

spirit was moving him to turn right at a particular fork in the road. "I have this feeling ... ", he said. We followed him until we reached the "Welcome to



Georgia" sign. That's when I turned around. I didn't care where the spirit moved him, I was going to stop and ask directions!

Because of my years of editing TV shows during college, I'm pretty good at trivia regarding any of the 70's sitcoms -- especially The Brady Bunch. *As I sat at a restaurant with fellow instructor* Chip Summey and a group of friends firing back

answers to the *most incredible* Brady questions, our waitress asked. "How does he know so much about the Brady Bunch?" Chip answered quickly and without a flinch. "Because



he was Bobby Brady." "No way," she said, "He doesn't look like Bobby Brady. " "Well, that was twenty years ago," Chip said with a straight face, "He's gained a lot of weight since then." Gee, thanks, I thought. Before long, the kitchen staff was coming out to meet Bobby Brady, and I even got asked for an autograph before we made our retreat, with a restaurant full of stargazers watching us go with noses pressed to the windows!

I stopped for gas on my way to a clogging competition in



rural Eastern Kentucky right

during the midst of a grisly battle between union and non-union coal miners. It seems that several non-union miners had crossed the picket lines into Kentucky to work. As I browsed through the store before paying for my gas, a group

of roughnecks came bouncing through the door screaming "There's a %@&# West Virginia car out there! Visions of the Hatfields and McCoys raced through my head. I had to think fast. As I went up to the register to pay, I looked at the guys and said "Where is that son of a gun? Did you see him?" "No, not yet," one of them answered, "But we are fixin' to get ahold of that picket line crossin' son of a gun." I paid my bill, said "good luck, fellers" and made a quick exit. As I jumped in my car, the group ran out into the parking lot and watch me peel away. I'll bet they thought, "Well that idiot done went and stole that Hillbilly's car!"

Square Dancers and cloggers have this thing about getting a kick from putting their male instructors in one of those frilly petticoats and square dance dresses. One Halloween, I accepted the challenge and was transformed into the most hideous hoedowner you ever saw. After spending about 20 minutes getting into my fishnet panty hose, I made my grand entrance to meet approval. The ladies erupted in laughter. I had just spent 20 minutes making sure that the lines of those fishnet hose ran straight up the front of my legs!

I once taught an entire routine at the National Clogging Convention with no music! At those early conventions, it was mandated that instructors check into their teaching halls a half hour prior to their next class and present your music. My tape (that's right.. cassette tape)



had been out on the table in preparation for the next teach and the teacher before me had picked it up by mistake when he gathered

his things and left. Because this was before cell phones, there was no way to text or call the person to bring them back to the hall. I first tried to cover by teaching the different segments of the routine without music and telling the crowd that a tape was on its way. When several runners failed to find a copy with the vendors or other teachers, I ended up trying to sing the song and cue the dance at the same time! The music never arrived, and I still get reminded about the time we danced a whole class without the music, just me humming and singing.

My friend Tammy Morrison accompanied me to a small private team workshop in the hills of Virginia, where our host graciously offered us the use of her guest house. We made our way through a winding hollow to reach the house, which set back from the road about 100 yards. The beautiful two story farmhouse was nestled against a lush, green hillside, with a little creek running along the back. Our host dropped us of at the house that evening and handed 6111 us the keys. "The house has set empty all Summer," she said, "but the beds are all made and you can have your choice of rooms. There's baths upstairs and downstairs." I was looking forward to spending the evening relaxed in this big old house that had no phone to ring, or cars rushing by all night. We came into the house and as Tammy reached 🖌 under a lampshade to turn on, she let out a

on, she let out a squeal. "What?" I asked. "It's just a fly," she said,

and the light filled the room. The glass in the windows had an eerie moving effect to them. When we went to the window to investigate, the curtains pulled back to reveal hundreds of flies crawling along the pane. The disturbance of the *curtain sent them scattering and they* flew at us, hitting us in the face and landing in Tammy's hair. Each room offered the same unwelcome guests, and we finally found a bedroom upstairs that seemed to have the least threat. We spent an hour swatting and spraying

to rid the room of the creatures, but it seemed

that each time we thought the room was clear,

a new battalion arrived. We dubbed this the Amityville Workshop.

I've stayed during a clogging workshop with a family who lived in a log cabin with a floor plan that was open with walls that came up but open to the large ceiling above. The room I was given was obviously their five year old son's, who screamed for an hour from the living room sofa while his parents shushed him, "I don't wanna sleep out here! What's that stupid fat guy doing sleepin' in MY BED!"


