CLOG National Convention in Nashville

Over Thanksgiving weekend, hundreds of cloggers assembled on the dance floors at the Gaylord Opryland Hotel in Nashville Tennessee.

What brought this menagerie of dancers together? It was the 33rd annual C.L.O.G National Convention, and it was a goodie! From start to finish the clogger's energy levels were in overdrive!

It is hard to surpass the grandeur and location of the Gaylord Opryland Hotel. It is convenient to the airport, downtown, shopping, restaurants and live music everywhere! The hotel itself is breathtaking, particularly this time of the year. Every nook and cranny was

decorated for the holidays.

The original Opryland Hotel opened on Thanksgiving Day in 1977, on land adjacent to the former Opryland USA amusement park. It was originally built to support the Grand Ole Opry, a Nashville country music institution and had 580 guest rooms and a

ballroom. The Magnolia Lobby was designed to resemble a grand Southern mansion with an impressive staircase and a Tiffany-style chandelier. Through the years, the resort has grown considerably and now has 2,881 rooms and suites, with more than 750 garden atrium rooms overlook the hotel's nine acres of indoor gardens. Cloggers could be found wandering all over the place enjoying the restaurants, shops, and especially the clogging halls and vendors!

The integrated operation of the National Convention is amazing. Understanding that the operation moves from year to year and the planning and coordination that goes into the event is staggering.

Before the convention starts, plans for the following year are already underway. The continuous efforts of Susan and David Phillips and the Executive Committee,

Conrad Copper and the Board of Directors are invisible to us -- the dancer -- as they plot to make each convention

This year, Melissa and Rob Pack from Tennessee provided the extra local help need to get the floors done. Johnie Payton, another local coordinator, was in charge of the open teach halls, where four ladies tested for their CCI designation. The program consists of educational seminars and mentor aimed at improving instructional skills and aid in dance career advancement and the ongoing pursuit of knowledge. All four ladies passed the program and were awarded their CCI certificates before the showcase Saturday evening.

I met Johnie Payton several years ago, but had time to get better acquainted this year. What a wonderful lady, full of past clogging tales. A big thank you goes out to Shannon and Terry Glass, the sound and technical coordinators. I thought that the t-shirt designs were great, registration ran smoothly, there were great vendors in attendance with a large variety of wares, to all those involved did a great job making the convention run smoothly and successfully.

What is a clogging convention without lots and lots of clogging classes! Wednesday and Thursday teaches were available in the open hall for those coming in early. Thursday offered cloggers several alternative options. Zumba and/ or line dance class with Darolyn Pchajek at the helm were insane fun, and a nice addition. She

also taught several remarkable clogging routines Friday and Saturday.

Also offered at the convention's pre-events was Yoga with Andy Howard demonstrating the stretches. As a participant, I have to admit all that stretching was relaxing. Andy had several teaching spots during the convention. Many liked Boogie Bumper (lindy hop), and his routine to Aretha Franklin's song Think.

The last offering (I hope you are sitting down) was "Dishin' with Driggs," a class that gave clogging instructor Jeff Driggs a chance to show off his skill in the kitchen while sharing stories from his more than 35 years of clogging. This class was a huge success! Due to space, the number attending this class was limited. Everyone taking the class was impressed with his culinary skills. The menu included deep-fried deviled eggs, West Virginia pepperoni rolls, herbcrusted pork loin with white wine and mushroom sauce and Granny's corn, a recipe inspired by Jeff's Granny. Jeff expressed how much he enjoyed this experience to spend some time with cloggers in a social setting. Afterwards, Jeff traded his spatula for clogging shoes and headed to the dance halls to teach several routines. He also and held a seminar titled "Dance games for audience engagement." Jeff shared and demonstrated ideas on how to get the crowd involved, which may entice some to try clog

dancing.

The remarkable instructors on hand, with their variety of routines, made it tough to choose. All of the instructors did a fabulous job!

Chip Summey is known for his endless ways to accomplish a pull back. He demonstrated this in a step called a Rock Slide, which essentially is a rock pull moving sideways. This move was comical, especially when done in a box. You had to hope those around you were listening to his directions!

Canadian instructor Barb Guenette offered a couple of routines to Cajun music. Her music selections are unique and she loves to challenge the right foot!







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Blake Dunn held a "parking lot couple and group routine". The title of this class left some questions as to exactly what is was. Blake explained it is a simple couple/ group routine that can be put together quickly, and got its name from groups throughout the years that have met in the parking lots of clogging events or competitions to put together an impromptu routine. The description made sense and we delved into the task. Being a diligent person, Blake was eventually successful conveying her ideas, even to a couple/group/directionallychallenged dancer like me. This class was really a blast!

Melissa and Rob Pack also demonstrated skill and courage in holding a barn dance class. These two are experts in the area of traditional dance, and their classes are always tons of fun. Most of today's cloggers learn and teach mostly line dances, so opportunities to learn coupled routines is always a treat at convention. Somehow, they can take a group of dancers who suddenly forgot their left from their right, are totally confused as to who is the dancing the lead or the follow, and make it all come together! Melissa recently just opened her own dance studio in Lebanon, Tennessee. Congratulations!

After several appearances at nationals, many folks are getting familiar with instructor Todd Harry. He resides in the state of Washington. His style is as distinctive, as his baritone voice. His teach to Dynamite was well received.

Ann-Marie Sterling, a native Tennessean, was also on the teaching staff. Her teaches were nicely paced, clear, and included some seldom used steps. Her entire family dances and she is hoping that her two young daughters continue the tradition.

New York native Andrew Perry taught a routine in the Anything Goes Hall. It was to a song titled When You Dance. Everyone who attended this class really liked the routine!









Gavin Cox (above, center, in gray shirt) was an introductory instructor. This young man is super talented and no stranger to the stage. He has been a dancer and cast member of the popular Hatfield and McCoy Dinner Feud in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee and is getting an impressive collection of trophies from his competition appearances. Gavin comes from a long line of dancers. His mom Sherry also taught at the convention. Together they held an advanced steps and skills class. His grandparents, aunts and uncles and cousins also clog and square dance and are valuable members of the clogging community.

Naomi Pyle is an expected fixture at any national clogging convention. She has a style and sense of humor that is uniquely hers.

Another expected presence is mastermind Shane Gruber, leader of the legendary Shane Gang. Shane's imagination has no boundaries and his choreography and delivery make everyone feel right at home!

No national is complete until the rhythmic, sweet sounding taps of Missy Shinoski hit the stage. Missy has attended every National Convention (all thirty three) which is an awesome accomplishment!

These folks not only bring great routines time

and time again, but their delivery is highly entertaining!

Because the CLOG National Convention moves from year to year, activities are scheduled that give dancers the chance to enjoy an excursion together. Some time back, CLOG decided to add these excursions on Friday night coinciding with the fun dance. They have become very popular. This year's trip was to the historic Ryman Auditorium, the mother church of country music and original home of the Grand Ole Opry. CLOG presented two very deserving persons with the "Pioneer" award for their many years of service to the clogging world.


Judy Waymouth and Jeff Driggs were both surprised and humbled by the award.

Judy first got involved in clogging at a workshop in Canada, where she was invited to attend the "Possum Holler" workshop at Fontana in North Carolina. Her exhibition of Ottawa Valley Step Dancing there took the clogging world by storm and the "Canadian" step and "double-doubles" forever changed the percussive style of modern clogging.

"What an honour to be presented the "Pioneer Award" at the National Clogging Convention in Nashville," Judy said. "Receiving an accolade such as this at the National Level is the ultimate form of accomplishment. It seemed most fitting to be given this award by Chip Summey and to co-receive it with Jeff Driggs, two instructors, dancers and friends that I met at my first clogging workshop in the United States, more than 30 years ago."