I stayed in a rustic cabin at a workshop with the Buckin' Mule Clogging Team from Florida and the water shut off right in the *middle of my shower -- with my* hair full of shampoo. A fellow clogger had to come in and take the lid off the toilet back and carry the cold water over in a frying pan to rinse me off!

When you given the opportunity to teach for someone's team or at a workshop, you are sometimes given a hotel to stay in. Other times,

the team or host will offer to have you stay in their home. This can be an amazing visit or sometimes less than you would ever expect. I know many travelling instructors who tell stories or staying in the homes of hoarders with paths cut through the home to get

around. I've stayed with a few myself. Once a fellow instructor and I were offered a camper in the yard with shower privileges inside the home. The shower looked like the basement from "Silence of the lambs." Needless to say, I am pretty adamant about requesting a hotel room these days. There is a workshop that I, Naomi Pyle and Chip Summey all share fun stories from our adventures. One year, as the only teacher,

I arrived with a sinus issue. I asked my hosts if they had any sinus medication. "Oh, no," they said. We only believe in natural cures. They offered a cocktail of herbs and spices that would have made Colonel Sanders proud, and I



drank the brownish green concoction and went to bed on my basement air mattress. The next morning I awoke to find my eyes were cemented shut with a thick green crystal substance. Panicking, I went to my hosts to ask what was in the cocktail that would cause this reaction. "Ohhh, wonderful... your body is purging!" "Purging?" I replied. "I don't have time to purge. I have to teach in an hour!" On the way to the workshop, I asked my host to please stop at a convenience store. "Why?" they asked. I told them I wanted a Big Gulp. "I am just really worried that you will want to buy medication," they sheepishly said. Upon arriving at the hall, I went straight to the stage, turned on the mic, and announced "Is there anyone here with any drugs of any kind?" It is relieving to know that cloggers collectively carry every substance known to man. A benadryl later, I started teaching. Thanks, hypochrondrian cloggers everywhere.

As I said, Naomi Pyle and Chip Summey were also guests at this same event and helped the hosts to take home the staging from the event.



Knowing that there was no real food in the house except beans, they pulled into a drive through window. The hosts pulled up beside them in horror, saying "NOO! NOOO!" Naomi said it was the

best cheeseburger she has ever eaten. Later that evening, when the two retired to the basement quarters, the air mattresses deflated, leaving them to spend the night on the basement floor.

I hope these stories are read with the humor and humanity that goes along with them. At the end of the day, any of us who are blessed to be given the opportunity to travel and teach the dance we love to friends all over the world have been given an incredible gift.

I have learned so much from my teaching travels. I have learned to be thankful for what I have and not to be jealous for what I do not. I have learned the simple joys in times spent with hosts talking about clogging, our lives and how this dance has changed it.

I hope you have enjoyed this chance to tell some of those tales.

music and the haunting and beautiful ballads that give listeners goosebumps. is the first talent of the Irish artists thirty this show: a powerhouse of the best dancers of the country, which hammer the pub floor of their tap; Air dancers magic, fairy performance, heirs of the long Celtic culture; the crazy power of those few musicians capable of vibrating on stage tradition, as with ballads that give you goosebumps.

Choreographed by Jim Murrihy, with musical direction by Anthony Davis, the show immerses viewers in an Irish Celtic pub, and takes the audience into a whirlwind two hours of non-stop music, dance and story-telling.

Morgan Mallum is a triplet and at the age of 5, her and her brother and sister began

clogging at the Capital City Dance Shack, in Lincoln, Nebraska . At the age of 9, Morgan began competing all over the country on a team alongside her brother and sister. Throughout the years, Morgan and her sister, Madison, have won numerous

regional and national awards for their duets together. Morgan, now 21 years old, currently is a member of the four time national championship clogging team, Tap This! She was also apart of the team's 14 time winning streak in 2011-2014. In 2013, the team had the opportunity to dance on the stage at America's Got Talent in front of the celebrity judges. More recently, Morgan traveled with Tap This! on a 2 week east coast tour this past summer, choreographing collectively over 45 dances as well as putting on workshops at 8 studios in 6 different states. She looks forward to doing a similar tour again with

the team this upcoming summer. As well as performing, Morgan also has a passion for teaching clogging. She currently teaches 6 exhibition



Together, they choreographed a routine over the phone, and everything came together in the hopes of drawing some folks to the event.

Jeff tried to keep the eager team realistic about their first event expectations, but he joined everyone in pleasant surprise when over 100 dancers filled the small school lunchroom to dance the day away.