Judy said that the plaque will serve as a reminder of her many dance experiences that resulted from her association with clogging and CLOG.


Jeff Driggs began square dancing in the 1970s











and clogging in 1980. At an open-mic teaching session at Fontana, North Carolina in 1983 he caught the eye of Bobbie and Dewey Paul of Ohio, who offered him a staff teaching spot the following year. Since that time, has taught in all fifty U.S. states, Canada, Europe and Australia and has received numerous awards and honors. Over his years of teaching, he has choreographed hundreds of dances and has co-organized events that have showcased thousands of dancers in halftime shows, parades and more. "I am very honored to be recognized in this way," Driggs said. "There are so many pioneers in clogging that make this art form so special. I am humbled to think that in some small way I may have contributed to this dance that has enriched my life so very much."

With all of the awards and recognitions completed, the show goes on! Producer Andy Howard thinks big. Every instructor had a part in this year's showcase.

The theme was Harper Valley PTA.

Many dance teams were enlisted, Will's Mountain Cloggers of Maryland, Power Taps of Georgia, Judy's School of Dance from Canada, and the Delta Rhythm Cloggers, Evermean Evergreen Cloggers and the Tennessee Hoedowners of Tennessee.

Crowd pleasing solos were performed by Brittney Martin and Gavin Cox.

Missy Shinoski and Todd Harry teamed up to make the school announcements. The duo channeled Saturday Night Live's musical morning announcements, joking and singing along to popular songs with the words changed to clogging references. They were just having too much fun.

Jeff Driggs had a skit in the show as a biology/ chemistry teacher Professor "Nuddy", handling his part in classic Jerry Lewis style. Everything he said, every facial expression, even his silence was hysterical as he welcomed new elements to the periodic table inspired by clogging instructors.

Shannon Glass brought the crowd to their feet while singing "God Bless The USA."

Lauren Shinoski (Missy's talented daughter)

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skillfully sang and played the ukulele in the fictional high school talent show.

Sherry Cox did a fine job singing "Man, I Feel Like A Woman," accompanied by his sons Cameron and Trysten on drums and guitar.

Andy Howard sang "Oh, Canada" beautifully.

Grand Ole Opry Square Dancers Honored with Legacy Award

The Grand Ole Opry Square Dancers from the world famous Grand Ole Opry were honored on Friday night of the CLOG National Convention with the "Legacy Award." The award is given periodically as board members and officers of the organization see opportunities to pay tribute to individuals and groups who have made major contributions to the legacy of the art form of clogging.

Grand Ole Opry dancers Bubba "Clyde" Richardson and Marcia Campbell represented the group at the ceremony and expressed their gratitude at being selected for this very prestigious award.

The Grand Ole Opry was founded in 1925 by George D. Hay as a one-hour stage radio "barn

dance" on WSM Radio, moving to the Ryman Auditorium in 1943 and to the Grand Ole Opry House in 1974. It is the longest-running radio broadcast in US history. Square dancers and cloggers were a part of the broadcast from the beginning, dancing figures and cutting a rug to music by the likes of "red hot fiddlin" Uncle Jimmy Thompson and Uncle Dave Macon.

CLOG, Inc. executive director Susan Phillips, who leads the organization along with husband David, presented the plaque to the Grand Ole Opry Square Dancers. Susan plaque's read the inscription, "The Legacy Award, presented to the Grand Ole Opry Square honors Dancers, the group for their many dedicated years ambassadors of cloq dancing, whose deep roots are akin to the spirit and traditions of country

music and the Grand Ole Opry."

"I've been dancing since I was ten years old," Bubba said. "One of the greatest honors is to get to dancing on the stage of the Grand Ole Opry every Saturday night. I love to carry on the tradition and meet fine folks like y'all."

Marcia added, "When you say 'legacy' it gets me choked up, because this is who we are. I don't know what I would be doing without dance, and every Saturday night to perform on the stage of the Grand Ole Opry – the biggest and best stage in the whole wide world – and to share my love of dance with y'all is amazing. When we walked through the doors today and heard tap shoes, it

made my heart smile."

Jeff Driggs, the owner and editor of the Double Toe Times magazine of clogging, cosponsored the Legacy Award and spoke about his long friendship with Bubba and Marcia and the important legacy that they and the group bring to the clogging community. "These two individuals have some of the biggest hearts for clogging of anyone I have

met," Driggs said. "As ambassadors the art, the Grand Ole Opry Square Dancers are the first impression that many people from around the world have of clogging. The fact that they so passionately showcase the heritage of traditional square dance that has been a part of the Opry from the beginning, while recognizing the changing percussive styles modern clogging as they progress, is truly admirable and worthy of this great honor."





Time to Pre-Register

I became a clogging addict after attending my first workshop, beccause they are too much fun. For me, the beginning of each year means getting a wish list of workshops together and figuring out which ones are doable for me. Once that decision is made, it means filling out the registration form and mailing it in early!

There is a lot of physical work involved for the hosts of workshops, and many people don't realize the risk that event coordinators take when planning an event. Having those advance funds to cover many of the costs of an event, and -- frankly -- having a way to determine the point at which they need to make a decision about being able to move forward with an event, are very important.

Hotels and airlines require pre-payment and deposits. Mailings and promotion, supplies and other pre-event expenses can leave a coordinator thousands of dollars out of pocket hoping for a turnout that will cover the expenses.

Let me make one thing clear: workshops are not a get rich quick scheme for the hosts, and instructors are often lucky to break even. These workshops are for YOU (the clogger) who likes to spend time on the dance floor with their friends, who likes to learn different routines to take back to their club, who likes a mini vacation from home, who likes to explore different attraction and restaurants, and let's not forget bargain shopping.

I have attending about seventy workshops, so I speak from experience. If you the dancer do not support these workshops including sending in your registration early they will go away. That will leave us with nothing but fond memories. Of the seventy workshops I have attended I have only paid once at the door, because it was a spur of the moment decision for me to go.

Early on in my dancing endeavors I discovered gem of a workshop held in Northern Kentucky called MidWest Clogging Workshop hosted by Fonda Hill. It was well organized, at a great location, and I was greeted by real friendly folks and a great workshop atmosphere. One year, I went online to print out my registration form and it was nowhere to be found. I thought it might be a web site problem, so I contacted

Fonda and she informed me the MidWest Clogging Workshop was no more. I was devastated, how could this gem dissipate?

More recently, instructor Naomi Pyle cancelled the long standing Indiana clogging event Oktober-ClogFest due to a lack of early registration.

Last year I drove over seven hours to check this workshop out. It was well worth the long drive! Naomi hated having to cancel, but due to a substantial reduction in early registration compared to previous years, she made the call to cancel. She is hopeful to bring back the event that has been a staple for

dancers for many years.

Talk to a group of event coordinators and they will all share stories of being within days of a deadline and only having a handful of registrations and the prospect of final preparations with thousands of dollars of investment and no way to determine if there will be registra-

tion at the door. Of course there is risk when going into any venture, but without that early support it is very difficult to encourage cloggers to roll the dice on presenting an event. You really can't blame them. Online secure links make it easier for many events to give their attendees ways to register using a credit card, saving time and postage. An emailed registration confirmation let's you know you are set to go, and gives the coordinator the information to know how many to plan for.

Have you ever been to a workshop and registered at the door, only to find out that they were out of syllabi, arm bands, tshirts and other workshop items? The reason is simple. Pre-registration counts and comparisons to previous year's numbers are what are used to determine how many supplies realistically should be planned for. It is great for an event to get the surprise of a big at the door registration, but most plan conservatively for at door supplies so that there are not lots of waste in supplies and merchandise that cannot be resold.

There are fewer and fewer events out there for dancers these days. I encourage you to join me in doing our part to support the events we enjoy going to by taking advantage of pre-registration. Keep in mind the old saying, the early bird gets the worm.
